Joe Vidales, Texas prisoner # 677120, appeals the district court's dismissal as frivolous of his 42 U.S.C. § 1983 suit in which he alleged that his conviction and sentence were unlawful. A district court shall dismiss a case if it determines that the case is frivolous or fails to state a claim upon which relief can be granted. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(e)(2)(B). This court reviews the dismissal of a prisoner's complaint as frivolous for an abuse

of discretion. <u>Black v. Warren</u>, 134 F.3d 732, 733 (5th Cir. 1998).

With the benefit of liberal construction, Vidales argues that his complaint should not have been dismissed under <u>Heck v.</u> <u>Humphrey</u>, 512 U.S. 477 (1994). He has not shown, however, that his claims would not necessarily imply the invalidity of his conviction. Therefore, the district court did not err. <u>See</u> <u>Heck</u>, 512 U.S. at 486-87; <u>Hamilton v. Lyons</u>, 74 F.3d 99, 102 (5th Cir. 1996).

Vidales's appeal is without arguable merit and is dismissed as frivolous. <u>See Howard v. King</u>, 707 F.2d 215, 220 (5th Cir. 1983); 5TH CIR. R. 42.2. The district court's dismissal of Vidales's complaint as frivolous and the dismissal of his appeal as frivolous count as two strikes for purposes of 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g). <u>See Adepeqba v. Hammons</u>, 103 F.3d 383, 387-88 (5th Cir. 1996). We previously dismissed one of Vidales's appeals as frivolous in which the district court had also dismissed the complaint as frivolous. <u>See Vidales v. Lantern Square</u> <u>Apartments</u>, No. 96-20201 (5th Cir. June 25, 1996)(unpublished). As Vidales has accumulated at least four strikes, he is barred from proceeding in forma pauperis in any civil action or appeal filed while he is incarcerated or detained in any facility unless he is under imminent danger of serious physical injury. <u>See</u> § 1915(g).
