On March 22, 2012, Plaintiff Mekkah Khan-Allah, who is confined in the Arizona State Prison Complex-Lewis, filed a *pro se* civil rights Complaint pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 and an Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis*. On April 11, 2012, Plaintiff filed a First Amended Complaint. In a May 1, 2012 Order, the Court granted the Application to Proceed and dismissed the First Amended Complaint because Plaintiff failed to allege a jurisdictional basis. The Court gave Plaintiff 30 days to file a second amended complaint that cured the deficiencies identified in the Order.

On May 15, 2012, Plaintiff filed a Second Amended Complaint (Doc. 9). The Court will dismiss the Second Amended Complaint with leave to amend.

I. Statutory Screening of Prisoner Complaints

The Court is required to screen complaints brought by prisoners seeking relief against a governmental entity or an officer or an employee of a governmental entity. 28 U.S.C. § 1915A(a). The Court must dismiss a complaint or portion thereof if a plaintiff has raised claims that are legally frivolous or malicious, that fail to state a claim upon which relief may

1 be granted, or that seek monetary relief from a defendant who is immune from such relief.
2 28 U.S.C. § 1915A(b)(1), (2).

3 A pleading must contain a “short and plain statement of the claim *showing* that the
4 pleader is entitled to relief.” Fed. R. Civ. P. 8(a)(2) (emphasis added). While Rule 8 does not
5 demand detailed factual allegations, “it demands more than an unadorned, the-defendant-
6 unlawfully-harmed-me accusation.” Ashcroft v. Iqbal, 129 S. Ct. 1937, 1949 (2009).
7 “Threadbare recitals of the elements of a cause of action, supported by mere conclusory
8 statements, do not suffice.” Id.

9 “[A] complaint must contain sufficient factual matter, accepted as true, to ‘state a
10 claim to relief that is plausible on its face.’” Id. (quoting Bell Atlantic Corp. v. Twombly,
11 550 U.S. 544, 570 (2007)). A claim is plausible “when the plaintiff pleads factual content
12 that allows the court to draw the reasonable inference that the defendant is liable for the
13 misconduct alleged.” Id. “Determining whether a complaint states a plausible claim for
14 relief [is] . . . a context-specific task that requires the reviewing court to draw on its judicial
15 experience and common sense.” Id. at 1950. Thus, although a plaintiff’s specific factual
16 allegations may be consistent with a constitutional claim, a court must assess whether there
17 are other “more likely explanations” for a defendant’s conduct. Id. at 1951.

18 But as the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit has instructed, courts
19 must “continue to construe *pro se* filings liberally.” Hebbe v. Pliler, 627 F.3d 338, 342 (9th
20 Cir. 2010). A “complaint [filed by a *pro se* prisoner] ‘must be held to less stringent standards
21 than formal pleadings drafted by lawyers.’” Id. (quoting Erickson v. Pardus, 551 U.S. 89,
22 94 (2007) (*per curiam*)).

23 If the Court determines that a pleading could be cured by the allegation of other facts,
24 a *pro se* litigant is entitled to an opportunity to amend a complaint before dismissal of the
25 action. See Lopez v. Smith, 203 F.3d 1122, 1127-29 (9th Cir. 2000) (*en banc*). The Court
26 should not, however, advise the litigant how to cure the defects. This type of advice “would
27 undermine district judges’ role as impartial decisionmakers.” Pliler v. Ford, 542 U.S. 225,
28 231 (2004); see also Lopez, 203 F.3d at 1131 n.13 (declining to decide whether the court was

1 required to inform a litigant of deficiencies). The Court will dismiss Plaintiff’s Second
2 Amended Complaint for failure to state a claim, but because the Second Amended Complaint
3 may possibly be saved by amendment, will dismiss the Second Amended Complaint with
4 leave to amend.

5 **II. Second Amended Complaint**

6 In his three-count Second Amended Complaint, Plaintiff sues the following
7 Defendants: Arizona Department of Corrections Director Charles L. Ryan, Interim Division
8 Director of Health Services Richard Pratt, Medical Director Michal Adu-tutu, and Facility
9 Health Administrator Matthew A. Musson .

10 In Count I, Plaintiff claims that his Eighth Amendment rights were violated when he
11 was denied adequate medical care after another inmate attacked him. Plaintiff states that he
12 was kicked in the chest and lower back and that, although he informed nurses he was in
13 extreme pain, was only given ice packs and ibuprofen. Plaintiff states that he submitted
14 several Health Needs Requests, but did not receive x-rays until almost two months after the
15 incident, at which time it was discovered that Plaintiff suffered from a fractured rib. Plaintiff
16 states that Defendant Musson did not properly investigate his grievances and that Defendant
17 Musson works for Defendants Adu-tutu, Pratt, and Ryan.

18 In Count II, Plaintiff claims that his Eighth Amendment rights were violated when he
19 was denied soap, shampoo, a wash cloth, towel, and shower shoes for approximately one
20 month. Plaintiff claims that Defendants Ryan and Pratt allowed corrections officers to
21 “abuse [Plaintiff] with deliberate indifference.”

22 In Count III, Plaintiff claims that his Eighth Amendment rights were violated by
23 Defendants’ failure to adequately respond after he was attacked by another inmate. Plaintiff
24 states that he is mentally ill and the attack aggravated his illness. Plaintiff claims that “under
25 the administration of Director Charles L. Ryan, Interim Division Director . . . Pratt, Medical
26 Director Michal Adu-tutu and Facility Health Administrator Matthew L. Musson, . . .
27 [Plaintiff is] mistreated and not properly cared for by mental health staff.”

28 Plaintiff seeks money damages.

1 **III. Failure to State a Claim**

2 **A. Defendants**

3 To state a valid claim under § 1983, plaintiffs must allege that they suffered a specific
4 injury as a result of specific conduct of a defendant and show an affirmative link between the
5 injury and the conduct of that defendant. See Rizzo v. Goode, 423 U.S. 362, 371-72, 377
6 (1976). There is no *respondeat superior* liability under § 1983, and therefore, a defendant’s
7 position as the supervisor of persons who allegedly violated Plaintiff’s constitutional rights
8 does not impose liability. Monell v. New York City Department of Social Services, 436 U.S.
9 658, 691-92 (1978); Hamilton v. Endell, 981 F.2d 1062, 1067 (9th Cir. 1992); Taylor v. List,
10 880 F.2d 1040, 1045 (9th Cir. 1989). “Because vicarious liability is inapplicable to Bivens
11 and § 1983 suits, a plaintiff must plead that each Government-official defendant, through the
12 official’s own individual actions, has violated the Constitution.” Iqbal, 129 S. Ct. at 1948.

13 Plaintiff has not alleged that Defendants Ryan, Pratt, Adu-tutu or Musson personally
14 participated in a deprivation of Plaintiff’s constitutional rights, were aware of a deprivation
15 and failed to act, or formed policies that resulted in Plaintiff’s injuries. Plaintiff has therefore
16 failed to state a claim against these Defendants.

17 With respect to Plaintiff’s claim that Defendant Musson failed to investigate his
18 grievance, he has also failed to state a claim. Where a defendant’s only involvement in the
19 allegedly unconstitutional conduct is the denial of administrative grievances, the failure to
20 intervene on a prisoner’s behalf to remedy alleged unconstitutional behavior does not amount
21 to active unconstitutional behavior for purposes of § 1983. Shehee v. Luttrell, 199 F.3d 295,
22 300 (6th Cir. 1999).

23 **B. Eighth Amendment Claims**

24 Not every claim by a prisoner relating to inadequate medical treatment states a
25 violation of the Eighth or Fourteenth Amendment. To state a § 1983 medical claim, a
26 plaintiff must show that the defendants acted with “deliberate indifference to serious medical
27 needs.” Jett v. Penner, 439 F.3d 1091, 1096 (9th Cir. 2006) (quoting Estelle v. Gamble, 429
28 U.S. 97, 104 (1976)). A plaintiff must show (1) a “serious medical need” by demonstrating

1 that failure to treat the condition could result in further significant injury or the unnecessary
2 and wanton infliction of pain and (2) the defendant's response was deliberately indifferent.
3 Jett, 439 F.3d at 1096 (quotations omitted).

4 "Deliberate indifference is a high legal standard." Toguchi v. Chung, 391 F.3d 1051,
5 1060 (9th Cir. 2004). To act with deliberate indifference, a prison official must both know
6 of and disregard an excessive risk to inmate health; "the official must both be aware of facts
7 from which the inference could be drawn that a substantial risk of serious harm exists, and
8 he must also draw the inference." Farmer v. Brennan, 511 U.S. 825, 837 (1994). Deliberate
9 indifference in the medical context may be shown by a purposeful act or failure to respond
10 to a prisoner's pain or possible medical need and harm caused by the indifference. Jett, 439
11 F.3d at 1096. Deliberate indifference may also be shown when a prison official intentionally
12 denies, delays, or interferes with medical treatment or by the way prison doctors respond to
13 the prisoner's medical needs. Estelle, 429 U.S. at 104-05; Jett, 439 F.3d at 1096.

14 Deliberate indifference is a higher standard than negligence or lack of ordinary due
15 care for the prisoner's safety. Farmer, 511 U.S. at 835. "Neither negligence nor gross
16 negligence will constitute deliberate indifference." Clement v. California Dep't of
17 Corrections, 220 F. Supp. 2d 1098, 1105 (N.D. Cal. 2002); see also Broughton v. Cutter
18 Labs., 622 F.2d 458, 460 (9th Cir. 1980) (mere claims of "indifference," "negligence," or
19 "medical malpractice" do not support a claim under § 1983). "A difference of opinion does
20 not amount to deliberate indifference to [a plaintiff's] serious medical needs." Sanchez v.
21 Vild, 891 F.2d 240, 242 (9th Cir. 1989). A mere delay in medical care, without more, is
22 insufficient to state a claim against prison officials for deliberate indifference. See Shapley
23 v. Nevada Bd. of State Prison Comm'rs, 766 F.2d 404, 407 (9th Cir. 1985). The indifference
24 must be substantial. The action must rise to a level of "unnecessary and wanton infliction
25 of pain." Estelle, 429 U.S. at 105.

26 Plaintiff has not alleged facts sufficient to demonstrate that any of the named
27 Defendants acted with deliberate indifference to his serious medical needs. Plaintiff has
28 therefore failed to state a claim against the named Defendants.

1 **IV. Leave to Amend**

2 For the foregoing reasons, Plaintiff’s Second Amended Complaint will be dismissed
3 for failure to state a claim upon which relief may be granted. Within 30 days, Plaintiff may
4 submit a third amended complaint to cure the deficiencies outlined above. The Clerk of
5 Court will mail Plaintiff a court-approved form to use for filing a third amended complaint.
6 If Plaintiff fails to use the court-approved form, the Court may strike the third amended
7 complaint and dismiss this action without further notice to Plaintiff.

8 If Plaintiff files a third amended complaint, Plaintiff must write short, plain statements
9 telling the Court: (1) the constitutional right Plaintiff believes was violated; (2) the name of
10 the Defendant who violated the right; (3) exactly what that Defendant did or failed to do;
11 (4) how the action or inaction of that Defendant is connected to the violation of Plaintiff’s
12 constitutional right; and (5) what specific injury Plaintiff suffered because of that
13 Defendant’s conduct. See Rizzo, 423 U.S. at 371-72, 377.

14 Plaintiff must repeat this process for each person he names as a Defendant. If Plaintiff
15 fails to affirmatively link the conduct of each named Defendant with the specific injury
16 suffered by Plaintiff, the allegations against that Defendant will be dismissed for failure to
17 state a claim. **Conclusory allegations that a Defendant or group of Defendants have
18 violated a constitutional right are not acceptable and will be dismissed.**

19 Plaintiff must clearly designate on the face of the document that it is the “Third
20 Amended Complaint.” The third amended complaint must be retyped or rewritten in its
21 entirety on the court-approved form and may not incorporate any part of the original
22 Complaint or previously filed amended complaints by reference. Plaintiff may include only
23 one claim per count.

24 A third amended complaint supersedes the original Complaint and previously filed
25 Amended Complaints. Ferdik v. Bonzelet, 963 F.2d 1258, 1262 (9th Cir. 1992); Hal Roach
26 Studios v. Richard Feiner & Co., 896 F.2d 1542, 1546 (9th Cir. 1990). After amendment,
27 the Court will treat the original Complaint and previously filed Amended Complaints as
28 nonexistent. Ferdik, 963 F.2d at 1262. Any cause of action that was raised in the original

1 Complaint or previously filed Amended Complaints is waived if it is not raised in a third
2 amended complaint. King v. Atiyeh, 814 F.2d 565, 567 (9th Cir. 1987).

3 **V. Warnings**

4 **A. Release**

5 Plaintiff must pay the unpaid balance of the filing fee within 120 days of his release.
6 Also, within 30 days of his release, he must either (1) notify the Court that he intends to pay
7 the balance or (2) show good cause, in writing, why he cannot. Failure to comply may result
8 in dismissal of this action.

9 **B. Address Changes**

10 Plaintiff must file and serve a notice of a change of address in accordance with Rule
11 83.3(d) of the Local Rules of Civil Procedure. Plaintiff must not include a motion for other
12 relief with a notice of change of address. Failure to comply may result in dismissal of this
13 action.

14 **C. Copies**

15 Plaintiff must submit an additional copy of every filing for use by the Court. See
16 LRCiv 5.4. Failure to comply may result in the filing being stricken without further notice
17 to Plaintiff.

18 **D. Possible “Strike”**

19 Because the Second Amended Complaint has been dismissed for failure to state a
20 claim, if Plaintiff fails to file a third amended complaint correcting the deficiencies identified
21 in this Order, the dismissal may count as a “strike” under the “3-strikes” provision of 28
22 U.S.C. § 1915(g). Under the 3-strikes provision, a prisoner may not bring a civil action or
23 appeal a civil judgment *in forma pauperis* under 28 U.S.C. § 1915 “if the prisoner has, on
24 3 or more prior occasions, while incarcerated or detained in any facility, brought an action
25 or appeal in a court of the United States that was dismissed on the grounds that it is frivolous,
26 malicious, or fails to state a claim upon which relief may be granted, unless the prisoner is
27 under imminent danger of serious physical injury.” 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

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E. Possible Dismissal

If Plaintiff fails to timely comply with every provision of this Order, including these warnings, the Court may dismiss this action without further notice. See Ferdik, 963 F.2d at 1260-61 (a district court may dismiss an action for failure to comply with any order of the Court).


IT IS ORDERED:

(1) The Second Amended Complaint (Doc. 9) is **dismissed** for failure to state a claim. Plaintiff has **30 days** from the date this Order is filed to file a third amended complaint in compliance with this Order.

(2) If Plaintiff fails to file a third amended complaint within 30 days, the Clerk of Court must, without further notice, enter a judgment of dismissal of this action with prejudice that states that the dismissal may count as a “strike” under 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

(3) The Clerk of Court must mail Plaintiff a court-approved form for filing a civil rights complaint by a prisoner.

**Instructions for a Prisoner Filing a Civil Rights Complaint
in the United States District Court for the District of Arizona**

1. Who May Use This Form. The civil rights complaint form is designed to help incarcerated persons prepare a complaint seeking relief for a violation of their federal civil rights. These complaints typically concern, but are not limited to, conditions of confinement. **This form should not be used to challenge your conviction or sentence.** If you want to challenge a state conviction or sentence, you should file a petition under 28 U.S.C. § 2254 for a writ of habeas corpus by a person in state custody. If you want to challenge a federal conviction or sentence, you should file a motion under 28 U.S.C. § 2255 to vacate sentence in the federal court that entered the judgment.

2. The Form. **Local Rule of Civil Procedure (LRCiv) 3.4(a) provides that complaints by incarcerated persons must be filed on the court-approved form.** The form must be typed or neatly handwritten. The form must be completely filled in to the extent applicable. All questions must be answered clearly and concisely in the appropriate space on the form. If needed, you may attach additional pages, **but no more than fifteen additional pages**, of standard letter-sized paper. You must identify which part of the complaint is being continued and number all pages. If you do not fill out the form properly, you will be asked to submit additional or corrected information, which may delay the processing of your action. You do not need to cite law.

3. Your Signature. You must tell the truth and sign the form. If you make a false statement of a material fact, you may be prosecuted for perjury.

4. The Filing Fee. The filing fee for this action is \$350.00. If you are unable to immediately pay the filing fee, you may request leave to proceed *in forma pauperis*. Please review the “Information for Prisoners Seeking Leave to Proceed with a (Non-Habeas) Civil Action in Federal Court *In Forma Pauperis* Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1915” for additional instructions.

5. Original and Judge’s Copy. You must send an **original plus one copy** of your complaint and of any other documents submitted to the Court. You must send one additional copy to the Court if you wish to have a file-stamped copy of the document returned to you. All copies must be identical to the original. Copies may be legibly handwritten.

6. Where to File. You should file your complaint in the division **where you were confined when your rights were allegedly violated.** See LRCiv 5.1(a) and 77.1(a). If you were confined in Maricopa, Pinal, Yuma, La Paz, or Gila County, file in the Phoenix Division. If you were confined in Apache, Navajo, Coconino, Mohave, or Yavapai County, file in the Prescott Division. If you were confined in Pima, Cochise, Santa Cruz, Graham, or Greenlee County, file in the Tucson Division. **Mail the original and one copy of the complaint with the \$350 filing fee or the application to proceed *in forma pauperis* to:**

7. Change of Address. You must immediately notify the Court and the defendants in writing of any change in your mailing address. **Failure to notify the Court of any change in your mailing address may result in the dismissal of your case.**

8. Certificate of Service. You must furnish the defendants with a copy of any document you submit to the Court (except the initial complaint and application to proceed *in forma pauperis*). Each original document (except the initial complaint and application to proceed *in forma pauperis*) must include a certificate of service on the last page of the document stating the date a copy of the document was mailed to the defendants and the address to which it was mailed. See Fed. R. Civ. P. 5(a), (d). Any document received by the Court that does not include a certificate of service may be stricken. A certificate of service should be in the following form:

9. Amended Complaint. If you need to change any of the information in the initial complaint, you must file an amended complaint. The amended complaint must be written on the court-approved civil rights complaint form. You may file one amended complaint without leave (permission) of Court before any defendant has answered your original complaint. See Fed. R. Civ. P. 15(a). After any defendant has filed an answer, you must file a motion for leave to amend and lodge (submit) a proposed amended complaint. LRCiv 15.1. In addition, an amended complaint may not incorporate by reference any part of your prior complaint. LRCiv 15.1(a)(2). **Any allegations or defendants not included in the amended complaint are considered dismissed.** All amended complaints are subject to screening under the Prison Litigation Reform Act; screening your amendment will take additional processing time.

10. Exhibits. You should not submit exhibits with the complaint or amended complaint. Instead, the relevant information should be paraphrased. You should keep the exhibits to use to support or oppose a motion to dismiss, a motion for summary judgment, or at trial.

11. Letters and Motions. It is generally inappropriate to write a letter to any judge or the staff of any judge. The only appropriate way to communicate with the Court is by filing a written pleading or motion.

12. Completing the Civil Rights Complaint Form.

HEADING:

1. Your Name. Print your name, prison or inmate number, and institutional mailing address on the lines provided.
2. Defendants. If there are **four or fewer** defendants, print the name of each. If you name **more than four** defendants, print the name of the first defendant on the first line, write the words “and others” on the second line, and attach an additional page listing the names of **all** of the defendants. Insert the additional page after page 1 and number it “1-A” at the bottom.
3. Jury Demand. If you want a jury trial, you must write “JURY TRIAL DEMANDED” in the space below “CIVIL RIGHTS COMPLAINT BY A PRISONER.” Failure to do so may result in the loss of the right to a jury trial. A jury trial is not available if you are seeking only injunctive relief.

Part A. JURISDICTION:

1. Nature of Suit. Mark whether you are filing the complaint pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 for state, county, or city defendants; “Bivens v. Six Unknown Federal Narcotics Agents” for federal defendants; or “other.” If you mark “other,” identify the source of that authority.
2. Location. Identify the institution and city where the alleged violation of your rights occurred.
3. Defendants. Print all of the requested information about each of the defendants in the spaces provided. If you are naming more than four defendants, you must provide the necessary information about each additional defendant on separate pages labeled “2-A,” “2-B,” etc., at the bottom. Insert the additional page(s) immediately behind page 2.

Part B. PREVIOUS LAWSUITS:

You must identify any other lawsuit you have filed in either state or federal court while you were a prisoner. Print all of the requested information about each lawsuit in the spaces provided. If you have filed more than three lawsuits, you must provide the necessary information about each additional lawsuit on a separate page. Label the page(s) as “2-A,” “2-B,” etc., at the bottom of the page and insert the additional page(s) immediately behind page 2.

Part C. CAUSE OF ACTION:

You must identify what rights each defendant violated. The form provides space to allege three separate counts (**one violation per count**). If you are alleging more than three counts, you must provide the necessary information about each additional count on a separate page. Number the additional pages “5-A,” “5-B,” etc., and insert them immediately behind page 5. Remember that you are limited to a total of fifteen additional pages.

1. Counts. You must identify which civil right was violated. **You may allege the violation of only one civil right per count.**

2. Issue Involved. Check the box that most closely identifies the issue involved in your claim. **You may check only one box per count.** If you check the box marked “Other,” you must identify the specific issue involved.

3. Supporting Facts. After you have identified which civil right was violated, you must state the supporting facts. Be as specific as possible. You must state what each individual defendant did to violate your rights. If there is more than one defendant, you must identify which defendant did what act. You also should state the date(s) on which the act(s) occurred, if possible.

4. Injury. State precisely how you were injured by the alleged violation of your rights.

5. Administrative Remedies. You must exhaust any available administrative remedies before you file a civil rights complaint. See 42 U.S.C. § 1997e. Consequently, you should disclose whether you have exhausted the inmate grievance procedures or administrative appeals for each count in your complaint. If the grievance procedures were not available for any of your counts, fully explain why on the lines provided.

Part D. REQUEST FOR RELIEF:

Print the relief you are seeking in the space provided.

SIGNATURE:

You must sign your name and print the date you signed the complaint. Failure to sign the complaint will delay the processing of your action. Unless you are an attorney, you may not bring an action on behalf of anyone but yourself.

FINAL NOTE

You should follow these instructions carefully. Failure to do so may result in your complaint being stricken or dismissed. All questions must be answered concisely in the proper space on the form. If you need more space, you may attach no more than fifteen additional pages. But the form must be completely filled in to the extent applicable. If you attach additional pages, be sure to identify which section of the complaint is being continued and number the pages.
