## ORDER AND JUDGMENT\*

Before HARTZ, GORSUCH, and HOLMES, Circuit Judges.

Taurino Cereceres-Morales pleaded guilty to one count of possession with intent to distribute 100 kilograms or more of marijuana. The district court sentenced him to sixty months in prison, which was both the statutory mandatory minimum and the sentence the parties had agreed to in their plea agreement. Although the parties' plea agreement contained an appeal waiver, Mr. Cereceres-Morales appealed.

The government has moved to enforce the agreement pursuant to *United*States v. Hahn, 359 F.3d 1315 (10th Cir. 2004) (en banc) (per curiam). Counsel for Mr. Cereceres-Morales filed a response, citing Anders v. California,

386 U.S. 738, 744 (1967), and moved to withdraw. We gave Mr. Cereceres
Morales an opportunity to file a pro se response. See id. He has done so, and he "waives [his] right to appeal." Pro se Resp. at 1.

Accordingly, we DISMISS this appeal. We DENY the government's motion to enforce as moot, and we GRANT Mr. Cereceres-Morales's counsel's motion to withdraw.
