18. Subject to the conditions and limitations prescribed by "The General Corporation Act" of Illinois, this corporation shall have the following powers, rights and privileges:

To have succession by its corporate name for the period limited in its certificate of incorporation, or any amendment thereof;

To sue or be sued in its corporate name;

To have and use a common seal and alter the same at pleasure;

To have a capital stock of such an amount, and divided into shares with a par value, or without a par value, and to divide such capital stock into such classes, with such preferences, rights, values and interests as may be provided in the article of incorporation, or any amendment thereof;

To acquire, and to own, possess and enjoy so much real and personal property as may be necessary for the transaction of the business of such corporation, and to lease, mortgage, pledge, sell, convey or transfer the same; and to acquire and to own real property, improved or unimproved, for the purpose of providing homes for its employees or aiding its employees to acquire and own homes and to improve, lease, mortgage, contract to sell, convey or transfer the same, and to loan money to its employees for such purpose upon such terms as may be agreed upon.

To own, purchase or otherwise acquire, whether in exchange for the issuance of its own stock, bonds, or other obligations or otherwise, and to hold, vote, pledge, or dispose of the stocks, bonds, and other evidences of indebtedness of any corporation, domestic or foreign;

To borrow money at such rate of interest as the corporation may determine without regard to or restrictions under any usury law of this State and to mortgage or pledge its property, both real and personal, to secure the payment thereof;

To elect officers, appoint agents, define their duties and fix their compensation;

To lease, exchange or sell all of the corporate assets with the consent of two-thirds of all of the outstanding capital stock of the corporation at any annual meeting or at any special meeting called for that purpose;

To make by-laws not inconsistent with the laws of this State for the administration of the business and interests of such corporation;

To conduct business in this State, or other states, the District of Columbia, the territories, possessions, and dependencies of the United States and in foreign countries and to have one or more offices out of this State, and to hold, purchase, mortgage, and convey real and personal property outside of this State necessary and requisite to carry out the object of the corporation;

In time of war to transact any lawful business in aid of the United States in the prosecution of war, to make donations to associations and organizations aiding in war activities and to loan money to the State or Federal government for war purposes;

To cease doing business and to surrender its charter;

To have and to exercise all the powers necessary and convenient to carry into effect the purpose for which such corporation is formed.

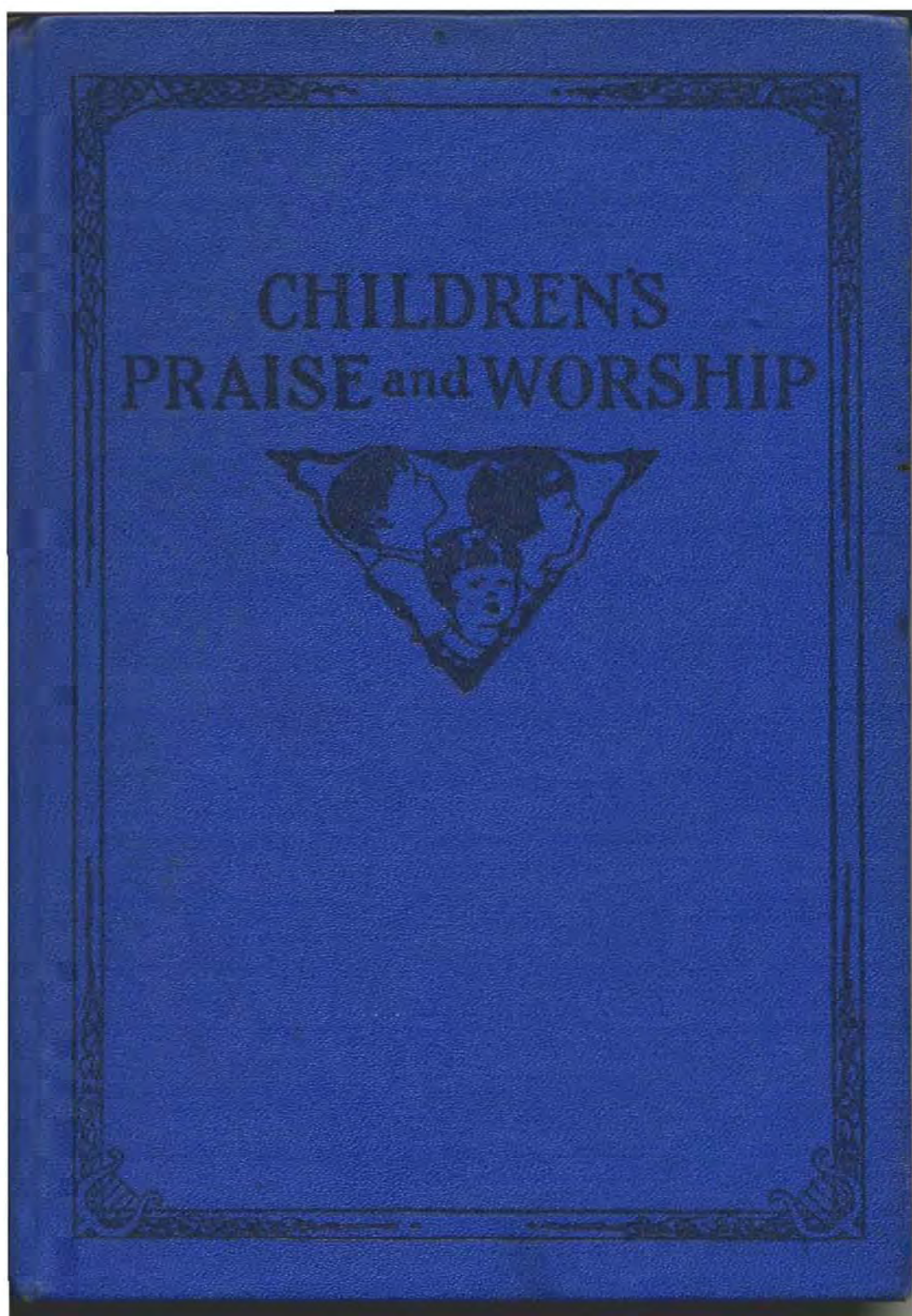

Preface

The interest in child study with a view to more successful Sunday-school methods has been ever increasing. Instruction has become more specifically adapted to the needs of the respective grades. Teachers are training themselves, as if for their lifework, for instruction in a particular grade. Sunday-school work is looming in importance. And all of this means that any selection of songs intended for children must be in accordance with the best standards.

Fortunately, in the compiling and editing of this collection there have figured, as an advisory committee, two leaders in Sunday-school work who are exponents of the best in child psychology. In fact, the editor has endeavored to follow their lead rather than merely to seek their advice.

Sometimes in the past songs have been placed in books as children's songs merely because of their reference to children and without any regard to adaptation. For example, such songs as *Bring Them In*, *Open the Door for the Children*, and *Gather Them Home Above* are merely evangelistic appeals of adults to adults *about* children, and are not truly children's songs. Such have been consistently omitted from this book.

As implied by the title the aim has been to have material that the children can adapt as their very own in praise and worship, altho under certain topics, of course, it is necessary that children be addressed in the second person. In a general way the endeavor has been to keep the subject matter and the language within the understanding of the child. As exceptions to this there are a few of the best-known old hymns, with which the child should become familiar, even without understanding.

The classification is by subjects, or topics, and not by grades. The attention of teachers is called to the topical index in the rear, where under each topic will be found the gradation indicated by proper symbols in the right-hand column. Thus if one has in mind the subject desired one may select a song for the grade intended, remembering, of course, that all subjects do not apply to all grades. Under *Faith*, for example, will be found no song for *Beginners*, nor will *Juniors* be represented under *Cradle Roll*. The dimensions of these pages recognize the trend away from the diminutive sizes of children's books so prevalent formerly.

In their endeavor to have the best on this line the publishers have gone to considerable expense in the make-up of this book. Hundreds of dollars have been spent for permissions alone. A comparison with others of the standard books of this description will reveal that neither is the size of the book above the average nor is the price asked for it exorbitant. It is hoped, therefore, that it may win a large circulation and prove very useful in the important work of the Sunday school.
