ORDER

Plaintiff Justin Andrew Russell, who is confined in the Maricopa County Durango Jail, has filed a *pro se* civil rights Complaint pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 (Doc. 1) and an Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* (Doc. 2). The Court will dismiss the Complaint with leave to amend.

I. Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* and Filing Fee

Plaintiff's Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* will be granted. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(a). Plaintiff must pay the statutory filing fee of \$350.00. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(b)(1). The Court will not assess an initial partial filing fee. *Id.* The statutory filing fee will be collected monthly in payments of 20% of the previous month's income credited to Plaintiff's trust account each time the amount in the account exceeds \$10.00. 28 U.S.C. § 1915(b)(2). The Court will enter a separate Order requiring the appropriate government agency to collect and forward the fees according to the statutory formula.

1 **II. Statutory Screening of Prisoner Complaints**

2 The Court is required to screen complaints brought by prisoners seeking relief
3 against a governmental entity or an officer or an employee of a governmental entity. 28
4 U.S.C. § 1915A(a). The Court must dismiss a complaint or portion thereof if a plaintiff
5 has raised claims that are legally frivolous or malicious, that fail to state a claim upon
6 which relief may be granted, or that seek monetary relief from a defendant who is
7 immune from such relief. 28 U.S.C. § 1915A(b)(1), (2).

8 A pleading must contain a “short and plain statement of the claim *showing* that the
9 pleader is entitled to relief.” Fed. R. Civ. P. 8(a)(2) (emphasis added). While Rule 8
10 does not demand detailed factual allegations, “it demands more than an unadorned, the-
11 defendant-unlawfully-harmed-me accusation.” *Ashcroft v. Iqbal*, 556 U.S. 662, 678
12 (2009). “Threadbare recitals of the elements of a cause of action, supported by mere
13 conclusory statements, do not suffice.” *Id.*

14 “[A] complaint must contain sufficient factual matter, accepted as true, to ‘state a
15 claim to relief that is plausible on its face.’” *Id.* (quoting *Bell Atlantic Corp. v. Twombly*,
16 550 U.S. 544, 570 (2007)). A claim is plausible “when the plaintiff pleads factual
17 content that allows the court to draw the reasonable inference that the defendant is liable
18 for the misconduct alleged.” *Id.* “Determining whether a complaint states a plausible
19 claim for relief [is] . . . a context-specific task that requires the reviewing court to draw
20 on its judicial experience and common sense.” *Id.* at 679. Thus, although a plaintiff’s
21 specific factual allegations may be consistent with a constitutional claim, a court must
22 assess whether there are other “more likely explanations” for a defendant’s conduct. *Id.*
23 at 681.

24 But as the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit has instructed,
25 courts must “continue to construe *pro se* filings liberally.” *Hebbe v. Pliler*, 627 F.3d 338,
26 342 (9th Cir. 2010). A “complaint [filed by a *pro se* prisoner] ‘must be held to less
27 stringent standards than formal pleadings drafted by lawyers.’” *Id.* (quoting *Erickson v.*
28 *Pardus*, 551 U.S. 89, 94 (2007) (*per curiam*)).

1 If the Court determines that a pleading could be cured by the allegation of other
2 facts, a *pro se* litigant is entitled to an opportunity to amend a complaint before dismissal
3 of the action. *See Lopez v. Smith*, 203 F.3d 1122, 1127-29 (9th Cir. 2000) (*en banc*).
4 Plaintiff's Complaint will be dismissed for failure to state a claim, but because it may
5 possibly be amended to state a claim, the Court will dismiss it with leave to amend.

6 **III. Complaint**

7 In his three-count Complaint, Plaintiff names as Defendants the Maricopa County
8 Durango Jail facility, and Maricopa County Sheriff Joseph M. Arpaio.

9 In Count One, Plaintiff alleges that he is forced to eat in his room on the bed
10 because the facility has only 30 seats even though there are 60 inmates; that there is mold
11 in the bathrooms and air vents; that there is rust and a lack of air ventilation; that there is
12 constant sickness and medication is not provided to care for sick inmates; that there is not
13 enough food provided, forcing inmates to steal for basic essentials; that there are no
14 napkins, and only one drink served each day; and that the jail deprives inmates of food,
15 phone calls, and a pillow. As a result, Plaintiff alleges that he was sick periodically from
16 the mold, had a virus from the lack of ventilation and from eating on his bed, and that he
17 has a rash from his clothes.

18 In Count Two, Plaintiff alleges that there is asbestos in the building, and that the
19 guards even use gloves "knowing the severity of the situation." As a result, Plaintiff
20 alleges that he has had chronic coughing and breathing problems, phlegm in his chest,
21 and suffers from headaches and depression.

22 In his Third Count, Plaintiff alleges that the bathroom drains, toilets, and sinks are
23 clogged, and that there are ants and spiders in the facility. As a result, Plaintiff alleges
24 that he has been sick constantly.

25 For his alleged injuries, Plaintiff seeks monetary relief.

26 **IV. Failure to State a Claim**

27 To prevail in a 42 U.S.C. § 1983 claim, a plaintiff must show that (1) acts by the
28 defendants (2) under color of state law (3) deprived plaintiff of federal rights, privileges,

1 or immunities, and (4) caused him damage. *Thornton v. City of St. Helens*, 425 F.3d
2 1158, 1163-64 (9th Cir. 2005) (quoting *Shoshone-Bannock Tribes v. Idaho Fish & Game*
3 *Comm'n*, 42 F.3d 1278, 1284 (9th Cir. 1994)). In addition, a plaintiff must allege that he
4 suffered a specific injury as a result of the conduct of a particular defendant, and he must
5 allege an affirmative link between the injury and the conduct of that defendant. *Rizzo v.*
6 *Goode*, 423 U.S. 362, 371-72, 377 (1976).

7 Although *pro se* pleadings are liberally construed, *Haines v. Kerner*, 404 U.S. 519,
8 520-21 (1972), conclusory and vague allegations will not support a cause of action. *Ivey*
9 *v. Bd. of Regents of the Univ. of Alaska*, 673 F.2d 266, 268 (9th Cir. 1982). Further, a
10 liberal interpretation of a civil rights complaint may not supply essential elements of the
11 claim that were not initially pled. *Id.*

12 **A. Joseph M. Arpaio**

13 Plaintiff fails to state a claim against Defendant Arpaio in his Complaint. “A
14 plaintiff must allege facts, not simply conclusions, that show that an individual was
15 personally involved in the deprivation of his civil rights.” *Barren v. Harrington*, 152
16 F.3d 1193, 1194 (9th Cir. 1998). For an individual to be liable in his official capacity, a
17 plaintiff must allege that the official acted as a result of a policy, practice, or custom. *See*
18 *Cortez v. County of Los Angeles*, 294 F.3d 1186, 1188 (9th Cir. 2002). Further, there is
19 no *respondeat superior* liability under § 1983, so a defendant’s position as the supervisor
20 of someone else who allegedly violated a plaintiff’s constitutional rights does not make
21 the supervisor liable. *Monell v. Dep’t of Soc. Svcs. Of New York*, 436 U.S. 658, 691
22 (1978); *Taylor v. List*, 880 F.2d 1040, 1045 (9th Cir. 1989). A supervisor in his
23 individual capacity “is only liable for constitutional violations of his subordinates if the
24 supervisor participated in or directed the violations, or knew of the violations and failed
25 to act to prevent them.” *Taylor*, 880 F.2d at 1045.

26 Plaintiff fails to allege any facts regarding Defendant Arpaio in his Complaint.
27 Plaintiff does not allege that Defendant Arpaio directly violated Plaintiff’s constitutional
28 rights. Moreover, Plaintiff does not allege facts showing that Defendant Arpaio violated

1 Plaintiff's constitutional rights pursuant to a policy, practice, or custom, or that
2 Defendant Arpaio participated in or directed any violations of Plaintiff's rights, or knew
3 of any violations of Plaintiff's rights but failed to act to prevent them. Accordingly,
4 Plaintiff fails to state a claim against Defendant Arpaio, and Defendant Arpaio will be
5 dismissed.

6 **B. Durango Jail**

7 The Maricopa County Durango Jail facility is not a proper defendant. Claims
8 under §1983 are directed at "bodies politic and corporate." *Monell v. Dept. of Soc. Serv.*
9 *of City of N.Y.*, 436 U.S. 658, 688-89 (1978). Under the Civil Rights Act of 1871,
10 Congress intended municipalities and other local government units to be included among
11 those persons to whom § 1983 applies. *Id.* at 689-690. Because a jail is neither a
12 corporation nor a body politic, it is not a person for purposes of § 1983, and accordingly,
13 the Maricopa County Durango Jail will be dismissed.

14 **C. Conditions of Confinement**

15 Plaintiff appears to be asserting claims challenging his conditions of confinement.
16 Plaintiff should be aware that a pretrial detainee's claim for unconstitutional conditions of
17 confinement arises from the Fourteenth Amendment's Due Process Clause rather than
18 from the Eighth Amendment's prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment. *Bell v.*
19 *Wolfish*, 441 U.S. 520, 535 n.16 (1979). Nevertheless, the same standards are applied,
20 requiring proof that the defendant acted with "deliberate indifference." *See Frost v.*
21 *Agnos*, 152 F.3d 1124, 1128 (9th Cir. 1998).

22 "Deliberate indifference" is a higher standard than negligence or lack of ordinary
23 due care for the prisoner's health or safety. *Farmer v. Brennan*, 511 U.S. 825, 835
24 (1994). To state a claim of deliberate indifference, plaintiffs must meet a two-part test.
25 First, the alleged constitutional deprivation must objectively be "sufficiently serious";
26 that is, the official's act or omission must result in the denial of "the minimal civilized
27 measure of life's necessities." *Id.* at 834 (citations omitted). Second, the prison official
28 must have a "sufficiently culpable state of mind"; that is, "the official must be both aware

1 of facts from which the inference could be drawn that a substantial risk of serious harm
2 exists, and he must also draw that inference.” *Id.* at 837 (emphasis added).

3 To state a claim for unconstitutional conditions of confinement, a plaintiff must
4 allege that a defendant’s acts or omissions have deprived the inmate of “the minimal
5 civilized measure of life’s necessities” and that the defendant acted with deliberate
6 indifference to an excessive risk of inmate health or safety. *Allen v. Sakai*, 48 F.3d 1082,
7 1087 (9th Cir. 1994) (quoting *Farmer*, 511 U.S. at 834); see *Estate of Ford v. Ramirez-*
8 *Palmer*, 301 F.3d 1043, 1049-50 (9th Cir. 2002). Whether conditions of confinement rise
9 to the level of a constitutional violation may depend, in part, on the duration of an
10 inmate’s exposure to those conditions. *Keenan v. Hall*, 83 F.3d 1083, 1089, 1091 (9th
11 Cir. 1996) (citing *Hutto v. Finney*, 437 U.S. 678, 686-87 (1978)). “The circumstances,
12 nature, and duration of a deprivation of [] necessities must be considered in determining
13 whether a constitutional violation has occurred.” *Hearns v. Terhune*, 413 F.3d 1036,
14 1042 (9th Cir. 2005) (quoting *Johnson v. Lewis*, 217 F.3d 726, 731 (9th Cir. 2000)).

15 To adequately allege that a defendant acted with deliberate indifference, a plaintiff
16 must allege facts that a defendant knew of, but disregarded, an excessive risk to inmate
17 health or safety. *Farmer*, 511 U.S. at 832-33. That is, “the official must both be aware of
18 facts from which the inference could be drawn that a substantial risk of serious harm
19 exists, and he must also draw the inference.” *Id.*

20 With respect to meals, “[t]he Eighth [and Fourteenth] Amendment[s] require[]
21 only that prisoners receive food that is adequate to maintain health; it need not be tasty or
22 aesthetically pleasing.” *LeMaire v. Maass*, 12 F.3d 1444, 1456 (9th Cir. 1993) (citation
23 omitted); see *Frost*, 152 F.3d at 1128 (applying Eighth Amendment standard to a pretrial
24 detainee’s Fourteenth Amendment claims regarding his conditions of confinement).
25 “The fact that the food occasionally contains foreign objects or sometimes is served cold,
26 while unpleasant, does not amount to a constitutional deprivation.” *LeMaire*, 12 F.3d at
27 1456 (citations omitted). An inmate may, however, state a claim where he alleges that he
28 is served meals with insufficient calories for long periods of time. *Id.*

1 **V. Leave to Amend**

2 For the foregoing reasons, Plaintiff’s Complaint will be dismissed for failure to
3 state a claim upon which relief may be granted. Within 30 days, however, Plaintiff may
4 submit a first amended complaint to cure the deficiencies outlined above. The Clerk of
5 Court will mail Plaintiff a court-approved form to use for filing a first amended
6 complaint. If Plaintiff fails to use the court-approved form, the Court may strike the
7 amended complaint and dismiss this action without further notice to Plaintiff.

8 Plaintiff must clearly designate on the face of the document that it is the “First
9 Amended Complaint.” The first amended complaint must be retyped or rewritten in its
10 entirety on the court-approved form and may not incorporate any part of the original
11 Complaint by reference. Plaintiff may include only one claim per count.

12 A first amended complaint supersedes the original complaint. *Ferdik v. Bonzelet*,
13 963 F.2d 1258, 1262 (9th Cir. 1992); *Hal Roach Studios v. Richard Feiner & Co.*, 896
14 F.2d 1542, 1546 (9th Cir. 1990). After amendment, the Court will treat an original
15 complaint as nonexistent. *Ferdik*, 963 F.2d at 1262. Any cause of action that was raised
16 in the original complaint and that was voluntarily dismissed or was dismissed without
17 prejudice is waived if it is not alleged in a first amended complaint. *Lacey v. Maricopa*
18 *County*, 693 F.3d 896, 928 (9th Cir. 2012) (en banc).

19 Further, if Plaintiff files an amended complaint, Plaintiff must write short, plain
20 statements telling the Court: (1) the constitutional right Plaintiff believes was violated;
21 (2) the name of the Defendant who violated the right; (3) exactly what that Defendant did
22 or failed to do; (4) how the action or inaction of the Defendant is connected to the
23 violation of Plaintiff’s constitutional right; and (5) what specific injury Plaintiff suffered
24 because of that Defendant’s conduct. *See Rizzo*, 423 U.S. at 371-72, 377.

25 Plaintiff must repeat this process for each person he names as a Defendant. If
26 Plaintiff fails to explain how the conduct of each named Defendant is connected to the
27 specific injury suffered by Plaintiff, the allegations against that Defendant will be
28 dismissed for failure to state a claim. **Conclusory allegations that a Defendant or**

1 **group of Defendants has violated a constitutional right are not acceptable and will**
2 **be dismissed.**

3 **VI. Warnings**

4 **A. Release**

5 If released from custody, Plaintiff must pay the unpaid balance of the filing fee
6 within 120 days of his release. Also, within 30 days of his release, he must either (1)
7 notify the Court that he intends to pay the balance or (2) show good cause, in writing,
8 why he cannot. Failure to comply may result in dismissal of this action.

9 **B. Address Changes**

10 If Plaintiff's address changes, Plaintiff must file and serve a notice of a change of
11 address in accordance with Rule 83.3(d) of the Local Rules of Civil Procedure. Plaintiff
12 must not include a motion for other relief with a notice of change of address. Failure to
13 comply may result in dismissal of this action.

14 **C. Copies**

15 Plaintiff must submit an additional copy of every filing for use by the Court. *See*
16 LRCiv 5.4. Failure to comply may result in the filing being stricken without further
17 notice to Plaintiff.

18 **D. Possible "Strike"**

19 Because the Complaint has been dismissed for failure to state a claim, if Plaintiff
20 fails to file an amended complaint correcting the deficiencies identified in this Order, the
21 dismissal may count as a "strike" under the "3-strikes" provision of 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).
22 Under the 3-strikes provision, a prisoner may not bring a civil action or appeal a civil
23 judgment *in forma pauperis* under 28 U.S.C. § 1915 "if the prisoner has, on 3 or more
24 prior occasions, while incarcerated or detained in any facility, brought an action or appeal
25 in a court of the United States that was dismissed on the grounds that it is frivolous,
26 malicious, or fails to state a claim upon which relief may be granted, unless the prisoner
27 is under imminent danger of serious physical injury." 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

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E. Possible Dismissal

If Plaintiff fails to timely comply with every provision of this Order, including these warnings, the Court may dismiss this action without further notice. *See Ferdik*, 963 F.2d at 1260-61 (a district court may dismiss an action for failure to comply with any order of the Court).

IT IS ORDERED:

(1) Plaintiff’s Application to Proceed *In Forma Pauperis* (Doc. 2) is **granted**.

(2) As required by the accompanying Order to the appropriate government agency, Plaintiff must pay the \$350.00 filing fee and is not assessed an initial partial filing fee.

(3) The Complaint (Doc. 1) is **dismissed** for failure to state a claim. Plaintiff has **30 days** from the date this Order is filed to file a first amended complaint in compliance with this Order.

(4) If Plaintiff fails to file an amended complaint within 30 days, the Clerk of Court must, without further notice, enter a judgment of dismissal of this action with prejudice that states that the dismissal may count as a “strike” under 28 U.S.C. § 1915(g).

(5) The Clerk of Court must mail Plaintiff a court-approved form for filing a civil rights complaint by a prisoner.

**Instructions for a Prisoner Filing a Civil Rights Complaint
in the United States District Court for the District of Arizona**

1. Who May Use This Form. The civil rights complaint form is designed to help incarcerated persons prepare a complaint seeking relief for a violation of their federal civil rights. These complaints typically concern, but are not limited to, conditions of confinement. **This form should not be used to challenge your conviction or sentence.** If you want to challenge a state conviction or sentence, you should file a petition under 28 U.S.C. § 2254 for a writ of habeas corpus by a person in state custody. If you want to challenge a federal conviction or sentence, you should file a motion under 28 U.S.C. § 2255 to vacate sentence in the federal court that entered the judgment.

2. The Form. **Local Rule of Civil Procedure (LRCiv) 3.4(a) provides that complaints by incarcerated persons must be filed on the court-approved form.** The form must be typed or neatly handwritten. The form must be completely filled in to the extent applicable. All questions must be answered clearly and concisely in the appropriate space on the form. If needed, you may attach additional pages, **but no more than fifteen additional pages**, of standard letter-sized paper. You must identify which part of the complaint is being continued and number all pages. If you do not fill out the form properly, you will be asked to submit additional or corrected information, which may delay the processing of your action. You do not need to cite law.

3. Your Signature. You must tell the truth and sign the form. If you make a false statement of a material fact, you may be prosecuted for perjury.

4. The Filing and Administrative Fees. The total fees for this action are \$400.00 (\$350.00 filing fee plus \$50.00 administrative fee). If you are unable to immediately pay the fees, you may request leave to proceed *in forma pauperis*. Please review the “Information for Prisoners Seeking Leave to Proceed with a (Non-Habeas) Civil Action in Federal Court *In Forma Pauperis* Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1915” for additional instructions.

5. Original and Judge’s Copy. You must send an **original plus one copy** of your complaint and of any other documents submitted to the Court. You must send one additional copy to the Court if you wish to have a file-stamped copy of the document returned to you. All copies must be identical to the original. Copies may be legibly handwritten.

6. Where to File. You should file your complaint in the division **where you were confined when your rights were allegedly violated.** See LRCiv 5.1(a) and 77.1(a). If you were confined in Maricopa, Pinal, Yuma, La Paz, or Gila County, file in the Phoenix Division. If you were confined in Apache, Navajo, Coconino, Mohave, or Yavapai County, file in the Prescott Division. If you were confined in Pima, Cochise, Santa Cruz, Graham, or Greenlee County, file in the Tucson Division. **Mail the original and one copy of the complaint with the \$400 filing and administrative fees or the application to proceed *in forma pauperis* to:**

7. Change of Address. You must immediately notify the Court and the defendants in writing of any change in your mailing address. **Failure to notify the Court of any change in your mailing address may result in the dismissal of your case.**

8. Certificate of Service. You must furnish the defendants with a copy of any document you submit to the Court (except the initial complaint and application to proceed *in forma pauperis*). Each original document (except the initial complaint and application to proceed *in forma pauperis*) must include a certificate of service on the last page of the document stating the date a copy of the document was mailed to the defendants and the address to which it was mailed. See Fed. R. Civ. P. 5(a), (d). Any document received by the Court that does not include a certificate of service may be stricken. A certificate of service should be in the following form:

9. Amended Complaint. If you need to change any of the information in the initial complaint, you must file an amended complaint. The amended complaint must be written on the court-approved civil rights complaint form. You may file one amended complaint without leave (permission) of Court before any defendant has answered your original complaint. See Fed. R. Civ. P. 15(a). After any defendant has filed an answer, you must file a motion for leave to amend and lodge (submit) a proposed amended complaint. LRCiv 15.1. In addition, an amended complaint may not incorporate by reference any part of your prior complaint. LRCiv 15.1(a)(2). **Any allegations or defendants not included in the amended complaint are considered dismissed.** All amended complaints are subject to screening under the Prison Litigation Reform Act; screening your amendment will take additional processing time.

10. Exhibits. You should not submit exhibits with the complaint or amended complaint. Instead, the relevant information should be paraphrased. You should keep the exhibits to use to support or oppose a motion to dismiss, a motion for summary judgment, or at trial.

11. Letters and Motions. It is generally inappropriate to write a letter to any judge or the staff of any judge. The only appropriate way to communicate with the Court is by filing a written pleading or motion.

12. Completing the Civil Rights Complaint Form.

HEADING:

1. Your Name. Print your name, prison or inmate number, and institutional mailing address on the lines provided.
2. Defendants. If there are **four or fewer** defendants, print the name of each. If you name **more than four** defendants, print the name of the first defendant on the first line, write the words “and others” on the second line, and attach an additional page listing the names of **all** of the defendants. Insert the additional page after page 1 and number it “1-A” at the bottom.
3. Jury Demand. If you want a jury trial, you must write “JURY TRIAL DEMANDED” in the space below “CIVIL RIGHTS COMPLAINT BY A PRISONER.” Failure to do so may result in the loss of the right to a jury trial. A jury trial is not available if you are seeking only injunctive relief.

Part A. JURISDICTION:

1. Nature of Suit. Mark whether you are filing the complaint pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 for state, county, or city defendants; “Bivens v. Six Unknown Federal Narcotics Agents” for federal defendants; or “other.” If you mark “other,” identify the source of that authority.
2. Location. Identify the institution and city where the alleged violation of your rights occurred.
3. Defendants. Print all of the requested information about each of the defendants in the spaces provided. If you are naming more than four defendants, you must provide the necessary information about each additional defendant on separate pages labeled “2-A,” “2-B,” etc., at the bottom. Insert the additional page(s) immediately behind page 2.

Part B. PREVIOUS LAWSUITS:

You must identify any other lawsuit you have filed in either state or federal court while you were a prisoner. Print all of the requested information about each lawsuit in the spaces provided. If you have filed more than three lawsuits, you must provide the necessary information about each additional lawsuit on a separate page. Label the page(s) as “2-A,” “2-B,” etc., at the bottom of the page and insert the additional page(s) immediately behind page 2.

Part C. CAUSE OF ACTION:

You must identify what rights each defendant violated. The form provides space to allege three separate counts (**one violation per count**). If you are alleging more than three counts, you must provide the necessary information about each additional count on a separate page. Number the additional pages “5-A,” “5-B,” etc., and insert them immediately behind page 5. Remember that you are limited to a total of fifteen additional pages.

1. Counts. You must identify which civil right was violated. **You may allege the violation of only one civil right per count.**
