17	After reviewing the parties' Joint Status Report, the Court		
18	makes the following Pretrial Scheduling Order.		
19	I. <u>SERVICE OF PROCESS</u>		
20	All named Defendants have been served and no further service		
21	is permitted without leave of court, good cause having been		
22	shown.		
23	II. ADDITIONAL PARTIES/AMENDMENTS/PLEADINGS		
24	No joinder of parties or amendments to pleadings is		
25	permitted without leave of court, good cause having been shown.		
26	III. JURISDICTION/VENUE		
27	Jurisdiction is predicated upon 28 U.S.C. § 1332(d).		
28	Jurisdiction and venue are not contested.		
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### IV. <u>DISCOVERY</u>

All discovery, with the exception of expert discovery, shall 2 be completed by September 21, 2012. In this context, "completed" 3 means that all discovery shall have been conducted so that all 4 depositions have been taken and any disputes relative to 5 discovery shall have been resolved by appropriate order if 6 necessary and, where discovery has been ordered, the order has 7 been obeyed. All motions to compel discovery must be noticed on 8 9 the magistrate judge's calendar in accordance with the local rules of this Court. 10

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## V. <u>DISCLOSURE OF EXPERT WITNESSES</u>

All counsel are to designate in writing, file with the Court, and serve upon all other parties the name, address, and area of expertise of each expert that they propose to tender at trial not later than **November 21**, **2012**.<sup>1</sup> The designation shall be accompanied by a written report prepared and signed by the witness. The report shall comply with Fed. R. Civ. P. 26(a) (2) (B).

Within twenty (20) days after the designation of expert witnesses, any party may designate a supplemental list of expert witnesses who will express an opinion on a subject covered by an expert designated by an adverse party.

Merrell Dow Pharmaceuticals, Inc.</u>, 509 U.S. 579 (1993) and/or <u>Kumho Tire Co. v. Carmichael</u>, 119 S. Ct. 1167 (1999) are anticipated.

The right to designate a supplemental expert for rebuttal
 purposes only shall apply to a party who has not previously
 disclosed an expert witness on the date set for expert witness
 disclosure by this Pretrial Scheduling Order.

5 Failure of a party to comply with the disclosure schedule as set forth above in all likelihood will preclude that party from 6 7 calling the expert witness at the time of trial. An expert witness not appearing on the designation will not be permitted to 8 9 testify unless the party offering the witness demonstrates: (a) that the necessity for the witness could not have been 10 reasonably anticipated at the time the list was proffered; 11 (b) that the Court and opposing counsel were promptly notified 12 upon discovery of the witness; and (c) that the witness was 13 promptly made available for deposition. 14

15 For purposes of this Pretrial Scheduling Order, an "expert" is any person who my be used at trial to present evidence under 16 Rules 702, 703, and 705 of the Federal Rules of Evidence, which 17 18 include both "percipient experts" (persons who, because of their 19 expertise, have rendered expert opinions in the normal course of 20 their work duties or observations pertinent to the issues in the case) and "retained experts" (persons specifically designated by 21 22 a party to be a testifying expert for the purposes of 23 litigation). /// 24 25 ///

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Each party shall identify whether a disclosed expert is percipient, retained, or both. It will be assumed that a party designating a retained expert has acquired the express permission of the witness to be so listed. Parties designating percipient experts must state in the designation who is responsible for arranging the deposition of such persons.

All experts designated are to be fully prepared at the time of designation to render an informed opinion, and give their bases for their opinion, so that they will be able to give full and complete testimony at any deposition taken by the opposing party. Experts will not be permitted to testify at the trial as to any information gathered or evaluated, or opinion formed, after deposition taken subsequent to designation.

Counsel are instructed to complete all discovery of expert witnesses in a timely manner in order to comply with the Court's deadline for filing dispositive motions.

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#### VI. MOTION HEARING SCHEDULE

The last day to hear dispositive motions shall be **March 21**, **2013**. The parties shall comply with the following filing deadlines:

21 22	Dispositive motion	filed at least 8 weeks prior to hearing
23	Opposition and any cross-motion	filed at least 5 weeks prior to hearing
24	Reply and opposition to cross-motion	filed at least 3 weeks prior to hearing
25 26	Reply to cross-motion	filed at least 1 week prior to hearing

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The parties are directed to the Court's website for available hearing dates. (www.caed.uscourts.gov → choose Court Calendar → choose Judge England → choose More Calendaring Information)

5 All purely legal issues are to be resolved by timely pretrial motions. Failure to comply with Local Rules 230 and 6 7 260, as modified by this Order, may be deemed consent to the motion and the Court may dispose of the motion summarily. 8 9 Further, failure to timely oppose a summary judgment motion<sup>2</sup> may result in the granting of that motion if the movant shifts the 10 burden to the nonmovant to demonstrate that a genuine issue of 11 material fact remains for trial. 12

The Court places a page limit for points and authorities (exclusive of exhibits and other supporting documentation) of twenty (20) pages on all initial moving papers, twenty (20) pages on oppositions, and ten (10) pages for replies. All requests for page limit increases must be made in writing to the Court setting forth any and all reasons for any increase in page limit at least fourteen (14) days prior to the filing of the motion.

For the Court's convenience, citations to Supreme Court cases should include parallel citations to the Supreme Court Reporter.

1 The parties are reminded that a motion in limine is a 2 pretrial procedural device designed to address the admissibility of evidence. The Court will look with disfavor upon 3 dispositional motions presented at the Final Pretrial Conference 4 or at trial in the guise of motions in limine. 5

The parties are cautioned that failure to raise a 6 7 dispositive legal issue that could have been tendered to the court by proper pretrial motion prior to the dispositive motion cut-off date may constitute waiver of such issue.

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#### VII. FINAL PRETRIAL CONFERENCE

The Final Pretrial Conference is set for May 30, 2013, at 11 2:00 p.m. At least one of the attorneys who will conduct the 12 trial for each of the parties shall attend the Final Pretrial 13 Conference. If by reason of illness or other unavoidable 14 15 circumstance a trial attorney is unable to attend, the attorney who attends in place of the trial attorney shall have equal 16 17 familiarity with the case and equal authorization to make commitments on behalf of the client. 18

19 Counsel for all parties are to be fully prepared for trial 20 at the time of the Final Pretrial Conference, with no matters 21 remaining to be accomplished except production of witnesses for 22 oral testimony.

23 The parties shall file, not later than May 9, 2013, a Joint Final Pretrial Conference Statement. The provisions of Local 24 25 Rules 281 shall apply with respect to the matters to be included in the Joint Final Pretrial Conference Statement. 26

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In addition to those subjects listed in Local Rule 281(b), the parties are to provide the Court with a plain, concise statement that identifies every non-discovery motion tendered to the Court and its resolution. Failure to comply with Local Rule 281, as modified by this Pretrial Scheduling Order, may be grounds for sanctions.

7 At the time of filing the Joint Final Pretrial Conference 8 Statement, counsel shall also electronically mail to the Court in 9 digital format compatible with Microsoft Word or WordPerfect, the 10 Joint Final Pretrial Conference Statement in its entirety 11 including the witness and exhibit lists. **These documents shall** 12 **be sent to: mceorders@caed.uscourts.gov.** 

13 The parties should identify first the core undisputed facts relevant to all claims. The parties should then, in a concise 14 15 manner, identify those undisputed core facts that are relevant to The disputed facts should be identified in the same 16 each claim. 17 manner. Where the parties are unable to agree as to what 18 disputed facts are properly before the Court for trial, they should nevertheless list all disputed facts asserted by each 19 20 party. Each disputed fact or undisputed fact should be 21 separately numbered or lettered.

Each party shall identify and concisely list each disputed evidentiary issue which will be the subject of a motion in limine.

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Each party shall identify the points of law which concisely describe the legal issues of the trial which will be discussed in the parties' respective trial briefs. Points of law should reflect issues derived from the core undisputed and disputed facts. Parties shall not include argument or authorities with any point of law.

7 The parties shall prepare a joint statement of the case in 8 plain concise language which will be read to the jury at the 9 beginning of the trial. The purpose of the joint statement is to 10 inform the jury what the case is about.

The parties are reminded that pursuant to Local Rule 281 11 they are required to list in the Joint Final Pretrial Conference 12 13 Statement all witnesses and exhibits they propose to offer at trial. After the name of each witness, each party shall provide 14 15 a brief statement of the nature of the testimony to be proffered. The parties may file a joint list or each party may file separate 16 17 lists. These list(s) shall not be contained in the body of the 18 Joint Final Pretrial Conference Statement itself, but shall be 19 attached as separate documents to be used as addenda to the Final 20 Pretrial Order.

Plaintiff's exhibits shall be listed numerically.
Defendants' exhibits shall be listed alphabetically. The parties
shall use the standard exhibit stickers provided by the Court
Clerk's Office: pink for plaintiff and blue for defendant. In
the event that the alphabet is exhausted, the exhibits shall be
marked "AA-ZZ" and "AAA-ZZZ" etc.

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After three letters, note the number of letters in parenthesis 1 2 (i.e., "AAAA(4)") to reduce confusion at trial. All multi-page exhibits shall be stapled or otherwise fastened together and each 3 page within the exhibit shall be numbered. All photographs shall 4 be marked individually. The list of exhibits shall not include 5 excerpts of depositions, which may be used to impeach witnesses. 6 In the event that Plaintiff and Defendants offer the same exhibit 7 during trial, that exhibit shall be referred to by the 8 9 designation the exhibit is first identified. The Court cautions 10 the parties to pay attention to this detail so that all concerned, including the jury, will not be confused by one 11 exhibit being identified with both a number and a letter. 12

The Final Pretrial Order will contain a stringent standard for the offering at trial of witnesses and exhibits not listed in the Final Pretrial Order, and the parties are cautioned that the standard will be strictly applied. On the other hand, the listing of exhibits or witnesses that a party does not intend to offer will be viewed as an abuse of the court's processes.

19 The parties also are reminded that pursuant to Rule 16 of 20 the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure it will be their duty at the Final Pretrial Conference to aid the Court in: (a) the 21 formulation and simplification of issues and the elimination of 22 frivolous claims or defenses; (b) the settling of facts that 23 24 should properly be admitted; and (c) the avoidance of unnecessary 25 proof and cumulative evidence. Counsel must cooperatively 26 prepare the Joint Final Pretrial Conference Statement and 27 participate in good faith at the Final Pretrial Conference with 28 these aims in mind.

A failure to do so may result in the imposition of sanctions
 which may include monetary sanctions, orders precluding proof,
 elimination of claims or defenses, or such other sanctions as the
 Court deems appropriate.

VIII. TRIAL BRIEFS

The parties shall file trial briefs not later than May 16, 2013. Counsel are directed to Local Rule 285 regarding the content of trial briefs.

IX. EVIDENTIARY AND/OR PROCEDURAL MOTIONS

Any evidentiary or procedural motions are to be filed by May 9, 2013. Oppositions must be filed by May 16, 2013, and any reply must be filed by May 23, 2013. The motions will be heard by the Court at the same time as the Final Pretrial Conference.

X. TRIAL SETTING

The trial is set for **July 22**, **2013**, **at 9:00 a.m**. Trial will be by jury. The panel will consist of **seven (7) jurors**. The parties estimate a trial length of **five (5) days**.

XI. SETTLEMENT CONFERENCE

At the Final Pretrial Conference, the Court may set a settlement conference if the parties so request. In the event no settlement conference is requested, the parties are free to continue to mediate or attempt to settle the case with the understanding that the trial date is a firm date.

In the event a settlement conference is set by the Court, counsel are instructed to have a principal with full settlement authority present at the Settlement Conference or to be fully authorized to settle the matter on any terms.

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1 At least seven (7) calendar days before the settlement 2 conference, counsel for each party shall submit to the chambers of the settlement judge a confidential Settlement Conference 3 Such statements are neither to be filed with the Statement. 4 Clerk nor served on opposing counsel. Each party, however, shall 5 serve notice on all other parties that the statement has been 6 7 submitted. If the settlement judge is not the trial judge, the Settlement Conference Statement shall not be disclosed to the 8 9 trial judge.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the parties may request a 10 settlement conference prior to the Final Pretrial Conference if 11 they feel it would lead to the possible resolution of the case. 12 In the event an early settlement conference date is requested, 13 the parties shall file said request jointly, in writing. 14 The 15 request must state whether the parties waive disqualification, pursuant to Local Rule 270(b), before a settlement judge can be 16 17 assigned to the case. Absent the parties' affirmatively 18 requesting that the assigned Judge or Magistrate Judge participate in the settlement conference AND waiver, pursuant to 19 20 Local Rule 270(b), a settlement judge will be randomly assigned 21 to the case.

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### XII. VOLUNTARY DISPUTE RESOLUTION PROGRAM

23 Pursuant to Local Rule 271 parties will need to lodge a 24 stipulation and proposed order requesting referral to the 25 Voluntary Dispute Resolution Program.

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#### XIII. MODIFICATION OF PRETRIAL SCHEDULING ORDER

The parties are reminded that pursuant to Rule 16(b) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure, the Pretrial Scheduling Order shall not be modified except by leave of court upon a showing of good cause. Agreement by the parties pursuant to stipulation alone to modify the Pretrial Scheduling Order does not constitute good cause. Except in extraordinary circumstances, unavailability of witnesses or counsel will not constitute good cause.

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## XIV. OBJECTIONS TO PRETRIAL SCHEDULING ORDER

11 This Pretrial Scheduling Order will become final without 12 further order of the Court unless objections are filed within 13 seven (7) <u>court</u> days of service of this Order.
