A mid-discovery status conference is scheduled for September 12, 2016 at 8:30 a.m. before the Honorable Jennifer L. Thurston, U.S. Magistrate Judge, located at 510 19th Street, Bakersfield, California. Counsel SHALL file a joint mid-discovery status conference report one week before the conference. Counsel also SHALL lodge the status report via e-mail to JLTorders@caed.uscourts.gov. The joint statement SHALL outline the discovery counsel have completed and that which needs to be completed as well as any impediments to completing the discovery within the deadlines set forth in this order. Counsel may appear via CourtCall, providing a written notice of the intent to appear telephonically is provided to the Magistrate Judge's Courtroom Deputy Clerk no later than five court days before the noticed hearing date.

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## VI. **Pre-Trial Motion Schedule**

All non-dispositive pre-trial motions, including any discovery motions, shall be filed no later than April 21, 2017, and heard on or before May 19, 2017. The Court hears non-dispositive motions at 16 9:00 a.m. at the United States District Courthouse in Bakersfield, California.

17 No motion to amend or stipulation to amend the case schedule will be entertained unless it is filed at least one week before the first deadline the parties wish to extend. Likewise, no written 18 19 discovery motions shall be filed without the prior approval of the assigned Magistrate Judge. A party 20 with a discovery dispute must first confer with the opposing party in a good faith effort to resolve by 21 agreement the issues in dispute. If that good faith effort is unsuccessful, the moving party promptly shall seek a telephonic hearing with all involved parties and the Magistrate Judge. It shall be the 22 23 obligation of the moving party to arrange and originate the conference call to the court. To schedule 24 this telephonic hearing, the parties are ordered to contact the Courtroom Deputy Clerk, Susan Hall, at 25 (661) 326-6620 or via email at SHall@caed.uscourts.gov. Counsel must comply with Local Rule 251 26 with respect to discovery disputes or the motion will be denied without prejudice and dropped 27 from the Court's calendar.

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All dispositive pre-trial motions shall be filed no later than May 31, 2017, and heard no later

than June 28, 2017, before the Honorable Jennifer L. Thurston, United States Magistrate Judge, at the 1 2 United States District Courthouse in Bakersfield, California. In scheduling such motions, counsel shall 3 comply with Fed. R. Civ. P. 56 and Local Rules 230 and 260.

VII. Motions for Summary Judgment or Summary Adjudication

At least 21 days before filing a motion for summary judgment or motion for summary adjudication, the parties are **ORDERED** to meet, in person or by telephone, to confer about the issues to be raised in the motion.

8 The purpose of the meeting shall be to: 1) avoid filing motions for summary judgment where a question of fact exists; 2) determine whether the respondent agrees that the motion has merit in whole 9 10 or in part; 3) discuss whether issues can be resolved without the necessity of briefing; 4) narrow the issues for review by the court; 5) explore the possibility of settlement before the parties incur the 11 12 expense of briefing a motion; and 6) to develop a joint statement of undisputed facts.

The moving party **SHALL** initiate the meeting and **SHALL** provide a complete, proposed 13 14 statement of undisputed facts at least five days before the conference. The finalized joint statement of undisputed facts **SHALL** include all facts that the parties agree, for purposes of the motion, may be 15 16 deemed true. In addition to the requirements of Local Rule 260, the moving party shall file the joint statement of undisputed facts. 17

In the notice of motion the moving party SHALL certify that the parties have met and conferred 18 as ordered above, or set forth a statement of good cause for the failure to meet and confer. Failure to 19 20 comply may result in the motion being stricken.

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VIII. Pre-Trial Conference Date

August 7, 2017 at 8:30 a.m. in Courtroom 5 before Judge Drozd.

The parties are ordered to file a Joint Pretrial Statement pursuant to Local Rule 281(a)(2). The parties are further directed to submit a digital copy of their pretrial statement in Word format, directly to Judge Drozd's chambers, by email at DADorders@caed.uscourts.gov.

Counsels' attention is directed to Rules 281 and 282 of the Local Rules of Practice for the 27 Eastern District of California, as to the obligations of counsel in preparing for the pre-trial conference. The Court will insist upon strict compliance with those rules. In addition to the matters set forth in the

Local Rules the Joint Pretrial Statement shall include a Joint Statement of the case to be used by the 1 2 Court to explain the nature of the case to the jury during voir dire.

IX. **Trial Date** 

September 25, 2017, at 8:30 a.m. at the United States District Courthouse in Bakersfield, California, before the Honorable Jennifer L. Thurston, United States Magistrate Judge.

This is a jury trial. A.

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## X. **Settlement Conference**

A Settlement Conference is scheduled for May 18, 2017 at 10:00 a.m. with Magistrate Judge Sheila K. Oberto in Courtroom 7 at the Robert E. Coyle United States Courthouse in Fresno, California.

Unless otherwise permitted in advance by the Court, the attorneys who will try the case shall 13 appear at the Settlement Conference with the parties and the person or persons having full authority 14 to negotiate and settle the case **on any terms**<sup>1</sup> at the conference. Consideration of settlement is a 15 16 serious matter that requires preparation prior to the settlement conference. Set forth below are the procedures the Court will employ, absent good cause, in conducting the conference. 17

At least 21 days before the settlement conference, Plaintiff SHALL submit to Defendant via 18 fax or e-mail, a written itemization of damages and a meaningful<sup>2</sup> settlement demand which includes a 19 brief explanation of why such a settlement is appropriate. Thereafter, no later than 14 days before the 20 21 settlement conference, Defendant **SHALL** respond, via fax or e-mail, with an acceptance of the offer or with a meaningful counteroffer, which includes a brief explanation of why such a settlement is 22

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<sup>1</sup> Insurance carriers, business organizations, and governmental bodies or agencies whose settlement agreements

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are subject to approval by legislative bodies, executive committees, boards of directors or the like shall be represented by a person or persons who occupy high executive positions in the party organization and who will be directly involved in the process of approval of any settlement offers or agreements. To the extent possible the representative shall have the authority, if he or she deems it appropriate, to settle the action on terms consistent with the opposing party's most recent demand.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> "Meaningful" means that the offer is reasonably calculated to settle the case on terms acceptable to the offering 27 party. "Meaningful" does not include an offer which the offering party knows will not be acceptable to the other party. If, however, the offering party is only willing to offer a settlement which it knows the other party will not accept, this should 28 trigger a recognition the case is not in a settlement posture and the parties should confer about continuing or vacating the settlement conference via stipulation.

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If settlement is not achieved, each party SHALL attach copies of their settlement offers to their Confidential Settlement Conference Statement, as described below. Copies of these documents shall not be filed on the court docket.

## CONFIDENTIAL SETTLEMENT CONFERENCE STATEMENT

At least five court days prior to the Settlement Conference, the parties shall submit, directly to 6 7 Judge Oberto chambers by e-mail to SKOorders@caed.uscourts.gov, a Confidential Settlement 8 Conference Statement. The statement should not be filed with the Clerk of the Court nor served on any other party, although the parties may file a Notice of Lodging of Settlement Conference 9 10 Statement. Each statement shall be clearly marked "confidential" with the date and time of the Settlement Conference indicated prominently thereon. 11

The Confidential Settlement Conference Statement shall include the following:

- A brief statement of the facts of the case. A.
- 14 Β. A brief statement of the claims and defenses, i.e., statutory or other grounds upon which the claims are founded; a forthright evaluation of the parties' likelihood of prevailing on 16 the claims and defenses; and a description of the major issues in dispute.
- C. 17 A summary of the proceedings to date.
  - An estimate of the cost and time to be expended for further discovery, pretrial and trial. D.
  - E. The relief sought.
  - F. The party's position on settlement, including present demands and offers and a history of past settlement discussions, offers and demands.
- XI. 22 **Request for Bifurcation, Appointment of Special Master, or other Techniques** 23 to Shorten Trial
