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15	¹ Under 28 U.S.C. §2253(c)(2), a Certificate of Appealability may issue "only if the applicant has made a substantial showing of the
16	denial of a constitutional right." Here, the Court has accepted the Magistrate Judge's finding and conclusion that the Petition is time-
17 18	barred. Thus, the Court's determination of whether a Certificate of Appealability should issue here is governed by the Supreme Court's
18	decision in <u>Slack v. McDaniel</u> , 529 U.S. 473, 120 S. Ct. 1595 (2000), where the Supreme Court held that, "[w]hen the district court denies
20	a habeas petition on procedural grounds without reaching the prisoner's underlying constitutional claim, a COA should issue when
21	the prisoner shows, at least, that jurists of reason would find it debatable whether the petition states a valid claim of the denial of
22	a constitutional right and that jurists of reason would find it debatable whether the district court was correct in its procedural
23	ruling." 529 U.S. at 484. As the Supreme Court further explained: "Section 2253 mandates that both showings be made before the
24	court of appeals may entertain the appeal. Each component of the § 2253(c) showing is part of a threshold inquiry, and
25	a court may find that it can dispose of the application in a fair and prompt manner if it proceeds first to resolve the
26	issue whose answer is more apparent from the record and
	arguments." <u>Id</u> . at 485. Here, the Court finds that Detitioner has failed to make the

Here, the Court finds that Petitioner has failed to make the requisite showing that "jurists of reason would find it debatable whether the district court was correct in its procedural ruling."
