

conference and to file a Joint Rule 26(f) Report not later than fourteen (14) days after they confer. Failure to comply with the following requirements or to cooperate in the preparation of the Joint Rule 26(f) Report may lead to the imposition of sanctions.

Unless there is a likelihood that upon motion by a party the Court would order that any or all discovery is premature, it is advisable for counsel to begin to conduct discovery actively <u>before</u> the Scheduling Conference. At the very least, the parties shall comply fully with the letter and spirit of Rule 26(a) and thereby obtain and produce most of what would be produced in the early stage of discovery.

1. Joint Rule 26(f) Report.

The Joint Rule 26(f) Report, which shall be filed not later than one
week before the scheduling conference, shall be drafted by plaintiff (unless the
parties agree otherwise), but shall be submitted and signed jointly. <u>"Jointly"</u>
<u>contemplates a single report, regardless of how many separately-represented</u>
<u>parties there are.</u> The Joint Rule 26(f) Report shall report on all matters
enumerated below, which include those required to be discussed by Rule 26(f) and
Local Rule 26:

- a. <u>Synopsis</u>: a short synopsis (not to exceed two pages) of the main claims, counterclaims, and/or affirmative defenses.
 - b. <u>Legal issues:</u> a brief description of the key legal issues.
- c. <u>Damages:</u> the realistic range of provable damages.
- 27d.Insurance: whether there is insurance coverage, the extent of28coverage, and whether there is a reservation of rights.

1	e.	Motions: a statement of the likelihood of motions seeking to (I) add
2		other parties or claims or (ii) file amended pleadings or (iii) transfer
3		venue.
4	f.	Discovery and experts: pursuant to Rule 26(f), state what, if any,
5		changes in the disclosures under R. 26(a) should be made; the
6		subjects on which discovery may be needed and whether discovery
7		should be conducted in phases or otherwise be limited; what
8		discovery has been conducted thus far; whether applicable limitations
9		should be changed or other limitations imposed; and whether the
10		Court should enter other orders. Please state how many depositions
11		each side will conduct. Also discuss the proposed time of expert
12		witness disclosures under F.R.Civ.P. 26(a)(2).
13	g.	Dispositive motions: a description of the issues or claims that any
14		party believes may be determined by motion for summary judgment
15		or motion <i>in limine</i> .
16	h.	Settlement and settlement mechanism: a statement of what
17		settlement discussions and/or written communications have occurred
18		(specifically excluding any statement of the terms discussed) and a
19		statement pursuant to the Local Rule 16-15.4 selecting a settlement
20		mechanism under that rule.
21	i.	Trial estimate: a realistic estimate of the time required for trial and
22		whether trial will be by jury or by court. Each side should specify
23		(by number, not by name) how many witnesses it contemplates
24		calling. If the time estimate for trial given in the Rule 26(f) Joint
25		Report exceeds eight court days, counsel shall be prepared to discuss
26		in detail the estimate.
27	j.	<u>Timetable:</u> complete of the Presumptive Schedule of Pretrial Dates
28		form attached as Exhibit A to this Order and attach it to the Rule
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1		26(f) report. Submission of a completed Exhibit A is mandatory. The
2		current entries in the "Weeks Before Trial" column merely reflect
3		what the Court believes are appropriate for many, if not most, cases;
4		those entries are not necessarily applicable to this case, and the form
5		is designed to enable counsel to request the Court to set different last
6		dates by which the key requirements must be completed. Each side
7		should write in the month, day and year it requests for each event.
8		<i>E.g.</i> , for the expert discovery cut-off it might be " $10/7/02$ " for
9		plaintiff and "10/28/02" for defendant, if they cannot agree. At the
10		conference, the Court will review this form with counsel. Each entry
11		proposing dates shall fall on a Monday, except the trial date which is
12		a Tuesday. In appropriate cases the Court will order different dates
13		after it hears from Counsel. The proposed non-expert and expert
14		discovery cut-off date means: the last day by which all depositions
15		must be completed and responses to all previously-served written
16		discovery must be provided. The proposed cut-off date for motions
17		means: the last date on which motions may be heard, not noticed.
18	k.	Other issues: a statement of any other issues affecting the status or
19		management of the case (e.g., unusually complicated technical or
20		technological issues, disputes over protective orders, extraordinarily
21		voluminous document production, non-English speaking witnesses,
22		discovery in foreign jurisdictions, etc.).
23	1.	Conflicts: for conflict purposes, corporate parties must identify all
24		subsidiaries, parents and affiliates.
25	m.	Patent cases: propose dates and methodology for claim construction
26		and Markman hearings. The Court requires the parties to file
27		concurrent opening briefs and concurrent reply briefs for the hearing.
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1		The Court intends to follow the rule for patent cases which have been
2		adopted by the Northern District of California.
3	n.	Magistrates: Do the parties wish to have a Magistrate Judge preside?
4		Under 28 U.S.C. § 636, the parties may consent to have a Magistrate
5		Judge preside over all the proceedings, not just discovery. They may
6		pick any Magistrate Judge (not just the one assigned to this case)
7		from among those Magistrate Judges who accept these designations.
8		(They are identified on the Central District's website, which also
9		contains the consent form.)
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11	The Joint R	ule 26(f) Report should set forth the above enumerated information
12	under section	on headings corresponding to this Order.
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14	2.	Scheduling Conference.
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16		Scheduling Conferences will be held in the Ronald Reagan Building,
17	411 West Fourth Street, Court Room 10C, Santa Ana. Counsel shall comply with	
18	the followir	ng:

20	a.	Participation. The lead trial attorney must attend the Scheduling
21		Conference, unless excused for good cause shown in advance of the
22		Scheduling Conference.
23	b.	Continuance. A continuance of the Scheduling Conference will be
24		granted only for good cause.
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26	3.	Protective Orders.
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1	If you seek a protective order, propose it to opposing counsel before			
2	the Scheduling Conference, if at all possible. Protective Orders are considered by			
3	the Magistrate Judge assigned in this action.			
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5	4. <u>Notice to be Provided by Counsel</u> .			
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7	Plaintiff's counsel or, if plaintiff is appearing pro se, defendant's			
8	counsel, shall provide this Order to any parties who first appear after the date of			
9	this Order and to parties who are known to exist but have not yet entered			
10	appearances.

12	5. <u>Disclosures to Clients</u> .			
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14	Counsel are ordered to deliver to their respective clients a copy of			
15	this Order and of the Court's Scheduling and Case Management Order, which			
16	contains the schedule that the Court sets at the Scheduling Conference.

18	6. <u>Court's Website</u> .
