17	Petitioner, a state prisoner proceeding	g pro se, has filed an application for a writ of habeas
18	corpus pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 2254 together with a request to proceed in forma pauperis	
19	pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1915. Petitioner sub-	mitted a declaration that makes the showing required
20	by § 1915(a). Accordingly, the request to pro-	oceed in forma pauperis is granted. 28 U.S.C.
21	§ 1915(a).	
22	The exhaustion of state court remedie	s is a prerequisite to the granting of a petition for
23	writ of habeas corpus. 28 U.S.C. § 2254(b)(1). If exhaustion is to be waived, it must be waived
24	explicitly by respondent's counsel. 28 U.S.C	2. § 2254(b)(3). ¹ A waiver of exhaustion, thus, may
25	not be implied or inferred. A petitioner satisfies the exhaustion requirement by providing the	
26	highest state court with a full and fair opportu	unity to consider all claims before presenting them to

1	the federal court. Picard v. Connor, 404 U.S. 270, 276 (1971); Middleton v. Cupp, 768 F.2d		
2	1083, 1086 (9th Cir. 1985), cert. denied, 478 U.S. 1021 (1986).		
3	After reviewing the petition for habeas corpus, the court finds that petitioner has failed to		
4	exhaust state court remedies. The claims have not been presented to the California Supreme		
5	Court. Further, there is no allegation that state court remedies are no longer available to		
6	petitioner. Accordingly, the petition should be dismissed without prejudice. ²		
7	Petitioner has also requested the appointment of counsel. Because the undersigned		
8	recommends that this action be dismissed, the motion for appointment of counsel is denied.		
9	Good cause appearing, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that:		
10	1. Petitioner is granted leave to proceed in forma pauperis;		
11	2. The Clerk of the Court is directed to serve a copy of these findings and		
12	recommendations together with a copy of the petition filed in the instant case on the Attorney		
13	General of the State of California;		
14	3. The Clerk of the Court is directed to assign a district judge to this action;		
15	4. Petitioner's motion for appointment of counsel (ECF No. 3) is denied; and		
16	IT IS HEREBY RECOMMENDED that petitioner's application for a writ of habeas		
17	corpus be dismissed for failure to exhaust state remedies.		
18	These findings and recommendations will be submitted to the United States District Judge		
19	assigned to this case, pursuant to the provisions of 28 U.S.C. § 636(b)(1). Within fourteen days		
20	after being served with these findings and recommendations, petitioner may file written		
21	objections with the court. The document should be captioned "Objections to Findings and
