Plaintiff Leonard Johnson is proceeding in this civil rights action pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983. Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 636(c), the parties consented to the jurisdiction of the United States magistrate judge. Local Rule 302.

This action is proceeding against Defendant Humberto Rodriguez for excessive force in violation of the Eighth Amendment. This matter was set for a telephonic hearing on **June 12, 2015**, for purposes of pretrial confirmation hearing. The matter is now set for a four day jury trial beginning on **August 18, 2015, at 8:30 a.m.**

In preparation of trial, the parties are required to file Pretrial Statements in accordance with the schedule set forth herein. In addition to the matters already required to be addressed in the pretrial statement in accordance with Local Rule 281, Plaintiff will be required to make a particularized

1 showing in order to obtain the attendance of witnesses. The procedures and requirements for making  
2 such a showing are outlined in detail below.

3 **1. Pretrial Statement (Local Rule 281)**

4 The parties shall file a joint pretrial statement no later **than June 8, 2015**. The Telephonic  
5 Pretrial Confirmation hearing will be held **June 12, 2015**, before the United States Magistrate Judge  
6 Stanley A. Boone in Courtroom 9.

7 The form and content of the Pretrial Statement must comply with Local Rule 281. Pursuant to  
8 Local Rule 281(b), the Pretrial Statement shall including the following matters, under the following  
9 captions, and in the following order:

10 **(1) Jurisdiction – Venue.** The factual and statutory basis of federal jurisdiction and venue  
11 and whether there is any dispute concerning jurisdiction or venue;

12 **(2) Jury – Non-Jury.** Whether the party has demanded a jury trial of all or any of the  
13 issues or, if not, whether a demand for jury trial made by any other party is conceded or contested;

14 **(3) Undisputed Facts.** A plain, concise statement of the facts that are undisputed;

15 **(4) Disputed Factual Issues.** A plain, concise statement of each fact (and any related  
16 essential facts) that the party claims or concedes to be in dispute;

17 **(5) Disputed Evidentiary Issues.** A plain, concise summary of any reasonably anticipated  
18 disputes concerning admissibility of live and deposition testimony, physical and demonstrative  
19 evidence and the use of special technology at trial, including computer animation, video discs, and  
20 other high technology, and a statement whether each such dispute should be resolved by motion in  
21 limine, briefed in the trial, brief, or addressed in some other manner;

22 **(6) Special Factual Information in Certain Actions.** In addition to the facts and issues  
23 described in (3) through (5), the following special information with respect to the following types of  
24 actions shall be specified within either the disputed or undisputed facts sections as appropriate:

25 \*\*\*

26 **(iv) In tort actions for personal injury, wrongful death or property damage:**

27 (A) The date, place, and general nature of the incident; the particular acts,  
28 omissions, or conditions constituting the basis for liability; the particular acts, omissions or conditions

1 constituting the basis of any defense; any statute, ordinance, or regulation violated by either party; the  
2 applicability of the doctrine of strict liability or res ipsa loquitur.

3 (B) Each plaintiff's age; injuries sustained; any prior injury or condition worsened;  
4 periods of hospitalization; medical expenses and estimated future medical expenses; the period of total  
5 and/or partial disability; annual, monthly, or weekly earnings before the incident; earnings loss to date  
6 and estimated diminution of future earnings power; property damage; general damages; punitive  
7 damages;

8 (7) **Relief Sought.** The elements of monetary damage, if any, and the specific nature of any  
9 other relief sought;

10 (8) **Points of Law.** A statement of the legal theory or theories of recovery or of defense  
11 and of any points of law (substantive or procedural) that are or may reasonably be expected to be in  
12 controversy, citing the pertinent statutes, ordinances, regulations, cases, and other authorities relied  
13 upon. Extended legal argument is not required in the pretrial statement;

14 (9) **Abandoned Issues.** A statement of all issues raised by the pleadings that have been  
15 abandoned, including, for example, claims for relief and affirmative defenses;

16 (10) **Witnesses.** A list (names and addresses) of all prospective witnesses, whether offered  
17 in person or by deposition or interrogatory, designating those who are expert witnesses. Only  
18 witnesses so listed will be permitted to testify at the trial, except as may be otherwise provided in the  
19 pretrial order;

20 (11) **Exhibits – Schedules and Summaries.** A list of documents or other exhibits that the  
21 party expects to offer at trial. Only exhibits so listed will be permitted to be offered at trial except as  
22 may be otherwise provided in the pretrial order.

23 (12) **Discovery Documents.** A list of all portions of depositions, answers to interrogatories,  
24 and responses to requests for admission that the party expects to offer at trial;

25 (13) **Further Discovery or Motions.** Any requests for further discovery or pretrial  
26 motions. Whether discovery and/or law and motion has been terminated by a Court order, counsel  
27 shall set forth the grounds for relief from that order and why a motion to be relieved was not made  
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1 before the date ordered in the status conference for termination. Motions for relief at pretrial are not  
2 favored and will ordinarily be denied unless the moving party makes a strong showing;

3 **(14) Stipulations.** Any stipulations requested or offered for pretrial or trial purposes;

4 **(15) Amendments – Dismissals.** Any requested amendments to pleadings, dismissals,  
5 additions or subtractions of parties, or dispositions as to defaulting parties;

6 **(16) Settlement Negotiations.** A statement whether settlement negotiations between parties  
7 and/or a court settlement conference under L.R. 270 would be helpful;

8 **(17) Agreed Statements.** A statement whether presentation of all or part of the action upon  
9 an Agreed Statement of Facts is feasible and advisable;

10 **(18) Separate Trial of Issues.** A statement whether separate trial of any of the issues is  
11 feasible and advisable;

12 **(19) Impartial Experts – Limitation of Experts.** A statement whether appointment by the  
13 Court of impartial expert witnesses or limitation of the number of experts witnesses is advisable;

14 **(20) Attorneys’ Fees.** A statement whether attorney’s fees are sought and the time and  
15 manner in which they are to be ascertained. See L.R. 293;

16 **(21) Trial Exhibits.** Any special handling of trial exhibits and a statement of advisability of  
17 court retention of exhibits pending appeal decision. See L.R. 138(e);

18 **(22) Trial Protective Order.** Whether a trial protective order will be sought pursuant to  
19 L.R. 141.1(b)(2); and

20 **(23) Miscellaneous.** Any other appropriate comments, suggestions, or information that  
21 might aid in the disposition of the action, including references to any matters set forth in Fed. R. Civ.  
22 P. 16(c).

23 **A party’s failure to comply with any of these pretrial statement requirements may result**  
24 **in the Court’s excluding witnesses, evidence and/or legal issues related to the case at trial.**

25 **2. Plaintiff’s Witness Procedures:**

26 Because the Plaintiff is an incarcerated state prisoner, the plaintiff must comply with certain  
27 procedures associated with introducing evidence and bringing witnesses to trial.

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1 Plaintiff must be prepared to introduce evidence to prove each of the alleged facts that support  
2 the claims raised in the lawsuit. In general, there are two kinds of trial evidence: (1) exhibits and (2)  
3 the testimony of witnesses. It is Plaintiff's responsibility to produce all of the evidence to prove his  
4 case, whether that evidence is in the form of exhibits or witness testimony. If Plaintiff wants to call  
5 witnesses to testify, he must follow certain procedures to ensure that the witnesses will be at the trial  
6 and available to testify. Plaintiff is advised that failure to comply with the procedures set forth below  
7 may result in the preclusion of any and all witnesses named in his pretrial statement. Notwithstanding  
8 the requirements set forth herein, a motion for the attendance of incarcerated witnesses will only be  
9 granted by the Court if the moving party has shown the witnesses have relevant information and the  
10 Court determines the witnesses' presence will substantially further the resolution of the case. Wiggins  
11 v. Cnty. Of Alameda, 717 F.2d 466, 468 n.1 (9th Cir. 1983). The decision to grant or deny the motion  
12 is within the discretion of the trial judge.

13 The following procedures are required to ensure the attendance of Plaintiff's witnesses at trial.  
14 The witnesses may be incarcerated or unincarcerated and willing or unwilling to testify voluntarily.

15 **a. Procedures for Obtaining Attendance of *Incarcerated Witnesses Who Agree to***  
16 ***Testify Voluntarily***

17 An incarcerated witness who agrees voluntarily to attend trial to give testimony cannot come to  
18 court unless the Court orders the warden or other custodian to permit the witness to be transported to  
19 court. The Court will not issue such an order unless it is satisfied that the prospective witness has  
20 actual knowledge of relevant facts.

21 A party intending to introduce the testimony of incarcerated witnesses who have agreed  
22 voluntarily to attend the trial must serve and file a written motion for a court order requiring that such  
23 witnesses be brought to court at the time of trial. The motion must: (1) state the name, address, and  
24 prison identification number of each such witness; and (2) be accompanied by declarations showing  
25 that each witness is willing to testify and that each witness has actual knowledge of relevant facts.  
26 The motion should be entitled "Motion for Attendance of Incarcerated Witnesses."

27 The willingness of the prospective witness can be shown in one of two ways: (1) the party  
28 himself can swear by declaration under penalty of perjury that the prospective witness has informed

1 the party that he or she is willing to testify voluntarily without being subpoenaed, in which declaration  
2 the party must state when and where the prospective witness informed the party of this willingness; or  
3 (2) the party can serve and file a declaration, signed under penalty of perjury by the prospective  
4 witness, in which the witness states that he or she is willing to testify without being subpoenaed.

5 The prospective witness's actual knowledge of relevant facts can be shown in one of two ways:  
6 (1) if the party has actual firsthand knowledge that the prospective witness was an eyewitness or an  
7 ear-witness to the relevant facts (e.g., if an incident occurred in Plaintiff's cell and, at the time,  
8 Plaintiff saw that a cellmate was present and observed the incident, Plaintiff may swear to the  
9 cellmate's ability to testify), the party himself can swear by declaration under penalty of perjury that  
10 the prospective witness has actual knowledge; or (2) the party can serve and file a declaration signed  
11 under penalty of perjury by the prospective witness in which the witness describes the relevant facts to  
12 which the prospective witness was an eye or ear witness. Whether the declaration is made by the party  
13 or by the prospective witness, it must be specific about the incident, when and where it occurred, who  
14 was present, and how the prospective witness happened to be in a position to see or to hear what  
15 occurred at the time it occurred.

16 The Court will review and rule on the motion for attendance of incarcerated witnesses,  
17 specifying which prospective witnesses must be brought to court. Subsequently, the Court will issue  
18 the order necessary to cause the witness's custodian to bring the witness to court.

19 Plaintiff shall file any motions for the attendance of incarcerated witnesses who are willing to  
20 testify, on or before April 27, 2015. Oppositions, if any, must be filed on or before May 11, 2015.  
21 After the filing deadlines, the Court will take the matter under submission and rule accordingly. If the  
22 Court finds the need to set a hearing, the Court will notify the parties.

23 **b. Procedures for Obtaining Attendance of *Incarcerated Witnesses Who Refuse to***  
24 **Testify Voluntarily**

25 If a party seeks to obtain the attendance of incarcerated witnesses who refuse to testify  
26 voluntarily, the party must submit a motion for the attendance of such witnesses. An incarcerated  
27 witness cannot come to court unless the Court orders the warden or other custodian to permit the  
28 witness to be transported to court. The Court will not issue an order unless it is satisfied that the

1 prospective witness has actual knowledge of relevant facts. In addition, the party must indicate in the  
2 motion that the incarcerated witnesses are not willing to testify voluntarily.

3 The motion must: (1) state the name, address, and prison identification number of each such  
4 witness; and (2) be accompanied by a showing that each witness has actual knowledge of relevant  
5 facts. The motion should be entitled “Motion for Attendance of Incarcerated Witnesses.”

6 The prospective witness’s actual knowledge of relevant facts can be shown in one of two ways:  
7 (1) if the party has actual firsthand knowledge that the prospective witness was an eyewitness or an  
8 ear-witness to the relevant facts (e.g., if an incident occurred in Plaintiff’s cell and, at the time,  
9 Plaintiff saw that a cellmate was present and observed the incident, Plaintiff may swear to the  
10 cellmate’s ability to testify), the party himself can swear by declaration under penalty of perjury that  
11 the prospective witness has actual knowledge; or (2) the party can serve and file a declaration signed  
12 under penalty of perjury by the prospective witness in which the witness describes the relevant facts to  
13 which the prospective witness was an eye or ear witness. Whether the declaration is made by the party  
14 or by the prospective witness, it must be specific about the incident, when and where it occurred, who  
15 was present, and how the prospective witness happened to be in a position to see or to hear what  
16 occurred at the time it occurred.

17 The Court will review and rule on the motion for attendance of incarcerated witnesses,  
18 specifying which prospective witnesses must be brought to court. Subsequently, the Court will issue  
19 the order necessary to cause the witness’s custodian to bring the witness to court.

20 Plaintiff shall file any motions for the attendance of incarcerated witnesses who are willing to  
21 testify, on or before April 27, 2015. Oppositions, if any, must be filed on or before May 11, 2015. As  
22 previously stated, after the filing deadlines, the matter will be taken under submission and the Court  
23 will rule accordingly. If the Court finds the need to set a hearing, the Court will notify the parties.

24 **c. Procedures for Obtaining Attendance of *Unincarcerated Witnesses Who Agree to***  
25 **Testify Voluntarily**

26 It is the responsibility of the party who has secured an unincarcerated witness’s voluntary  
27 attendance to notify the witness of the time and date of trial. No action need be sought or obtained  
28 from the Court. However, the parties are advised that if a witness subsequently refuses to testify prior

1 to trial, the Court will not continue the trial date to allow the party to compel the attendance of the  
2 witness at trial, absent a showing of extraordinary circumstances.

3 **d. Procedures for Obtaining Attendance of *Unincarcerated Witnesses Who Refuse to***  
4 **Testify Voluntarily**

5 If a prospective witness is not incarcerated, and he or she refuses to testify voluntarily, the  
6 witness must be served with a subpoena. Fed. R. Civ. P. 45. In addition, the party seeking the  
7 witness's presence must tender an appropriate sum of money for the witness. Id. In the case of an  
8 unincarcerated witness, the appropriate sum of money is the daily witness fee of \$40.00 plus the  
9 witness's travel expenses. 28 U.S.C. § 1821.

10 If Plaintiff wishes to obtain the attendance of one or more unincarcerated witnesses who refuse  
11 to testify voluntarily, Plaintiff must first notify the Court in writing of the name and location of each  
12 unincarcerated witness. The Court will calculate the travel expense for each unincarcerated witness  
13 and notify Plaintiff of the amount(s). Plaintiff must then, for each witness, submit a money order  
14 made payable to the witness for the full amount of the witness's travel expenses plus the daily witness  
15 fee of \$40.00. The subpoena will not be served upon the unincarcerated witness by the United States  
16 Marshal unless the money order is tendered to the Court. Because no statute authorizes the use of  
17 public funds for these expenses in civil cases, the tendering of witness fees and travel expenses is  
18 required even if the party was granted leave to proceed in forma pauperis.

19 If Plaintiff wishes to have the United States Marshal serve any unincarcerated witnesses who  
20 refuse to testify voluntarily, Plaintiff must submit the money orders to the Court no later than April 27,  
21 2015. In order to ensure timely submission of the money orders, Plaintiff must notify the Court of the  
22 names and locations of his witnesses, on or before April 20, 2015.

23 **3. Motions In Limine Hearing and Briefing Schedule**

24 Any party may file a motion in limine, which is a procedural mechanism to limit in advance  
25 testimony or evidence in a particular area. United States v. Heller, 551 F.3d 1108, 1111 (9th Cir.  
26 2009). In the case of a jury trial, the Court's ruling gives Plaintiff and Defendants' counsel advance  
27 notice of the scope of certain evidence so that admissibility is settled before attempted use of the  
28 evidence before the jury. Id. at 1111-1112. Although the Federal Rules do not explicitly provide for



1 the filing of motions in limine, the Court has the inherent power to hear and decide such motions as a  
2 function of its duty to expeditiously manage trials by eliminating evidence that is clearly inadmissible  
3 for any purpose. Luce v. United States, 469 U.S. 38, 41 n.4 (1984).

4 This Court further orders the parties to file motions in limine only with respect to important,  
5 critical issues. Motions in limine on abstract evidentiary issues or issues more appropriately addressed  
6 by the Court on a case-by-case basis (such as a motion in limine to exclude all irrelevant evidence)  
7 will be looked upon with disfavor. After satisfying the forgoing, if a motion in limine still seeks to  
8 address the admissibility of a particular trial exhibit, the exhibit in question must be referenced by the  
9 trial exhibit number so that the court can review the actual exhibit for admissibility. If the exhibit  
10 sought to be admitted would not be in the court's possession one week prior to the motion in limine  
11 hearing, then the exhibit in question must be included in the motion. Failure to properly reference or  
12 attach an exhibit in the motion will result in the request being denied.

13 The parties shall not file separate motions in limine for every issue presented to the Court.  
14 Rather, if a party wishes to file a motion in limine, each party shall file one consolidated motion in  
15 limine which is subdivided into separate sections for each issue setting for the legal authority and  
16 analysis. The responding party shall file one opposition in response addressing each motion in limine  
17 issue in a separate section.

18 The deadline for service and filing of motions in limine is **July 14, 2015**. The deadline for  
19 service and filing of an opposition, if any, is due **July 28, 2015**. A telephonic motions in limine  
20 hearing will be held on **August 6, 2015, at 2:00 p.m.**, in Courtroom 9, before the undersigned.  
21 Counsel for defendants is directed to arrange for telephone contact with Plaintiff and to contact the  
22 Courtroom Deputy, Mamie Hernandez, at (559) 499-5672, prior to the hearing date, to receive  
23 instructions regarding the conference call.

#### 24 **4. Pre-Marked and Exchange of Exhibits**

25 As noted below, no later than **July 16, 2015**, the parties shall exchange their final exhibit list  
26 and pre-marked exhibits, to be addressed at the **August 6, 2015**, motion in limine hearing.

27 All exhibits must be pre-marked with an exhibit sticker or other legible numbering/lettering.  
28 This requirement that exhibits be pre-marked applies both to evidence that will be formally admitted

1 into evidence as well as any other exhibits that will be presented in any manner during trial, such as  
2 “demonstrative” evidence. Each individual “original” exhibit that will be submitted to the jury must  
3 be stapled/fastened so that the exhibit does not become separated. Further, exhibits submitted to the  
4 jury must be pre-marked on the front page only in the manner described above. Impeachment or  
5 rebuttal evidence need not be pre-marked. However, evidence of bias, extrinsically introduced, must  
6 be pre-marked.

- 7           a.       **Joint Exhibits:** Joint exhibits are those exhibits which all parties agree may be  
8 admitted into evidence without the need for laying a proper foundation under  
9 the Federal Rules of Evidence. Joint exhibits must be pre-marked with the  
10 designation “J-[Number]” (e.g., J-1, J-2). Those exhibits may be introduced at  
11 any time during the course of the trial. However, joint exhibits are not  
12 “automatically” admitted into evidence: at least one of the parties must admit a  
13 joint exhibit into evidence. If an exhibit is not admitted by any party, the  
14 exhibit will not be given to the jury despite its “joint” designation as an exhibit.
- 15           b.       **Plaintiff’s Exhibits:** Plaintiff’s exhibits must be pre-marked using **numbers**  
16 beginning with 1 (e.g., 1, 2, etc.).
- 17           c.       **Defendant’s Exhibits:** Defendant’s exhibits must be pre-marked using **letters**  
18 beginning with A (e.g., A, B, C...AA, BB, CC...AAA, BBB, CCC, etc.).

19           No later than **July 16, 2015**, the parties shall exchange their proposed exhibits to allow for the  
20 parties to file objections to be addressed at the motion in limine hearing on **August 6, 2015**.

21           Further instructions on the submission and use of exhibits during trial will be provided in the pretrial  
22 order in this matter.

23           The parties are required to submit trial exhibits for each party in binders. Counsel shall submit  
24 **three (3) complete, legible and identical sets of exhibits in binders** on or about **August 11, 2015**.  
25 Within the binders, the pre-marked exhibits must be separately tabbed and assembled in sequential  
26 order. All of Plaintiff’s exhibits shall be marked sequentially beginning with 1 (e.g., 1, 2, etc.). All of  
27 Defendants’ exhibits shall be marked sequentially beginning with A (e.g., A, B, C...AA, BB,  
28 CC...AAA, BBB, CCC, etc.). The binders shall be delivered to Courtroom Deputy Clerk Mamie

1 Hernandez prior to trial at a date set forth in the pretrial order.

2 **CONCLUSION AND ORDER**

3 IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that:

4 1. This matter is set for telephonic pretrial confirmation hearing before the Honorable  
5 Stanley A. Boone on **June 12, 2015, at 9:30 a.m.** in Courtroom 9;

6 2. Motions in limine are due on or before **July 11, 2015.** Oppositions to the motions in  
7 limine are due on or before **July 28, 2015.** This matter is set for motion in limine hearing before the  
8 Honorable Stanley A. Boone on **August 6, at 2:00 p.m.,** in Courtroom 9;

9 3. This matter is set for jury trial before the Honorable Stanley A. Boone on **August 18,**  
10 **2015, at 8:30 a.m.** in Courtroom 9;

11 4. Counsel for Defendants is required to arrange for the participation of Plaintiff in the  
12 telephonic trial confirmation hearing and motion in limine hearing and to contact Courtroom Deputy,  
13 Mamie Hernandez, at (559) 499-5672, prior to the hearing date, to receive instructions regarding the  
14 conference call;

15 5. The parties shall file their joint pretrial statement on or before **June 8, 2015;**

16 7. In addition to electronically filing their pretrial statement, Defendants shall e-mail the  
17 pretrial statement to: **saborders@caed.uscourts.gov;**

18 8. If Plaintiff intends to call incarcerated witnesses at time of trial, Plaintiff shall serve and  
19 file a motion for attendance of incarcerated witnesses as described in this order on or before **April 27,**  
20 **2015;**

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9. The opposition to the motion for the attendance of incarcerated witnesses, if any, shall be filed on or before **May 11, 2015**; and

10. If Plaintiff wishes to obtain the attendance of unincarcerated witnesses who refuse to testify voluntarily, Plaintiff must notify the Court of their names and locations on or before **April 20, 2015**, and Plaintiff must submit the money orders, as described in subsection 4 of this order, to the Court on or before **April 27, 2015**.

IT IS SO ORDERED.
