19 **1. PURPOSES AND LIMITATIONS**

20 Disclosure and discovery activity in this action are likely to involve production of
21 confidential, proprietary, or private information for which special protection from public
22 disclosure and from use for any purpose other than prosecuting this litigation would be
23 warranted. Accordingly, the parties hereby stipulate to and petition the court to enter the
24 following Stipulated Protective Order. The parties acknowledge that this Order does not confer
25 blanket protections on all disclosures or responses to discovery and that the protection it affords
26 extends only to the limited information or items that are entitled under the applicable legal
27 principles to treatment as confidential. The parties further acknowledge, as set forth in Section
28 10, below, that this Stipulated Protective Order creates no entitlement to file confidential
29 information under seal; Civil Local Rule 79-5 sets forth the procedures that must be followed

1 and reflects the standards that will be applied when a party seeks permission from the court to
2 file material under seal.

3 **2. DEFINITIONS**

4 2.1 Party: any party to this action, including all of its officers, directors, employees,
5 consultants, retained experts, and outside counsel (and their support staff).

6 2.2 Disclosure or Discovery Material: all items or information, regardless of the medium
7 or manner generated, stored, or maintained (including, among other things, testimony,
8 transcripts, or tangible things) that are produced or generated in disclosures or responses to
9 discovery in this matter.

10 2.3 “Confidential” Information or Items: information (regardless of how generated,
11 stored or maintained) or tangible things that qualify for protection under standards developed
12 under F.R.Civ.P. 26(c).

13 2.4 “Highly Confidential – Attorneys’ Eyes Only” Information or Items: extremely
14 sensitive “Confidential Information or Items” whose disclosure to another Party or non-party
15 would create a substantial risk of serious injury that could not be avoided by less restrictive
16 means.

17 2.5 Receiving Party: a Party that receives Disclosure or Discovery Material from a
18 Producing Party.

19 2.6 Producing Party: a Party or non-party that produces Disclosure or Discovery Material
20 in this action.

21 2.7 Designating Party: a Party or non-party that designates information or items that it
22 produces in disclosures or in responses to discovery as “Confidential” or “Highly Confidential
23 — Attorneys’ Eyes Only.”

24 2.8 Protected Material: any Disclosure or Discovery Material that is designated as
25 “Confidential” or as “Highly Confidential – Attorneys’ Eyes Only.”

26 2.9 Outside Counsel: attorneys who are not employees of a Party but who are retained to
27 represent or advise a Party in this action.

28 2.10 House Counsel: attorneys who are employees of a Party.

29 2.11 Counsel (without qualifier): Outside Counsel and House Counsel (as well as their

1 support staffs).

2 2.12 Expert: a person with specialized knowledge or experience in a matter pertinent to
3 the litigation who has been retained by a Party or its counsel to serve as an expert witness or as a
4 consultant in this action and who is not a past or a current employee of a Party or of a competitor
5 of a Party's and who, at the time of retention, is not anticipated to become an employee of a
6 Party or a competitor of a Party's. This definition includes a professional jury or trial consultant
7 retained in connection with this litigation.

8 2.13 Professional Vendors: persons or entities that provide litigation support services
9 (e.g., photocopying; videotaping; translating; preparing exhibits or demonstrations; organizing,
10 storing, retrieving data in any form or medium; etc.) and their employees and subcontractors.

11 **3. SCOPE**

12 The protections conferred by this Stipulation and Order cover not only Protected Material
13 (as defined above), but also any information copied or extracted therefrom, as well as all copies,
14 excerpts, summaries, or compilations thereof, plus testimony, conversations, or presentations by
15 parties or counsel to or in court or in other settings that might reveal Protected Material.

16 **4. DURATION**

17 Even after the termination of this litigation, the confidentiality obligations imposed by
18 this Order shall remain in effect until a Designating Party agrees otherwise in writing or a court
19 order otherwise directs.

20 **5. DESIGNATING PROTECTED MATERIAL**

21 5.1 Exercise of Restraint and Care in Designating Material for Protection. Each Party or
22 non-party that designates information or items for protection under this Order must take care to
23 limit any such designation to specific material that qualifies under the appropriate standards. A
24 Designating Party must take care to designate for protection only those parts of material,
25 documents, items, or oral or written communications that qualify – so that other portions of the
26 material, documents, items, or communications for which protection is not warranted are not
27 swept unjustifiably within the ambit of this Order.

28 Mass, indiscriminate, or routinized designations are prohibited. Designations that are
29 shown to be clearly unjustified, or that have been made for an improper purpose (e.g., to

1 unnecessarily encumber or retard the case development process, or to impose unnecessary
2 expenses and burdens on other parties), expose the Designating Party to sanctions.

3 If it comes to a Party's or a non-party's attention that information or items that it
4 designated for protection do not qualify for protection at all, or do not qualify for the level of
5 protection initially asserted, that Party or non-party must promptly notify all other parties that it
6 is withdrawing the mistaken designation.

7 5.2 Manner and Timing of Designations. Except as otherwise provided in this Order
8 (see, e.g., second paragraph of section 5.2(a), below), or as otherwise stipulated or ordered,
9 material that qualifies for protection under this Order must be clearly so designated before the
10 material is disclosed or produced.

11 Designation in conformity with this Order requires:

12 (a) For information in documentary form (apart from transcripts of depositions or other
13 pretrial or trial proceedings), that the Producing Party affix the legend "CONFIDENTIAL" or
14 "HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY" at the top of each page that
15 contains protected material. If only a portion or portions of the material on a page qualifies for
16 protection, the Producing Party also must clearly identify the protected portion(s) (e.g., by
17 making appropriate markings in the margins) and must specify, for each portion, the level of
18 protection being asserted (either "CONFIDENTIAL" or "HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL –
19 ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY").

20 A Party or non-party that makes original documents or materials available for inspection
21 need not designate them for protection until after the inspecting Party has indicated which
22 material it would like copied and produced. During the inspection and before the designation, all
23 of the material made available for inspection shall be deemed "HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL –
24 ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY." After the inspecting Party has identified the documents it wants
25 copied and produced, the Producing Party must determine which documents, or portions thereof,
26 qualify for protection under this Order, then, before producing the specified documents, the
27 Producing Party must affix the appropriate legend ("CONFIDENTIAL" or "HIGHLY
28 CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY") at the top of each page that contains
29 Protected Material. If only a portion or portions of the material on a page qualifies for

1 protection, the Producing Party also must clearly identify the protected portion(s) (e.g., by
2 making appropriate markings in the margins) and must specify, for each portion, the level of
3 protection being asserted (either “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL –
4 ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY”).

5 (b) For testimony given in deposition or in other pretrial or trial proceedings, that the
6 Party or non-party offering or sponsoring the testimony identify on the record, before the close of
7 the deposition, hearing, or other proceeding, all protected testimony, and further specify any
8 portions of the testimony that qualify as “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES
9 ONLY.” When it is impractical to identify separately each portion of testimony that is entitled
10 to protection, and when it appears that substantial portions of the testimony may qualify for
11 protection, the Party or non-party that sponsors, offers, or gives the testimony may invoke on the
12 record (before the deposition or proceeding is concluded) a right to have up to 20 days to identify
13 the specific portions of the testimony as to which protection is sought and to specify the level of
14 protection being asserted (“CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL –
15 ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY”). Only those portions of the testimony that are appropriately
16 designated for protection within the 20 days shall be covered by the provisions of this Stipulated
17 Protective Order.

18 Transcript pages containing Protected Material must be separately bound by the court
19 reporter, who must affix to the top of each such page the legend “CONFIDENTIAL” or
20 “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY,” as instructed by the Party or
21 non-party offering or sponsoring the witness or presenting the testimony.

22 (c) for information produced in some form other than documentary, and for any other
23 tangible items, that the Producing Party affix in a prominent place on the exterior of the
24 container or containers in which the information or item is stored the legend “CONFIDENTIAL”
25 or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY.” If only portions of the
26 information or item warrant protection, the Producing Party, to the extent practicable, shall
27 identify the protected portions, specifying whether they qualify as “Confidential” or as “Highly
28 Confidential – Attorneys’ Eyes Only.”

29 5.3 Inadvertent Failures to Designate. If timely corrected, an inadvertent failure to

1 designate qualified information or items as “Confidential” or “Highly Confidential – Attorneys’
2 Eyes Only” does not, standing alone, waive the Designating Party’s right to secure protection
3 under this Order for such material. If material is appropriately designated as “Confidential” or
4 “Highly Confidential – Attorneys’ Eyes Only” after the material was initially produced, the
5 Receiving Party, on timely notification of the designation, must make reasonable efforts to
6 assure that the material is treated in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

7 **6. CHALLENGING CONFIDENTIALITY DESIGNATIONS**

8 6.1 Timing of Challenges. Unless a prompt challenge to a Designating Party’s
9 confidentiality designation is necessary to avoid foreseeable substantial unfairness, unnecessary
10 economic burdens, or a later significant disruption or delay of the litigation, a Party does not
11 waive its right to challenge a confidentiality designation by electing not to mount a challenge
12 promptly after the original designation is disclosed.

13 6.2 Meet and Confer. A Party that elects to initiate a challenge to a Designating Party’s
14 confidentiality designation must do so in good faith and must begin the process by conferring
15 directly (in voice to voice dialogue; other forms of communication are not sufficient) with
16 counsel for the Designating Party. In conferring, the challenging Party must explain the basis for
17 its belief that the confidentiality designation was not proper and must give the Designating Party
18 an opportunity to review the designated material, to reconsider the circumstances, and, if no
19 change in designation is offered, to explain the basis for the chosen designation. A challenging
20 Party may proceed to the next stage of the challenge process only if it has engaged in this meet
21 and confer process first.

22 6.3 Judicial Intervention. A Party that elects to press a challenge to a confidentiality
23 designation after considering the justification offered by the Designating Party may file and
24 serve a motion under Civil Local Rule 7 (and in compliance with Civil Local Rule 79-5, if
25 applicable) that identifies the challenged material and sets forth in detail the basis for the
26 challenge. Each such motion must be accompanied by a competent declaration that affirms that
27 the movant has complied with the meet and confer requirements imposed in the preceding
28 paragraph and that sets forth with specificity the justification for the confidentiality designation
29 that was given by the Designating Party in the meet and confer dialogue.

1 The burden of persuasion in any such challenge proceeding shall be on the Designating
2 Party. Until the court rules on the challenge, all parties shall continue to afford the material in
3 question the level of protection to which it is entitled under the Producing Party's designation.

4 **7. ACCESS TO AND USE OF PROTECTED MATERIAL**

5 7.1 Basic Principles. A Receiving Party may use Protected Material that is disclosed or
6 produced by another Party or by a non-party in connection with this case only for prosecuting,
7 defending, or attempting to settle this litigation. Such Protected Material may be disclosed only
8 to the categories of persons and under the conditions described in this Order. When the litigation
9 has been terminated, a Receiving Party must comply with the provisions of section 11, below
10 (FINAL DISPOSITION).

11 Protected Material must be stored and maintained by a Receiving Party at a location and
12 in a secure manner that ensures that access is limited to the persons authorized under this Order.

13 7.2 Disclosure of "CONFIDENTIAL" Information or Items. Unless otherwise ordered
14 by the court or permitted in writing by the Designating Party, a Receiving Party may disclose
15 any information or item designated CONFIDENTIAL only to:

16 (a) the Receiving Party's Outside Counsel of record in this action, as well as employees
17 of said Counsel to whom it is reasonably necessary to disclose the information for this litigation
18 and who have signed the "Agreement to Be Bound by Protective Order" that is attached hereto as
19 Exhibit A;

20 (b) the officers, directors, and employees (including House Counsel) of the Receiving
21 Party to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the
22 "Agreement to Be Bound by Protective Order" (Exhibit A);

23 (c) experts (as defined in this Order) of the Receiving Party to whom disclosure is
24 reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the "Agreement to Be Bound by
25 Protective Order" (Exhibit A);

26 (d) the Court and its personnel;

27 (e) court reporters, their staffs, and professional vendors to whom disclosure is
28 reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the "Agreement to Be Bound by
29 Protective Order" (Exhibit A);

1 (f) during their depositions, witnesses in the action to whom disclosure is reasonably
2 necessary and who have signed the “Agreement to Be Bound by Protective Order” (Exhibit A).
3 Pages of transcribed deposition testimony or exhibits to depositions that reveal Protected
4 Material must be separately bound by the court reporter and may not be disclosed to anyone
5 except as permitted under this Stipulated Protective Order.

6 (g) the author of the document or the original source of the information.

7 7.3 Disclosure of “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY”
8 Information or Items. Unless otherwise ordered by the court or permitted in writing by the
9 Designating Party, a Receiving Party may disclose any information or item designated
10 “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” only to:

11 (a) the Receiving Party’s Outside Counsel and any House Counsel who are also an
12 attorney of record in the litigation, as well as employees of said Counsel to whom it is reasonably
13 necessary to disclose the information for this litigation and who have signed the “Agreement to
14 Be Bound by Protective Order” that is attached hereto as Exhibit A;

15 (b) Experts (as defined in this Order) (1) to whom disclosure is reasonably
16 necessary for this litigation, (2) who have signed the “Agreement to Be Bound by
17 Protective Order” (Exhibit A), [Optional: and (3) as to whom the procedures set forth in
18 paragraph 7.4, below, have been followed];

19 (c) the Court and its personnel;

20 (d) court reporters, their staffs, and professional vendors to whom disclosure is
21 reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the “Agreement to Be Bound by
22 Protective Order” (Exhibit A); and

23 (e) the author of the document or the original source of the information.

24 **8. PROTECTED MATERIAL SUBPOENAED OR ORDERED PRODUCED IN**
25 **OTHER LITIGATION**

26 If a Receiving Party is served with a subpoena or an order issued in other litigation that
27 would compel disclosure of any information or items designated in this action as
28 “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY,” the
29 Receiving Party must so notify the Designating Party, in writing (by fax, if possible)

1 immediately and in no event more than three court days after receiving the subpoena or order.
2 Such notification must include a copy of the subpoena or court order.

3 The Receiving Party also must immediately inform in writing the Party who caused the
4 subpoena or order to issue in the other litigation that some or all the material covered by the
5 subpoena or order is the subject of this Protective Order. In addition, the Receiving Party must
6 deliver a copy of this Stipulated Protective Order promptly to the Party in the other action that
7 caused the subpoena or order to issue.

8 The purpose of imposing these duties is to alert the interested parties to the existence of
9 this Protective Order and to afford the Designating Party in this case an opportunity to try to
10 protect its confidentiality interests in the court from which the subpoena or order issued. The
11 Designating Party shall bear the burdens and the expenses of seeking protection in that court of
12 its confidential material – and nothing in these provisions should be construed as authorizing or
13 encouraging a Receiving Party in this action to disobey a lawful directive from another court.

14 **9. UNAUTHORIZED DISCLOSURE OF PROTECTED MATERIAL**

15 If a Receiving Party learns that, by inadvertence or otherwise, it has disclosed Protected
16 Material to any person or in any circumstance not authorized under this Stipulated Protective
17 Order, the Receiving Party must immediately (a) notify in writing the Designating Party of the
18 unauthorized disclosures, (b) use its best efforts to retrieve all copies of the Protected Material,
19 (c) inform the person or persons to whom unauthorized disclosures were made of all the terms of
20 this Order, and (d) request such person or persons to execute the “Acknowledgment and
21 Agreement to Be Bound” that is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

22 **10. FILING PROTECTED MATERIAL** Without written permission from the

23 Designating Party or a court order secured after appropriate notice to all interested persons, a
24 Party may not file in the public record in this action any Protected Material. A Party that seeks
25 to file under seal any Protected Material must comply with Civil Local Rule 79-5.

26 **11. FINAL DISPOSITION** Unless otherwise ordered or agreed in writing by the

27 Producing Party, within sixty days after the final termination of this action, each Receiving Party
28 must return all Protected Material to the Producing Party. As used in this subdivision, “all
29 Protected Material” includes all copies, abstracts, compilations, summaries or any other form of

1 reproducing or capturing any of the Protected Material. With permission in writing from the
2 Designating Party, the Receiving Party may destroy some or all of the Protected Material instead
3 of returning it. Whether the Protected Material is returned or destroyed, the Receiving Party
4 must submit a written certification to the Producing Party (and, if not the same person or entity,
5 to the Designating Party) by the sixty day deadline that identifies (by category, where
6 appropriate) all the Protected Material that was returned or destroyed and that affirms that the
7 Receiving Party has not retained any copies, abstracts, compilations, summaries or other forms
8 of reproducing or capturing any of the Protected Material. Notwithstanding this provision,
9 Counsel are entitled to retain an archival copy of all pleadings, motion papers, transcripts, legal
10 memoranda, correspondence or attorney work product, even if such materials contain Protected
11 Material. Any such archival copies that contain or constitute Protected Material remain subject
12 to this Protective Order as set forth in Section 4 (DURATION), above.

13 **12. MISCELLANEOUS**

14 12.1 Right to Further Relief. Nothing in this Order abridges the right of any person to
15 seek its modification by the Court in the future.

16 12.2 Right to Assert Other Objections. By stipulating to the entry of this Protective
17 Order no Party waives any right it otherwise would have to object to disclosing or producing any
18 information or item on any ground not addressed in this Stipulated Protective Order. Similarly,
19 no Party waives any right to object on any ground to use in evidence of any of the material
20 covered by this Protective Order.

21 **PURSUANT TO THE STIPULATION OF ALL PARTIES TO THIS ACTION, IT**
22 **IS SO ORDERED.**
