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18	On April 3, 2018, the parties filed a Motion for Protective Order and Stipulated	
19	Protective Order. "The court may, for good cause, issue an order to protect a party or person	
20	from annoyance, embarrassment, oppression, or undue burden or expense." Fed. R. Civ. P. 26(c).	
21	"In the federal judicial system trial and pretrial proceedings are ordinarily to be conducted in	
22	public." Olympic Ref. Co. v. Carter, 332 F.2d 260, 264 (9th Cir. 1964) ("The purpose of the	
23	federal discovery rules, as pointed out in <i>Hickman v. Taylor</i> , 329 U.S. 495, 501, 67 S.Ct. 385, 91	
24	L.Ed. 451, is to force a full disclosure.") "As a general rule, the public is permitted 'access to	
25	litigation documents and information produced during discovery." In re Roman Catholic	
26	Archbishop of Portland in Oregon, 661 F.3d 417, 424 (9th Cir. 2011) (quoting Phillips v. Gen.	
27	Motors Corp., 307 F.3d 1206, 1210 (9th Cir.2002)); San Jose Mercury News, Inc. v. U.S. Dist.	
28	Court, 187 F.3d 1096, 1103 (9th Cir.1999) ("It is well-established that the fruits of pretrial	

discovery are, in the absence of a court order to the contrary, presumptively public."). 1 Eastern District of California Local Rule 141.1 governs the entry of orders protecting 2 confidential information in this District and provides that "All information provided to the Court 3 in a specific action is presumptively public. . . . Confidential information exchanged through 4 discovery, contained in documents to be filed in an action, or presented at a hearing or trial 5 otherwise may be protected by seeking a protective order as described herein." L.R. 141.1(a)(1). 6 Part (c) contains the requirements for a proposed protective order: 7 8 (c) Requirements of a Proposed Protective Order. All stipulations and motions seeking the entry of a protective order shall be accompanied by a proposed form 9 of order. Every proposed protective order shall contain the following provisions: (1) A description of the types of information eligible for protection under 10 the order, with the description provided in general terms sufficient to reveal the nature of the information (e.g., customer list, formula for soda, 11 diary of a troubled child); 12 (2) A showing of particularized need for protection as to each category of information proposed to be covered by the order; and 13 (3) A showing as to why the need for protection should be addressed by a court order, as opposed to a private agreement between or among the 14 parties. 15 L.R. 141.1(c). 16 The Stipulated Protective Order (ECF No. 41) submitted by the parties for Court approval 17 is rejected because it fails to comply with L.R. 141.1(c).
