MEMORANDUM AND ORDER

Plaintiff, currently confined at Camden County Correctional Facility in Camden, New Jersey, seeks to bring a civil action <u>in</u> <u>forma pauperis</u>,¹ without prepayment of fees or security, asserting claims pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983. The Prison Litigation Reform Act of 1995, Pub. L. No. 104-134, 110 Stat. 1321 (April 26, 1996) (the "Act"), which amends 28 U.S.C. § 1915, establishes certain financial requirements for prisoners who are attempting to bring a civil action or file an appeal <u>in forma</u> pauperis.

Under the Act, a prisoner bringing a civil action <u>in forma</u> <u>pauperis</u> must submit an affidavit, including a statement of all assets, which states that the prisoner is unable to pay the fee. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(a)(1). The prisoner also must submit a certified copy of his inmate trust fund account statement for the

6-month period immediately preceding the filing of his complaint. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(a)(2). The prisoner must obtain this statement from the appropriate official of each prison at which he was or is confined. Id.

Even if the prisoner is granted <u>in forma pauperis</u> status, the prisoner must pay the full amount of the \$350.00 filing fee. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(b)(1). In each month that the amount in the prisoner's account exceeds \$10.00, until the \$350.00 filing fee is paid, the agency having custody of the prisoner shall assess, deduct from the prisoner's account, and forward to the Clerk of the Court payment equal to 20% of the preceding month's income credited to the prisoner's account. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(b)(2).

Plaintiff may not have known when he submitted his complaint that he must pay the filing fee, and that even if the full filing fee, or any part of it, has been paid, the Court must dismiss the case if it finds that the action is: (1) frivolous or malicious; (2) fails to state a claim upon which relief may be granted; or (3) seeks monetary relief against a defendant who is immune from such relief. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(e)(2)(B). If the Court dismisses the case for any of these reasons, the Act does not permit the prisoner to get his filing fee back.

If the prisoner has, on three or more prior occasions while incarcerated, brought an action or appeal in a court that was dismissed on any of the grounds listed above, he cannot bring

another action <u>in forma pauperis</u> unless he is in imminent danger of serious physical injury. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

In this action, Plaintiff failed to submit a complete <u>in</u> <u>forma pauperis</u> application as required by 28 U.S.C. § 1915(a)(1), (2), including a certified account statement. Plaintiff did submit an Affidavit of Poverty but failed to include a six-month institutional account statement certified by an Authorized Officer of the Institution as required by 28 U.S.C. § 1915(a)(2).

To the extent Plaintiff asserts that officials at the facility at which he is incarcerated have refused to provide the certified account statement, any such assertion must be supported by an affidavit detailing the circumstances of Plaintiff's request for a certified account statement and the officials' refusal to comply, including the dates of such events and the names of the individuals involved.

THEREFORE, it is on this 9th day of April, 2012;

ORDERED that Plaintiff's application to proceed <u>in</u> <u>forma</u> <u>pauperis</u> is hereby DENIED, without prejudice; and it is further

ORDERED that the Clerk of the Court shall administratively terminate this case, without filing the complaint or assessing a filing fee; Plaintiff is informed that administrative termination is not a "dismissal" for purposes of the statute of limitations,

and that if the case is reopened, it is not subject to the statute of limitations time bar if it was originally filed timely, <u>see Houston v. Lack</u>, 487 U.S. 266 (1988) (prisoner mailbox rule); <u>McDowell v. Delaware State Police</u>, 88 F.3d 188, 191 (3d Cir. 1996); <u>see also Williams-Guice v. Board of Education</u>, 45 F.3d 161, 163 (7th Cir. 1995); and it is further

ORDERED that the Clerk of the Court shall send Plaintiff a blank form application to proceed <u>in forma pauperis</u>; and it is further

ORDERED that if Plaintiff wishes to reopen this case, he shall so notify the Court, in writing addressed to the Clerk of the Court, Mitchell H. Cohen Building and U.S. Courthouse, Fourth and Cooper Streets, Camden, New Jersey, 08101, within 30 days of the date of entry of this Order; Plaintiff's writing shall include either (1) a complete, signed <u>in forma pauperis</u> application, including a <u>certified</u> six-month prison account statement, or (2) the \$350 filing fee; and it is further

ORDERED that upon receipt of a writing from Plaintiff stating that he wishes to reopen this case, and either a complete <u>in forma pauperis</u> application or filing fee within the time allotted by this Court, the Clerk of the Court will be directed to reopen this case; and it is finally

ORDERED that the Clerk of the Court shall serve a copy of this Order upon Plaintiff by regular U.S. mail.
