**ORDER**

Plaintiff Robert Esclon-Stephen Bell, who is confined in the Maricopa County Lower Buckeye Jail, has filed a *pro se* civil rights Complaint pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 and an Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis*. The Court will dismiss the Complaint with leave to amend.

**I. Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* and Filing Fee**

Plaintiff’s Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* will be granted. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(a). Plaintiff must pay the statutory filing fee of \$350.00. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(b)(1). The Court will assess an initial partial filing fee of \$65.70. The remainder of the fee will be collected monthly in payments of 20% of the previous month’s income each time the amount in the account exceeds \$10.00. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(b)(2). The Court will enter a separate Order requiring the appropriate government agency to collect and forward the fees according to the statutory formula.

**II. Statutory Screening of Prisoner Complaints**

The Court is required to screen complaints brought by prisoners seeking relief against

1 a governmental entity or an officer or an employee of a governmental entity. 28 U.S.C.  
2 § 1915A(a). The Court must dismiss a complaint or portion thereof if a plaintiff has raised  
3 claims that are legally frivolous or malicious, that fail to state a claim upon which relief may  
4 be granted, or that seek monetary relief from a defendant who is immune from such relief.  
5 28 U.S.C. § 1915A(b)(1), (2).

6 A pleading must contain a “short and plain statement of the claim *showing* that the  
7 pleader is entitled to relief.” Fed. R. Civ. P. 8(a)(2) (emphasis added). While Rule 8 does not  
8 demand detailed factual allegations, “it demands more than an unadorned, the-defendant-  
9 unlawfully-harmed-me accusation.” Ashcroft v. Iqbal, 129 S. Ct. 1937, 1949 (2009).  
10 “Threadbare recitals of the elements of a cause of action, supported by mere conclusory  
11 statements, do not suffice.” Id.

12 “[A] complaint must contain sufficient factual matter, accepted as true, to ‘state a  
13 claim to relief that is plausible on its face.’” Id. (quoting Bell Atlantic Corp. v. Twombly,  
14 550 U.S. 544, 570 (2007)). A claim is plausible “when the plaintiff pleads factual content  
15 that allows the court to draw the reasonable inference that the defendant is liable for the  
16 misconduct alleged.” Id. “Determining whether a complaint states a plausible claim for  
17 relief [is] . . . a context-specific task that requires the reviewing court to draw on its judicial  
18 experience and common sense.” Id. at 1950. Thus, although a plaintiff’s specific factual  
19 allegations may be consistent with a constitutional claim, a court must assess whether there  
20 are other “more likely explanations” for a defendant’s conduct. Id. at 1951.

21 But as the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit has instructed, courts  
22 must “continue to construe *pro se* filings liberally.” Hebbe v. Pliler, 627 F.3d 338, 342 (9th  
23 Cir. 2010). A “complaint [filed by a *pro se* prisoner] ‘must be held to less stringent standards  
24 than formal pleadings drafted by lawyers.’” Id. (quoting Erickson v. Pardus, 551 U.S. 89,  
25 94 (2007) (*per curiam*)).

26 If the Court determines that a pleading could be cured by the allegation of other facts,  
27 a *pro se* litigant is entitled to an opportunity to amend a complaint before dismissal of the  
28 action. See Lopez v. Smith, 203 F.3d 1122, 1127-29 (9th Cir. 2000) (*en banc*). The Court

1 should not, however, advise the litigant how to cure the defects. This type of advice “would  
2 undermine district judges’ role as impartial decisionmakers.” Pliler v. Ford, 542 U.S. 225,  
3 231 (2004); see also Lopez, 203 F.3d at 1131 n.13 (declining to decide whether the court was  
4 required to inform a litigant of deficiencies). The Court will dismiss Plaintiff’s Complaint  
5 for failure to state a claim, but because the Complaint may possibly be saved by amendment,  
6 will dismiss the Complaint with leave to amend.

### 7 **III. Complaint**

8 Plaintiff sues Maricopa County Sheriff Joseph M. Arpaio and Detention Officers  
9 A753b, B 1486, and B8493.

10 Plaintiff raises three claims for relief in the Complaint:

- 11 (1) Plaintiff was attacked by a detention officer;
- 12 (2) Plaintiff’s mail was rejected without cause; and
- 13 (3) Defendants retaliated against Plaintiff by searching his cell.

14 Plaintiff seeks money damages.

### 15 **IV. Failure to State a Claim**

#### 16 **A. Constitutional Violation**

17 Section 1983 provides a cause of action against persons acting under color of state law  
18 who have violated rights guaranteed by the United States Constitution and federal law. 42  
19 U.S.C. § 1983; see also Buckley v. City of Redding, 66 F.3d 188, 190 (9th Cir. 1995).  
20 Plaintiff has failed to allege any constitutional or federal-law violations. The Court will  
21 therefore dismiss without prejudice Plaintiff’s Complaint because it fails to state a claim.

#### 22 **B. Defendant Arpaio**

23 To state a valid claim under § 1983, plaintiffs must allege that they suffered a specific  
24 injury as a result of specific conduct of a defendant and show an affirmative link between the  
25 injury and the conduct of that defendant. See Rizzo v. Goode, 423 U.S. 362, 371-72, 377  
26 (1976). There is no *respondeat superior* liability under § 1983, and therefore, a defendant’s  
27 position as the supervisor of persons who allegedly violated Plaintiff’s constitutional rights  
28 does not impose liability. Monell v. New York City Department of Social Services, 436 U.S.

1 658, 691-92 (1978); Hamilton v. Endell, 981 F.2d 1062, 1067 (9th Cir. 1992); Taylor v. List,  
2 880 F.2d 1040, 1045 (9th Cir. 1989). “Because vicarious liability is inapplicable to Bivens  
3 and § 1983 suits, a plaintiff must plead that each Government-official defendant, through the  
4 official’s own individual actions, has violated the Constitution.” Iqbal, 129 S. Ct. at 1948.

5 Plaintiff has not alleged that Defendant Arpaio personally participated in a deprivation  
6 of Plaintiff’s constitutional rights, was aware of a deprivation and failed to act, or formed  
7 policies that resulted in Plaintiff’s injuries. The Court will therefore dismiss without  
8 prejudice Defendant Arpaio.

9 **C. Individual Claims**

10 **1. Count I-Excessive Force**

11 Plaintiff should note that the Fourteenth Amendment Due Process clause protects  
12 pretrial detainees from excessive force that amounts to punishment. Gibson v. County of  
13 Washoe, 290 F.3d 1175, 1197 (9th Cir. 2002). “[T]he Fourth Amendment sets ‘the  
14 applicable constitutional limitations’ for considering claims of excessive force during pretrial  
15 detention.” Id. (quoting Pierce v. Multnomah County, 76 F.3d 1032, 1043 (9th Cir. 1996)).

16 The Fourth Amendment does not prohibit the use of reasonable force. Tatum v. City  
17 & County of San Francisco, 441 F.3d 1090, 1095 (9th Cir. 2006). Whether the force was  
18 excessive depends on “whether the officers’ actions [were] ‘objectively reasonable’ in light  
19 of the facts and circumstances confronting them, without regard to their underlying intent or  
20 motivation.” Graham v. Connor, 490 U.S. 386, 397 (1989); Tatum, 441 F.3d at 1095; Lolli  
21 v. County of Orange, 351 F.3d 410, 415 (9th Cir. 2003). The Court must balance the nature  
22 and quality of the intrusion against the countervailing governmental interests at stake.  
23 Graham, 490 U.S. at 396; Lolli, 351 F.3d at 415. Moreover,

24 [t]he “reasonableness” of a particular use of force must be  
25 judged from the perspective of a reasonable officer on the scene,  
26 rather than with the 20/20 vision of hindsight. . . . “Not every  
push or shove, even if it may later seem unnecessary in the  
peace of a judge’s chambers,” violates the Fourth Amendment.

27 Graham, 490 U.S. at 396 (citations omitted). “Whether a particular use of force was  
28 ‘objectively reasonable’ depends on several factors, including the severity of the crime that

1 prompted the use of force, the threat posed by a suspect to the police or to others, and  
2 whether the suspect was resisting arrest.” Tatum, 441 F.3d at 1095.

3 Plaintiff has not alleged facts describing all of the circumstances surrounding the use  
4 of force or why the use of force was unreasonable.

### 5 **2. Count II-Mail**

6 Plaintiff has failed to link rejection of his mail with any of the named Defendants and  
7 has therefore failed to state a claim in Count II.

### 8 **3. Count III-Retaliatio**

9 A viable claim of First Amendment retaliation contains five basic elements: (1) an  
10 assertion that a state actor took some adverse action against an inmate (2) because of (3) that  
11 prisoner’s protected conduct, and that such action (4) chilled the inmate’s exercise of his First  
12 Amendment rights (or that the inmate suffered more than minimal harm) and (5) did not  
13 reasonably advance a legitimate correctional goal. Rhodes v. Robinson, 408 F.3d 559, 567-  
14 68 (9th Cir. 2005); see also Hines v. Gomez, 108 F.3d 265, 267 (9th Cir. 1997) (retaliation  
15 claims requires an inmate to show (1) that the prison official acted in retaliation for the  
16 exercise of a constitutionally protected right, and (2) that the action “advanced no legitimate  
17 penological interest”). The plaintiff has the burden of demonstrating that his exercise of his  
18 First Amendment rights was a substantial or motivating factor behind the defendants’  
19 conduct. Mt. Healthy City School Dist. Bd. of Educ. v. Doyle, 429 U.S. 274, 287 (1977);  
20 Soranno’s Gasco, Inc. v. Morgan, 874 F.2d 1310, 1314 (9th Cir. 1989).

21 In Count III, Plaintiff states that he filed a grievance and three days later a detention  
22 officer searched his cell. The officer told Plaintiff that he was instructed to look for a razor,  
23 told Plaintiff that he was going to write Plaintiff up, and the later told Plaintiff he was joking.  
24 Plaintiff has not shown that the search of his cell “advanced no legitimate penological  
25 interest.” To the contrary, Plaintiff’s facts show that his cell was searched for the purpose  
26 of finding contraband. Plaintiff has failed to state a claim in Count III.

### 27 **V. Leave to Amend**

28 For the foregoing reasons, Plaintiff’s Complaint will be dismissed for failure to state

1 a claim upon which relief may be granted. Within 30 days, Plaintiff may submit a first  
2 amended complaint to cure the deficiencies outlined above. The Clerk of Court will mail  
3 Plaintiff a court-approved form to use for filing a first amended complaint. If Plaintiff fails  
4 to use the court-approved form, the Court may strike the amended complaint and dismiss this  
5 action without further notice to Plaintiff.

6 If Plaintiff files an amended complaint, Plaintiff must write short, plain statements  
7 telling the Court: (1) the constitutional right Plaintiff believes was violated; (2) the name of  
8 the Defendant who violated the right; (3) exactly what that Defendant did or failed to do;  
9 (4) how the action or inaction of that Defendant is connected to the violation of Plaintiff's  
10 constitutional right; and (5) what specific injury Plaintiff suffered because of that  
11 Defendant's conduct. See Rizzo, 423 U.S. at 371-72, 377.

12 Plaintiff must repeat this process for each person he names as a Defendant. If Plaintiff  
13 fails to affirmatively link the conduct of each named Defendant with the specific injury  
14 suffered by Plaintiff, the allegations against that Defendant will be dismissed for failure to  
15 state a claim. **Conclusory allegations that a Defendant or group of Defendants have  
16 violated a constitutional right are not acceptable and will be dismissed.**

17 Plaintiff must clearly designate on the face of the document that it is the "First  
18 Amended Complaint." The first amended complaint must be retyped or rewritten in its  
19 entirety on the court-approved form and may not incorporate any part of the original  
20 Complaint by reference. Plaintiff may include only one claim per count.

21 A first amended complaint supersedes the original complaint. Ferdik v. Bonzelet, 963  
22 F.2d 1258, 1262 (9th Cir. 1992); Hal Roach Studios v. Richard Feiner & Co., 896 F.2d 1542,  
23 1546 (9th Cir. 1990). After amendment, the Court will treat an original complaint as  
24 nonexistent. Ferdik, 963 F.2d at 1262. Any cause of action that was raised in the original  
25 complaint is waived if it is not raised in a first amended complaint. King v. Atiyeh, 814 F.2d  
26 565, 567 (9th Cir. 1987).

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1 **VI. Warnings**

2 **A. Release**

3 Plaintiff must pay the unpaid balance of the filing fee within 120 days of his release.  
4 Also, within 30 days of his release, he must either (1) notify the Court that he intends to pay  
5 the balance or (2) show good cause, in writing, why he cannot. Failure to comply may result  
6 in dismissal of this action.

7 **B. Address Changes**

8 Plaintiff must file and serve a notice of a change of address in accordance with Rule  
9 83.3(d) of the Local Rules of Civil Procedure. Plaintiff must not include a motion for other  
10 relief with a notice of change of address. Failure to comply may result in dismissal of this  
11 action.

12 **C. Copies**

13 Plaintiff must submit an additional copy of every filing for use by the Court. See  
14 LRCiv 5.4. Failure to comply may result in the filing being stricken without further notice  
15 to Plaintiff.

16 **D. Possible “Strike”**

17 Because the Complaint has been dismissed for failure to state a claim, if Plaintiff fails  
18 to file an amended complaint correcting the deficiencies identified in this Order, the  
19 dismissal may count as a “strike” under the “3-strikes” provision of 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).  
20 Under the 3-strikes provision, a prisoner may not bring a civil action or appeal a civil  
21 judgment *in forma pauperis* under 28 U.S.C. § 1915 “if the prisoner has, on 3 or more prior  
22 occasions, while incarcerated or detained in any facility, brought an action or appeal in a  
23 court of the United States that was dismissed on the grounds that it is frivolous, malicious,  
24 or fails to state a claim upon which relief may be granted, unless the prisoner is under  
25 imminent danger of serious physical injury.” 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

26 **E. Possible Dismissal**

27 If Plaintiff fails to timely comply with every provision of this Order, including these  
28 warnings, the Court may dismiss this action without further notice. See Ferdik, 963 F.2d at

1 1260-61 (a district court may dismiss an action for failure to comply with any order of the  
2 Court).

3 **IT IS ORDERED:**

4 (1) Plaintiff's Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* (Doc. 3) is **granted**.

5 (2) As required by the accompanying Order to the appropriate government agency,  
6 Plaintiff must pay the \$350.00 filing fee and is assessed an initial partial filing fee of \$65.70.

7 (3) The Complaint (Doc. 1) is **dismissed** for failure to state a claim. Plaintiff has  
8 **30 days** from the date this Order is filed to file a first amended complaint in compliance with  
9 this Order.

10 (4) If Plaintiff fails to file an amended complaint within 30 days, the Clerk of  
11 Court must, without further notice, enter a judgment of dismissal of this action with prejudice  
12 that states that the dismissal may count as a "strike" under 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

13 (5) The Clerk of Court must mail Plaintiff a court-approved form for filing a civil  
14 rights complaint by a prisoner.

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**Instructions for a Prisoner Filing a Civil Rights Complaint  
in the United States District Court for the District of Arizona**

1. Who May Use This Form. The civil rights complaint form is designed to help incarcerated persons prepare a complaint seeking relief for a violation of their federal civil rights. These complaints typically concern, but are not limited to, conditions of confinement. **This form should not be used to challenge your conviction or sentence.** If you want to challenge a state conviction or sentence, you should file a petition under 28 U.S.C. § 2254 for a writ of habeas corpus by a person in state custody. If you want to challenge a federal conviction or sentence, you should file a motion under 28 U.S.C. § 2255 to vacate sentence in the federal court that entered the judgment.
  
2. The Form. **Local Rule of Civil Procedure (LRCiv) 3.4(a) provides that complaints by incarcerated persons must be filed on the court-approved form.** The form must be typed or neatly handwritten. The form must be completely filled in to the extent applicable. All questions must be answered clearly and concisely in the appropriate space on the form. If needed, you may attach additional pages, **but no more than fifteen additional pages**, of standard letter-sized paper. You must identify which part of the complaint is being continued and number all pages. If you do not fill out the form properly, you will be asked to submit additional or corrected information, which may delay the processing of your action. You do not need to cite law.
  
3. Your Signature. You must tell the truth and sign the form. If you make a false statement of a material fact, you may be prosecuted for perjury.
  
4. The Filing Fee. The filing fee for this action is \$350.00. If you are unable to immediately pay the filing fee, you may request leave to proceed *in forma pauperis*. Please review the “Information for Prisoners Seeking Leave to Proceed with a (Non-Habeas) Civil Action in Federal Court *In Forma Pauperis* Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1915” for additional instructions.
  
5. Original and Judge’s Copy. You must send an **original plus one copy** of your complaint and of any other documents submitted to the Court. You must send one additional copy to the Court if you wish to have a file-stamped copy of the document returned to you. All copies must be identical to the original. Copies may be legibly handwritten.
  
6. Where to File. You should file your complaint in the division **where you were confined when your rights were allegedly violated.** See LRCiv 5.1(a) and 77.1(a). If you were confined in Maricopa, Pinal, Yuma, La Paz, or Gila County, file in the Phoenix Division. If you were confined in Apache, Navajo, Coconino, Mohave, or Yavapai County, file in the Prescott Division. If you were confined in Pima, Cochise, Santa Cruz, Graham, or Greenlee County, file in the Tucson Division. **Mail the original and one copy of the complaint with the \$350 filing fee or the application to proceed *in forma pauperis* to:**

7. Change of Address. You must immediately notify the Court and the defendants in writing of any change in your mailing address. **Failure to notify the Court of any change in your mailing address may result in the dismissal of your case.**

8. Certificate of Service. You must furnish the defendants with a copy of any document you submit to the Court (except the initial complaint and application to proceed *in forma pauperis*). Each original document (except the initial complaint and application to proceed *in forma pauperis*) must include a certificate of service on the last page of the document stating the date a copy of the document was mailed to the defendants and the address to which it was mailed. See Fed. R. Civ. P. 5(a), (d). Any document received by the Court that does not include a certificate of service may be stricken. A certificate of service should be in the following form:

9. Amended Complaint. If you need to change any of the information in the initial complaint, you must file an amended complaint. The amended complaint must be written on the court-approved civil rights complaint form. You may file one amended complaint without leave (permission) of Court before any defendant has answered your original complaint. See Fed. R. Civ. P. 15(a). After any defendant has filed an answer, you must file a motion for leave to amend and lodge (submit) a proposed amended complaint. LRCiv 15.1. In addition, an amended complaint may not incorporate by reference any part of your prior complaint. LRCiv 15.1(a)(2). **Any allegations or defendants not included in the amended complaint are considered dismissed.** All amended complaints are subject to screening under the Prison Litigation Reform Act; screening your amendment will take additional processing time.

10. Exhibits. You should not submit exhibits with the complaint or amended complaint. Instead, the relevant information should be paraphrased. You should keep the exhibits to use to support or oppose a motion to dismiss, a motion for summary judgment, or at trial.

11. Letters and Motions. It is generally inappropriate to write a letter to any judge or the staff of any judge. The only appropriate way to communicate with the Court is by filing a written pleading or motion.

## 12. Completing the Civil Rights Complaint Form.

### **HEADING:**

1. Your Name. Print your name, prison or inmate number, and institutional mailing address on the lines provided.
2. Defendants. If there are **four or fewer** defendants, print the name of each. If you name **more than four** defendants, print the name of the first defendant on the first line, write the words “and others” on the second line, and attach an additional page listing the names of **all** of the defendants. Insert the additional page after page 1 and number it “1-A” at the bottom.
3. Jury Demand. If you want a jury trial, you must write “JURY TRIAL DEMANDED” in the space below “CIVIL RIGHTS COMPLAINT BY A PRISONER.” Failure to do so may result in the loss of the right to a jury trial. A jury trial is not available if you are seeking only injunctive relief.

### **Part A. JURISDICTION:**

1. Nature of Suit. Mark whether you are filing the complaint pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 for state, county, or city defendants; “Bivens v. Six Unknown Federal Narcotics Agents” for federal defendants; or “other.” If you mark “other,” identify the source of that authority.
2. Location. Identify the institution and city where the alleged violation of your rights occurred.
3. Defendants. Print all of the requested information about each of the defendants in the spaces provided. If you are naming more than four defendants, you must provide the necessary information about each additional defendant on separate pages labeled “2-A,” “2-B,” etc., at the bottom. Insert the additional page(s) immediately behind page 2.

### **Part B. PREVIOUS LAWSUITS:**

You must identify any other lawsuit you have filed in either state or federal court while you were a prisoner. Print all of the requested information about each lawsuit in the spaces provided. If you have filed more than three lawsuits, you must provide the necessary information about each additional lawsuit on a separate page. Label the page(s) as “2-A,” “2-B,” etc., at the bottom of the page and insert the additional page(s) immediately behind page 2.

### **Part C. CAUSE OF ACTION:**

You must identify what rights each defendant violated. The form provides space to allege three separate counts (**one violation per count**). If you are alleging more than three counts, you must provide the necessary information about each additional count on a separate page. Number the additional pages “5-A,” “5-B,” etc., and insert them immediately behind page 5. Remember that you are limited to a total of fifteen additional pages.

1. Counts. You must identify which civil right was violated. **You may allege the violation of only one civil right per count.**

2. Issue Involved. Check the box that most closely identifies the issue involved in your claim. **You may check only one box per count.** If you check the box marked “Other,” you must identify the specific issue involved.

3. Supporting Facts. After you have identified which civil right was violated, you must state the supporting facts. Be as specific as possible. You must state what each individual defendant did to violate your rights. If there is more than one defendant, you must identify which defendant did what act. You also should state the date(s) on which the act(s) occurred, if possible.

4. Injury. State precisely how you were injured by the alleged violation of your rights.

5. Administrative Remedies. You must exhaust any available administrative remedies before you file a civil rights complaint. See 42 U.S.C. § 1997e. Consequently, you should disclose whether you have exhausted the inmate grievance procedures or administrative appeals for each count in your complaint. If the grievance procedures were not available for any of your counts, fully explain why on the lines provided.

**Part D. REQUEST FOR RELIEF:**

Print the relief you are seeking in the space provided.

**SIGNATURE:**

You must sign your name and print the date you signed the complaint. Failure to sign the complaint will delay the processing of your action. Unless you are an attorney, you may not bring an action on behalf of anyone but yourself.

**FINAL NOTE**

You should follow these instructions carefully. Failure to do so may result in your complaint being stricken or dismissed. All questions must be answered concisely in the proper space on the form. If you need more space, you may attach no more than fifteen additional pages. But the form must be completely filled in to the extent applicable. If you attach additional pages, be sure to identify which section of the complaint is being continued and number the pages.
