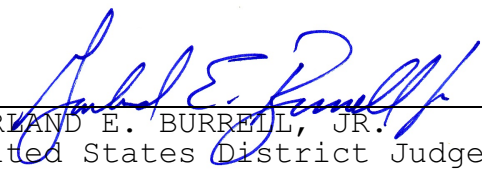
An Order Setting Status (Pretrial Scheduling) Conference was filed April 24, 2009, ("April 24 Order") in which a status conference was scheduled in this case on July 27, 2009, and a joint status report was required to be filed no later than fourteen days prior to the status conference. The Order further required a status report be filed regardless of whether a joint report could be procured. No status report was filed.

Therefore, Plaintiff is Ordered to Show Cause ("OSC") in a writing to be filed no later than 4:00 p.m. on August 10, 2009, why sanctions should not be imposed against her and/or her counsel under Rule 16(f) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure for failure to file a timely status report. Plaintiff shall also state in the written response whether Plaintiff or her counsel is at fault, and whether a

1 hearing is requested on the OSC.¹ If a hearing is requested, it will
2 be held on August 24, 2009, at 9:00 a.m., just prior to the status
3 conference, which is rescheduled to that date. In accordance with the
4 requirements set forth in the April 24 Order, a status report shall be
5 filed no later than fourteen days prior to the status conference.
