ORDER

Upon consideration of the petition for a writ of error as well as the State's answer and motion to dismiss, it appears to the Court that:

- (1) The petitioner, DiAndre Willis, seeks to invoke this Court's original jurisdiction to issue a writ of error. The State of Delaware has filed an answer and motion to dismiss the petition.
- (2) Willis faces pending criminal charges for—among other things—first-degree rape and first-degree burglary.¹ In his petition in this Court, Willis alleges that a State's witness committed perjury at his preliminary hearing in the Court of Common Pleas. He asks that we issue a writ of error reversing the Court of Common Pleas' finding of probable cause.

(3) "Writs of error" have been abolished.² This Court now hears "appeals" from the Superior Court in criminal cases.³ If the Superior Court should enter a final judgment against Willis, he may then appeal to this Court.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED that the State's motion to dismiss is GRANTED. Willis' petition for a writ of error is DISMISSED.
