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Plaintiff Joshua Erik Bowler, who is confined in the Arizona State Prison Complex-Eyman, Browning Unit, in Florence, Arizona, has filed a *pro se* civil rights Complaint pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983¹ and an Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis*. The Court will dismiss the Complaint with leave to amend.

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I. Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* and Filing Fee

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Plaintiff’s Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* will be granted. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(a). Plaintiff must pay the statutory filing fee of \$350.00. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(b)(1). The Court will not assess an initial partial filing fee. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(b)(1). The statutory fee will be collected monthly in payments of 20% of the previous month’s income each time the amount in the account exceeds \$10.00. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(b)(2). The Court will enter a separate Order requiring the appropriate government agency to collect and forward the fees

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¹ Although Plaintiff indicated that he sought relief under Bivens v. Six Unknown Named Agents of Federal Bureau of Narcotics, 403 U.S. 388 (1971), he seeks relief against persons acting under color of state law rather than persons acting under color of federal law. For that reason, the Court construes the Complaint as brought under 42 U.S.C. § 1983.

1 according to the statutory formula.

2 **II. Statutory Screening of Prisoner Complaints**

3 The Court is required to screen complaints brought by prisoners seeking relief against
4 a governmental entity or an officer or an employee of a governmental entity. 28 U.S.C.
5 § 1915A(a). The Court must dismiss a complaint or portion thereof if a plaintiff has raised
6 claims that are legally frivolous or malicious, that fail to state a claim upon which relief may
7 be granted, or that seek monetary relief from a defendant who is immune from such relief.
8 28 U.S.C. § 1915A(b)(1), (2).

9 A pleading must contain a “short and plain statement of the claim *showing* that the
10 pleader is entitled to relief.” Fed. R. Civ. P. 8(a)(2) (emphasis added). While Rule 8 does not
11 demand detailed factual allegations, “it demands more than an unadorned, the-defendant-
12 unlawfully-harmed-me accusation.” Ashcroft v. Iqbal, 129 S. Ct. 1937, 1949 (2009).
13 “Threadbare recitals of the elements of a cause of action, supported by mere conclusory
14 statements, do not suffice.” Id.

15 “[A] complaint must contain sufficient factual matter, accepted as true, to ‘state a
16 claim to relief that is plausible on its face.’” Id. (quoting Bell Atlantic Corp. v. Twombly,
17 550 U.S. 544, 570 (2007)). A claim is plausible “when the plaintiff pleads factual content
18 that allows the court to draw the reasonable inference that the defendant is liable for the
19 misconduct alleged.” Id. “Determining whether a complaint states a plausible claim for
20 relief [is] . . . a context-specific task that requires the reviewing court to draw on its judicial
21 experience and common sense.” Id. at 1950. Thus, although a plaintiff’s specific factual
22 allegations may be consistent with a constitutional claim, a court must assess whether there
23 are other “more likely explanations” for a defendant’s conduct. Id. at 1951.

24 But as the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit has instructed, courts
25 must “continue to construe *pro se* filings liberally.” Hebbe v. Pliler, 627 F.3d 338, 342 (9th
26 Cir. 2010). A “complaint [filed by a *pro se* prisoner] ‘must be held to less stringent standards
27 than formal pleadings drafted by lawyers.’” Id. (quoting Erickson v. Pardus, 551 U.S. 89,
28 94 (2007) (*per curiam*)).

1 If the Court determines that a pleading could be cured by the allegation of other facts,
2 a *pro se* litigant is entitled to an opportunity to amend a complaint before dismissal of the
3 action. See Lopez v. Smith, 203 F.3d 1122, 1127-29 (9th Cir. 2000) (*en banc*). The Court
4 should not, however, advise the litigant how to cure the defects. This type of advice “would
5 undermine district judges’ role as impartial decisionmakers.” Pliler v. Ford, 542 U.S. 225,
6 231 (2004); see also Lopez, 203 F.3d at 1131 n.13 (declining to decide whether the court was
7 required to inform a litigant of deficiencies). The Court will dismiss Plaintiff’s Complaint
8 for failure to state a claim, but because the Complaint may possibly be saved by amendment,
9 the Court will dismiss the Complaint with leave to amend.

10 **III. Complaint**

11 Plaintiff alleges one count for threat to safety. He sues Arizona Department of
12 Corrections (ADC) Director Charles L. Ryan and an unidentified ADC classification officer.
13 Plaintiff seeks compensatory relief.

14 Plaintiff alleges the following facts in his Complaint: Plaintiff has sought placement
15 in protective segregation three times since being confined in ADC, but has been denied each
16 time. Plaintiff has been assaulted for being gay. While he was held in Maricopa County’s
17 Fourth Avenue Jail, Plaintiff was cut with a razor by another inmate against whom Plaintiff
18 pressed charges. As a result, Plaintiff was considered a snitch there, which has apparently
19 followed him to ADC. Plaintiff contends that despite knowing of this history, including his
20 conviction for three counts of prostitution, ADC has sent him to a yard, presumably referring
21 to a general population (GP) yard, and denied him protective segregation. Plaintiff alleges
22 that he is also mentally disabled, although he does not allege the nature of the disability.

23 **IV. Failure to State a Claim**

24 To state a claim under § 1983, a plaintiff must allege facts supporting that (1) the
25 conduct about which he complains was committed by a person acting under the color of state
26 law and (2) the conduct deprived him of a federal constitutional or statutory right. Wood v.
27 Outlander, 879 F.2d 583, 587 (9th Cir. 1989). Negligence is not sufficient to state a claim
28 under § 1983. Daniels v. Williams, 474 U.S. 327, 330-31 (1986). In addition, a plaintiff

1 must allege that he suffered a specific injury as a result of the conduct of a particular
2 defendant and he must allege an affirmative link between the injury and the conduct of that
3 defendant. Rizzo v. Goode, 423 U.S. 362, 371-72, 377 (1976).

4 **A. Unknown Classification Officer**

5 Plaintiff sues an unknown ADC classification officer without alleging how the
6 classification officer violated his constitutional rights. Rule 10(a) of the Federal Rules of
7 Civil Procedure requires the plaintiff to include the names of the parties in the action. As a
8 practical matter, it is impossible in most instances for the United States Marshal or his
9 designee to serve a summons and complaint or amended complaint upon an anonymous
10 defendant.

11 The Ninth Circuit has held that where identity is unknown prior to the filing of a
12 complaint, the plaintiff should be given an opportunity through discovery to identify the
13 unknown defendants, unless it is clear that discovery would not uncover the identities, or that
14 the complaint would be dismissed on other grounds. Wakefield v. Thompson, 177 F.3d
15 1160, 1163 (9th Cir. 1999) (citing Gillespie v. Civiletti, 629 F.2d 637, 642 (9th Cir. 1980)).
16 Where the names of individual defendants are unknown at the time a complaint is filed, a
17 plaintiff may refer to the individual unknown defendant as Defendant John (or Jane) Doe,
18 *and* allege facts to support how that Doe defendant violated the plaintiff's constitutional
19 rights. A plaintiff may thereafter use the discovery process to obtain the names of
20 fictitiously-named defendants whom he believes violated his constitutional rights and seek
21 leave to amend to name those defendants. Because Plaintiff has not alleged facts to support
22 that the unknown classification officer violated his constitutional rights, he fails to state a
23 claim against that officer and he will be dismissed.

24 **B. Ryan**

25 Plaintiff also sues Director Ryan. While Ryan may be properly sued under § 1983,
26 Plaintiff fails to state a claim against him.

27 To state a claim against a defendant, “[a] plaintiff must allege facts, not simply
28 conclusions, that show that an individual was personally involved in the deprivation of his

1 civil rights.” Barren v. Harrington, 152 F.3d 1193, 1194 (9th Cir. 1998). For an individual
2 to be liable in his official capacity, a plaintiff must allege that the official acted as a result of
3 a policy, practice, or custom. See Cortez v. County of Los Angeles, 294 F.3d 1186, 1188
4 (9th Cir. 2001). Further, there is no *respondeat superior* liability under § 1983, so a
5 defendant’s position as the supervisor of someone who allegedly violated a plaintiff’s
6 constitutional rights does not make him liable. Monell v. Dep’t of Soc. Servs., 436 U.S. 658,
7 691 (1978); Taylor v. List, 880 F.2d 1040, 1045 (9th Cir. 1989). A supervisor in his
8 individual capacity, “is only liable for constitutional violations of his subordinates if the
9 supervisor participated in or directed the violations, or knew of the violations and failed to
10 act to prevent them.” Taylor, 880 F.2d at 1045. In addition, where a defendant’s only
11 involvement in allegedly unconstitutional conduct is the denial of administrative grievances,
12 the failure to intervene on a prisoner’s behalf to remedy the alleged unconstitutional behavior
13 does not amount to active unconstitutional behavior for purposes of § 1983. See Shehee v.
14 Luttrell, 199 F.3d 295, 300 (6th Cir. 1999); accord Proctor v. Applegate, 661 F.Supp.2d 743,
15 765 (W.D. Mich. 2009); Stocker v. Warden, No. 1:07-CV-00589, 2009 WL 981323, at *10
16 (E.D. Cal. Apr. 13, 2009); Mintun v. Blades, No. CV-06-139, 2008 WL 711636, at *7 (D.
17 Idaho Mar. 14, 2008); see also Gregory v. City of Louisville, 444 F.3d 725, 751 (6th Cir.
18 2006) (a plaintiff must allege that a supervisor defendant did more than play a passive role
19 in an alleged violation or mere tacit approval thereof; a plaintiff must allege that the
20 supervisor defendant somehow encouraged or condoned the actions of their subordinates).

21 Plaintiff fails to allege facts to support that Ryan directly violated his constitutional
22 rights. He also fails to allege facts to support that his rights were violated as a result of a
23 policy or practice promulgated, endorsed, or condoned by Ryan. Indeed, Plaintiff alleges no
24 facts against Ryan. Accordingly, he fails to state a claim against Ryan and Ryan will be
25 dismissed.

26 C. Threat to Safety

27 Plaintiff alleges a claim for threat to safety. To state a claim under § 1983 for failure
28 to protect or threats to safety, an inmate must allege facts to support that he was incarcerated

1 under conditions posing a substantial risk of harm and that prison officials were “deliberately
2 indifferent” to those risks. Farmer v. Brennan, 511 U.S. 825, 832-33 (1994). To adequately
3 allege deliberate indifference, a plaintiff must allege facts to support that a defendant knew
4 of, but disregarded, an excessive risk to inmate safety. Id. at 837. That is, “the official must
5 both [have been] aware of facts from which the inference could be drawn that a substantial
6 risk of serious harm exist[ed], and he must also [have] draw[n] the inference.” Id.

7 Plaintiff alleges that he was assaulted in prison, but he does not allege when, where,
8 by whom, or facts to support that particular prison officials knew of a *substantial* threat to
9 his safety, but nevertheless failed to take steps to protect him. He also fails to name such
10 prison officials as defendants. Plaintiff also fails to allege when and how he sought
11 placement in protective segregation, the basis he alleged for seeking protective segregation,
12 and when and who denied him placement in protective segregation. Plaintiff must allege
13 both facts to support the existence of a *substantial* threat to his safety and facts to support
14 that a properly named defendant knew of such facts but nevertheless failed to take steps to
15 protect Plaintiff. Because Plaintiff has not done so in his Complaint, he fails to state a claim
16 for threat to safety.

17 **V. Leave to Amend**

18 For the foregoing reasons, Plaintiff’s Complaint will be dismissed for failure to state
19 a claim upon which relief may be granted. Within 30 days, Plaintiff may submit a first
20 amended complaint to cure the deficiencies outlined above. The Clerk of Court will mail
21 Plaintiff a court-approved form to use for filing a first amended complaint. If Plaintiff fails
22 to use the court-approved form, the Court may strike the amended complaint and dismiss this
23 action without further notice to Plaintiff.

24 Plaintiff must clearly designate on the face of the document that it is the “First
25 Amended Complaint.” The first amended complaint must be retyped or rewritten in its
26 entirety on the court-approved form and may not incorporate any part of the original
27 Complaint by reference. Plaintiff may include only one claim per count.

28 A first amended complaint supersedes the original complaint. Ferdik v. Bonzelet, 963

1 F.2d 1258, 1262 (9th Cir. 1992); Hal Roach Studios v. Richard Feiner & Co., 896 F.2d 1542,
2 1546 (9th Cir. 1990). After amendment, the Court will treat an original complaint as
3 nonexistent. Ferdik, 963 F.2d at 1262. Any cause of action that was raised in the original
4 complaint is waived if it is not raised in a first amended complaint. King v. Atiyeh, 814 F.2d
5 565, 567 (9th Cir. 1987).

6 **VI. Warnings**

7 **A. Release**

8 Plaintiff must pay the unpaid balance of the filing fee within 120 days of his release.
9 Also, within 30 days of his release, he must either (1) notify the Court that he intends to pay
10 the balance or (2) show good cause, in writing, why he cannot. Failure to comply may result
11 in dismissal of this action.

12 **B. Address Changes**

13 Plaintiff must file and serve a notice of a change of address in accordance with Rule
14 83.3(d) of the Local Rules of Civil Procedure. Plaintiff must not include a motion for other
15 relief with a notice of change of address. Failure to comply may result in dismissal of this
16 action.

17 **C. Possible “Strike”**

18 Because the Complaint has been dismissed for failure to state a claim, if Plaintiff fails
19 to file an amended complaint correcting the deficiencies identified in this Order, the
20 dismissal may count as a “strike” under the “3-strikes” provision of 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).
21 Under the 3-strikes provision, a prisoner may not bring a civil action or appeal a civil
22 judgment *in forma pauperis* under 28 U.S.C. § 1915 “if the prisoner has, on 3 or more prior
23 occasions, while incarcerated or detained in any facility, brought an action or appeal in a
24 court of the United States that was dismissed on the grounds that it is frivolous, malicious,
25 or fails to state a claim upon which relief may be granted, unless the prisoner is under
26 imminent danger of serious physical injury.” 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

27 **D. Possible Dismissal**

28 If Plaintiff fails to timely comply with every provision of this Order, including these

1 warnings, the Court may dismiss this action without further notice. See Ferdik, 963 F.2d at
2 1260-61 (a district court may dismiss an action for failure to comply with any order of the
3 Court).

4 **IT IS ORDERED:**

5 (1) Plaintiff's Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* is **granted**. (Doc. 2.)


6 (2) As required by the accompanying Order to the appropriate government agency,
7 Plaintiff must pay the \$350.00 filing fee and is not assessed an initial partial filing fee.

8 (3) The Complaint is **dismissed** for failure to state a claim. (Doc. 1.) Plaintiff has
9 **30 days** from the date this Order is filed to file a first amended complaint in compliance with
10 this Order.

11 (4) If Plaintiff fails to file an amended complaint within 30 days, the Clerk of
12 Court must, without further notice, enter a judgment of dismissal of this action with prejudice
13 that states that the dismissal may count as a "strike" under 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

14 (5) The Clerk of Court must mail Plaintiff a court-approved form for filing a civil
15 rights complaint by a prisoner.

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**Instructions for a Prisoner Filing a Civil Rights Complaint
in the United States District Court for the District of Arizona**

1. Who May Use This Form. The civil rights complaint form is designed to help incarcerated persons prepare a complaint seeking relief for a violation of their federal civil rights. These complaints typically concern, but are not limited to, conditions of confinement. **This form should not be used to challenge your conviction or sentence.** If you want to challenge a state conviction or sentence, you should file a petition under 28 U.S.C. § 2254 for a writ of habeas corpus by a person in state custody. If you want to challenge a federal conviction or sentence, you should file a motion under 28 U.S.C. § 2255 to vacate sentence in the federal court that entered the judgment.

2. The Form. **Local Rule of Civil Procedure (LRCiv) 3.4(a) provides that complaints by incarcerated persons must be filed on the court-approved form.** The form must be typed or neatly handwritten. The form must be completely filled in to the extent applicable. All questions must be answered clearly and concisely in the appropriate space on the form. If needed, you may attach additional pages, **but no more than fifteen additional pages**, of standard letter-sized paper. You must identify which part of the complaint is being continued and number all pages. If you do not fill out the form properly, you will be asked to submit additional or corrected information, which may delay the processing of your action. You do not need to cite law.

3. Your Signature. You must tell the truth and sign the form. If you make a false statement of a material fact, you may be prosecuted for perjury.

4. The Filing Fee. The filing fee for this action is \$350.00. If you are unable to immediately pay the filing fee, you may request leave to proceed *in forma pauperis*. Please review the “Information for Prisoners Seeking Leave to Proceed with a (Non-Habeas) Civil Action in Federal Court *In Forma Pauperis* Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1915” for additional instructions.

5. Original and Judge’s Copy. You must send an **original plus one copy** of your complaint and of any other documents submitted to the Court. You must send one additional copy to the Court if you wish to have a file-stamped copy of the document returned to you. All copies must be identical to the original. Copies may be legibly handwritten.

6. Where to File. You should file your complaint in the division **where you were confined when your rights were allegedly violated.** See LRCiv 5.1(a) and 77.1(a). If you were confined in Maricopa, Pinal, Yuma, La Paz, or Gila County, file in the Phoenix Division. If you were confined in Apache, Navajo, Coconino, Mohave, or Yavapai County, file in the Prescott Division. If you were confined in Pima, Cochise, Santa Cruz, Graham, or Greenlee County, file in the Tucson Division. **Mail the original and one copy of the complaint with the \$350 filing fee or the application to proceed *in forma pauperis* to:**

7. Change of Address. You must immediately notify the Court and the defendants in writing of any change in your mailing address. **Failure to notify the Court of any change in your mailing address may result in the dismissal of your case.**

8. Certificate of Service. You must furnish the defendants with a copy of any document you submit to the Court (except the initial complaint and application to proceed *in forma pauperis*). Each original document (except the initial complaint and application to proceed *in forma pauperis*) must include a certificate of service on the last page of the document stating the date a copy of the document was mailed to the defendants and the address to which it was mailed. See Fed. R. Civ. P. 5(a), (d). Any document received by the Court that does not include a certificate of service may be stricken. A certificate of service should be in the following form:

9. Amended Complaint. If you need to change any of the information in the initial complaint, you must file an amended complaint. The amended complaint must be written on the court-approved civil rights complaint form. You may file one amended complaint without leave (permission) of Court before any defendant has answered your original complaint. See Fed. R. Civ. P. 15(a). After any defendant has filed an answer, you must file a motion for leave to amend and lodge (submit) a proposed amended complaint. LRCiv 15.1. In addition, an amended complaint may not incorporate by reference any part of your prior complaint. LRCiv 15.1(a)(2). **Any allegations or defendants not included in the amended complaint are considered dismissed.** All amended complaints are subject to screening under the Prison Litigation Reform Act; screening your amendment will take additional processing time.

10. Exhibits. You should not submit exhibits with the complaint or amended complaint. Instead, the relevant information should be paraphrased. You should keep the exhibits to use to support or oppose a motion to dismiss, a motion for summary judgment, or at trial.

11. Letters and Motions. It is generally inappropriate to write a letter to any judge or the staff of any judge. The only appropriate way to communicate with the Court is by filing a written pleading or motion.

12. Completing the Civil Rights Complaint Form.

HEADING:

1. Your Name. Print your name, prison or inmate number, and institutional mailing address on the lines provided.
2. Defendants. If there are **four or fewer** defendants, print the name of each. If you name **more than four** defendants, print the name of the first defendant on the first line, write the words “and others” on the second line, and attach an additional page listing the names of **all** of the defendants. Insert the additional page after page 1 and number it “1-A” at the bottom.
3. Jury Demand. If you want a jury trial, you must write “JURY TRIAL DEMANDED” in the space below “CIVIL RIGHTS COMPLAINT BY A PRISONER.” Failure to do so may result in the loss of the right to a jury trial. A jury trial is not available if you are seeking only injunctive relief.

Part A. JURISDICTION:

1. Nature of Suit. Mark whether you are filing the complaint pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 for state, county, or city defendants; “Bivens v. Six Unknown Federal Narcotics Agents” for federal defendants; or “other.” If you mark “other,” identify the source of that authority.
2. Location. Identify the institution and city where the alleged violation of your rights occurred.
3. Defendants. Print all of the requested information about each of the defendants in the spaces provided. If you are naming more than four defendants, you must provide the necessary information about each additional defendant on separate pages labeled “2-A,” “2-B,” etc., at the bottom. Insert the additional page(s) immediately behind page 2.

Part B. PREVIOUS LAWSUITS:

You must identify any other lawsuit you have filed in either state or federal court while you were a prisoner. Print all of the requested information about each lawsuit in the spaces provided. If you have filed more than three lawsuits, you must provide the necessary information about each additional lawsuit on a separate page. Label the page(s) as “2-A,” “2-B,” etc., at the bottom of the page and insert the additional page(s) immediately behind page 2.

Part C. CAUSE OF ACTION:

You must identify what rights each defendant violated. The form provides space to allege three separate counts (**one violation per count**). If you are alleging more than three counts, you must provide the necessary information about each additional count on a separate page. Number the additional pages “5-A,” “5-B,” etc., and insert them immediately behind page 5. Remember that you are limited to a total of fifteen additional pages.

1. Counts. You must identify which civil right was violated. **You may allege the violation of only one civil right per count.**

2. Issue Involved. Check the box that most closely identifies the issue involved in your claim. **You may check only one box per count.** If you check the box marked “Other,” you must identify the specific issue involved.

3. Supporting Facts. After you have identified which civil right was violated, you must state the supporting facts. Be as specific as possible. You must state what each individual defendant did to violate your rights. If there is more than one defendant, you must identify which defendant did what act. You also should state the date(s) on which the act(s) occurred, if possible.

4. Injury. State precisely how you were injured by the alleged violation of your rights.

5. Administrative Remedies. You must exhaust any available administrative remedies before you file a civil rights complaint. See 42 U.S.C. § 1997e. Consequently, you should disclose whether you have exhausted the inmate grievance procedures or administrative appeals for each count in your complaint. If the grievance procedures were not available for any of your counts, fully explain why on the lines provided.

Part D. REQUEST FOR RELIEF:

Print the relief you are seeking in the space provided.

SIGNATURE:

You must sign your name and print the date you signed the complaint. Failure to sign the complaint will delay the processing of your action. Unless you are an attorney, you may not bring an action on behalf of anyone but yourself.

FINAL NOTE

You should follow these instructions carefully. Failure to do so may result in your complaint being stricken or dismissed. All questions must be answered concisely in the proper space on the form. If you need more space, you may attach no more than fifteen additional pages. But the form must be completely filled in to the extent applicable. If you attach additional pages, be sure to identify which section of the complaint is being continued and number the pages.

1. This Court has jurisdiction over this action pursuant to:
