14	This case is set for a Settlement Conference before Magistrate Judge Sheila K. Oberto on
15	September 6, 2017, at 9:30 a.m. at the U.S. District Court, 2500 Tulare Street, Fresno,
16	California 93721.
17	Consideration of settlement is a serious matter that requires thorough preparation prior to
18	the settlement conference. Accordingly, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that:
19	1. Pre-settlement Conference Exchange of Demand and Offer
20	A settlement conference is more likely to be productive if, before the conference, the
21	parties exchange written settlement proposals. Accordingly, no later than August 21, 2017,
22	plaintiff's counsel shall submit a written itemization of damages and settlement demand to each
23	defense counsel with a brief summary of the legal and factual basis supporting the demand. No
24	later August 25, 2017, defense counsel shall submit a written offer to plaintiff's counsel with a
25	brief summary of the legal and factual basis supporting the offer.
26	2. Submission and Content of Confidential Settlement Conference Statements
27	The parties are to send Confidential Settlement Conference Statements (Settlement
28	Statement) to the following email address: SKOorders@caed.uscourts.gov, to arrive no later than

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1	August 30, 2017. Additionally, each party shall file a Notice of Submission of Confidential
2	Settlement Conference Statement (See L.R. 270 (d)).
3	If the Settlement Conference is continued for any reason, each party must submit a new
4	Settlement Statement that is complete in itself, without reference to any prior Settlement
5	Statements.
6	Settlement Statements must be typed and double spaced. Each Settlement Statement shall
7	include the following:
8	a. A brief summary of the core facts, allegations, and defenses.
9	b. A summary of the proceedings to date.
10	c. An estimate of the cost and time to be expended for further discovery,
11	pretrial, and trial.
12	d. The nature of the relief sought.
13	e. An outline of past settlement efforts including information regarding the
14	"Pre-settlement Conference Exchange of Demand and Offer" required
15	above (including the itemization of damages), and a history of past
16	settlement discussions, offers, and demands.
17	f. A statement of each party's expectations and goals for the Settlement
18	Conference.
19	3. Attendance of Trial Counsel and Parties Required
20	The attorneys who will try the case and parties with full and complete settlement authority
21	are required to personally attend the conference. ¹ An insured party shall appear by a
22	representative of the insurer who is authorized to negotiate, and who has full authority to negotiate
23	and settle the case on any terms. An uninsured corporate party shall appear by a representative
24	authorized to negotiate, and who has full authority to negotiate and settle the case on any terms.
25	¹ Insurance carriers, business organizations, and governmental bodies or agencies whose settlement
26	agreements are subject to approval by legislative bodies, executive committees, boards of directors or the like shall be represented by a person or persons who occupy high executive positions in the party
27	organization and who will be directly involved in the process of approval of any settlement offers or agreements. To the extent possible, the representative shall have the authority, if he or she deems it appropriate to settle the action on terms consistent with the appropriate perturbative meet recent domand.
28	appropriate, to settle the action on terms consistent with the opposing party's most recent demand.

It is difficult for a party who is not present to appreciate the process and the reasons that may
 justify a change in one's perspective toward settlement. Accordingly, having a client with
 authority available by telephone is *not* an acceptable alternative, except under the most
 extenuating circumstances.²

The Court expects both the lawyers and the party representatives to be fully prepared to
participate. The Court encourages all parties to keep an open mind in order to reassess their
previous positions and to discover creative means for resolving the dispute.

8 4. **Issues to Be Discussed** 9 The parties *shall* be prepared to discuss the following at the settlement conference: 10 a. Goals in the litigation and problems they would like to address in the 11 settlement conference and understanding of the opposing side's goals. 12 b. The issues (in and outside the lawsuit) that need to be resolved. 13 The strengths and weaknesses of their case. с. 14 d. Their understanding of the opposing side's view of the case. 15 Their points of agreement and disagreement (factual and legal). e. 16 f. Any financial, emotional, and/or legal impediments to settlement. 17 Whether settlement or further litigation better enables the accomplishment g. 18 of their respective goals. 19 h. Any possibilities for a creative resolution of the dispute. 20 5. **Statements Inadmissible** 21 The parties are expected to address each other with courtesy and respect, and are 22 encouraged to be frank and open in their discussions. Statements made by any party during the 23 settlement conference are not to be used in discovery and will not be admissible at trial. 24 IT IS SO ORDERED. 25 Dated: August 16, 2017 /s/ Sheila K.
