PER CURIAM:

Johnny Joseph appeals from the district court's order granting in part his 18 U.S.C. § 3582(c)(2) (2006) motion for reduction of sentence based on the crack cocaine amendments to the Sentencing Guidelines. The district court reduced Joseph's sentence to the minimum of the amended Guidelines range. Joseph asserts that the district court erred in failing to recalculate his drug quantity and in failing to permit him to respond to the Probation Office's recommendation. However, in proceeding, the district court may only consider the effect of any other retroactive amendment, not sentencing Guidelines issues. United States Sentencing Guidelines Manual § 1B1.10, p.s., comment. (n.2) (2008). Further, any procedural error by the district court was harmless, as Joseph the lowest available sentence. sentenced to See United States v. Dunphy, 551 F.3d 247 (4th Cir. 2009) (holding that district court lacks jurisdiction to reduce sentence below minimum of amended Guidelines range). Accordingly, we affirm the district court's order. We grant Joseph's motion to file supplemental authorities and deny his motion for remand. dispense with oral argument because the facts and

contentions are adequately presented in the materials before the court and argument would not aid the decisional process.
