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PER CURIAM:

James Darnell Wintons seeks to appeal the district court's order denying relief on his 28 U.S.C. § 2255 (2012) motion. order is not appealable unless a circuit justice or judge issues a certificate of appealability. 28 U.S.C. § 2253(c)(1)(B) (2012). A certificate of appealability will not issue absent "a substantial showing of the denial of a constitutional right." 28 U.S.C. § 2253(c)(2) (2012). When the district court denies relief on the merits, a prisoner satisfies this standard by demonstrating that reasonable jurists would find that the district court's assessment of the constitutional claims is debatable or wrong. McDaniel, 529 U.S. 473, 484 (2000); see Miller-El v. Cockrell, 537 U.S. 322, 336-38 (2003). When the district court denies relief on procedural grounds, the prisoner must demonstrate both that the dispositive procedural ruling is debatable, and that the motion states a debatable claim of the denial of a constitutional right. Slack, 529 U.S. at 484-85. We have independently reviewed the record and conclude that Wintons has not made the requisite showing. Accordingly, we deny a certificate of appealability and dismiss the appeal.

Additionally, we construe Wintons' supplemental informal brief as an application to file a second or successive § 2255 motion to challenge his sentence based on the decision in <u>United</u> States v. Johnson, 1235 S. Ct. 2557 (2015). See United States v.

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Winestock, 340 F.3d 200, 208 (4th Cir. 2003). Because North Carolina robbery with a dangerous weapon, N.C. Gen Stat. Ann. § 14-87 (West 2014), qualifies as a violent felony under the force clause of 18 U.S.C. § 924(e)(2)(B)(i) (2012), Wintons' claim does not satisfy the criteria for authorization. See 28 U.S.C. § 2255(h) (2012). Therefore, we deny authorization to file a successive § 2255 motion.

We dispense with oral argument because the facts and legal contentions are adequately presented in the materials before this court and argument would not aid the decisional process.
