APPLETON - Lucas Duppler grinned and then went with the politically correct answer when asked if he has ever gotten in the ears of his coaches to open up the playbook a bit.

No, not really, because we know we don't have much of an input anyway," the Appleton North senior wide receiver/defensive back said. "We usually just keep quiet, and they'll put us in the right positions.

Did they ever.

The first was a 40-yard bomb on third-and-forever from senior quarterback Brad Odeman to Duppler that pushed the ball from midfield to the Preble nine and led to a second-quarter touchdown and a 140 lead.

### WIAA Division 1, Level 1: Appleton North 35, Green Bay Preble 7

One of the concerns for Appleton North was slowing a Preble running attack that had amassed 2,213 yards during the Fox River Classic Conference

North needed 11 plays to march 74 yards on its opening drive of the second half, which ended with a seven-yard touchdown run by junior tailback Steve

That turned a 14-point advantage into a 21-point cushion and all but sealed the outcome as nearly five minutes was shaved off the clock.

Lichtfuss carried the ball 10 times for 65 yards on the drive, with many of the plays pitches to the left side. The Fox Valley Association's all-time single-season rusher finished with 198 yards on 31 carries. He has 1,815 yards on the year.


