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Defendant has filed a Motion for Summary Judgment (Doc. #92) pursuant to Rule 56 of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure.

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NOTICE--WARNING TO PLAINTIFF

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THIS NOTICE IS REQUIRED TO BE GIVEN TO YOU BY THE COURT¹

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The Defendant's Motion for Summary Judgment seeks to have your case dismissed. A motion for summary judgment under Rule 56 of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure will, if granted, end your case.

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Rule 56 tells you what you must do in order to oppose a motion for summary judgment. Generally, summary judgment must be granted when there is no genuine issue of material fact – that is, if there is no real dispute about any fact that would affect the result of your case, the party who asked for summary judgment is entitled to judgment as a matter

1 of law, which will end your case. When a party you are suing makes a motion for summary
2 judgment that is properly supported by declarations (or other sworn testimony), you cannot
3 simply rely on what your complaint says. Instead, you must set out specific facts in
4 declarations, depositions, answers to interrogatories, or authenticated documents, as provided
5 in Rule 56(e), that contradict the facts shown in the Defendant's declarations and documents
6 and show that there is a genuine issue of material fact for trial. If you do not submit your
7 own evidence in opposition, summary judgment, if appropriate, may be entered against you.
8 If summary judgment is granted, your case will be dismissed and there will be no trial.

9 Rule 56.1(b) of the Local Rules of Civil Procedure also requires that you include with
10 your response to the Motion for Summary Judgment a separate statement of facts in
11 opposition to the Motion for Summary Judgment. Your separate statement of facts must
12 include numbered paragraphs corresponding to the Defendant's ("moving party's") separate
13 statement of facts:

14 (b) Any party opposing a motion for summary judgment shall file a
15 statement, separate from that party's memorandum of law, setting forth: (1) for
16 each paragraph of the moving party's separate statement of facts, a
17 correspondingly numbered paragraph indicating whether the party disputes the
18 statement of fact set forth in that paragraph and a reference to the specific
19 admissible portion of the record supporting the party's position [for example,
20 affidavit, deposition, discovery response, etc.] if the fact is disputed; and
21 (2) any additional facts that establish a genuine issue of material fact or
22 otherwise preclude judgment in favor of the moving party. Each additional
23 fact shall be set forth in a separately numbered paragraph and shall refer to a
24 specific admissible portion of the record where the fact finds support. Each
25 numbered paragraph of the statement of facts set forth in the moving party's
26 separate statement of facts shall, unless otherwise ordered, be deemed admitted
27 for purposes of the motion for summary judgment if not specifically
28 controverted by a correspondingly numbered paragraph in the opposing party's
separate statement of facts.

LRCiv 56.1(b). You must also cite to the specific paragraph in your statement of facts that
supports any factual claims you make in your memorandum of law:

(e) Memoranda of law filed in support of or in opposition to a motion
for summary judgment, including reply memoranda, shall include citations to
the specific paragraph in the statement of facts that supports factual assertions
made in the memoranda.

LR.Civ 56.1(e).

Additionally, Rule 7.2(e) of the Local Rules of Civil Procedure provides:

1 Unless otherwise permitted by the Court, a motion including its supporting
2 memorandum, and the response including its supporting memorandum, each
3 shall not exceed seventeen (17) pages, exclusive of attachments and any
4 required statement of facts. Unless otherwise permitted by the Court, a reply
including its supporting memorandum shall not exceed eleven (11) pages,
exclusive of attachments. Attachments shall exclude materials extraneous to
genuine issues of material fact or law.

5 LRCiv 7.2(e). Finally, Rule 7.2(I) of the Local Rules of Civil Procedure provides:

6 If a motion does not conform in all substantial respects with the requirements
7 of this Local Rule, or if the unrepresented party or counsel does not serve and
8 file the required answering memoranda, or if the unrepresented party or
9 counsel fails to appear at the time and place assigned for oral argument, such
non-compliance may be deemed a consent to the denial or granting of the
motion and the Court may dispose of the motion summarily.


11 You must timely respond to all motions. The Court may, in its discretion, treat your
12 failure to respond to Defendant's Motion for Summary Judgment as a consent to the granting
13 of that Motion without further notice, and judgment may be entered dismissing this action
14 with prejudice pursuant to Rule 7.2(I) of the Local Rules of Civil Procedure. See Brydges
15 v. Lewis, 18 F.3d 651 (9th Cir. 1994) (*per curiam*).

16 **IT IS ORDERED** that, in light of the foregoing, Plaintiff may file a supplemental
17 response to Defendant's Motion for Summary Judgment (Dkt.#92), together with a separate
18 Statement of Facts and supporting affidavits or other appropriate exhibits, no later than
19 September 11, 2009.

20 **IT IS FURTHER ORDERED** that Defendant may file a supplemental reply within
21 7 days after service of Plaintiff's response.

22 **IT IS FURTHER ORDERED** that the Motion for Summary Judgment will be
23 deemed ready for decision without oral argument on the day following the date set for filing
24 a reply unless otherwise ordered by the Court.
