25 Pursuant to Patent Local Rule 3-6, Defendant and Counterclaimant
 26 Blockbuster Inc. hereby states its Final Invalidation Contentions as to United States
 27 Patent No. 6,584,450 issued on June 24, 2003 ("the '450 Patent").
 28

1 This statement of Final Invalidity Contentions is based on the
2 information currently available to Blockbuster and is subject to revision. Discovery
3 remains pending, and other investigations are still in progress. This statement is
4 provided without prejudice to all rights to supplement or modify Blockbuster's
5 contentions as additional information is obtained, further research and analysis are
6 completed, and patent claims are construed. This statement is also made without
7 waiver or limitation of any attorney-client privilege, work product protection or any
8 other privileges or evidentiary objections whatsoever.

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10 **I. INVALIDITY CONTENTIONS BASED ON 35 U.S.C. §§ 102 AND 103**

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12 **A. IDENTIFICATION OF PRIOR ART**

13 **1 Prior Art Patents and Published Patent Applications**

1 **II. INVALIDITY CONTENTIONS BASED ON 35 U.S.C. § 112**

2 Claims 1-100 of the '450 Patent are invalid for failure to comply with
3 the requirements of 35 U.S.C. § 112.

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5 **A. 35 U.S.C. § 112, PARAGRAPH 2**

6 The '450 Patent and all claims thereof are invalid for indefiniteness
7 under 35 U.S.C. § 112¶ 2.

8 Blockbuster's grounds for this contention include, without limitation,
9 that the following claim terms are indefinite:

- 10 (1) "computer-implemented method;"
- 11 (2) "renting;"
- 12 (3) "attributes;"
- 13 (4) "ordered list;"
- 14 (5) "based upon the order of the list;"
- 15 (6) "item selection criteria;"
- 16 (7) "providing to the customer up to a specified number of the one
17 or more items;"
- 18 (8) "wherein a total current number of items provided to the
19 customer does not exceed the specified number;"
- 20 (9) "wherein a total number of items provided to the customer
21 within a specified period of time does not exceed a specified time;
- 22 (10) "the one or more item selection criteria indicates a desired
23 order;"
- 24 (11) "if a particular item from the one or more items indicated by the
25 one or more item selection criteria is not available, then providing another item;"
- 26 (12) "automatically selecting and providing to the customer;"
- 27 (13) "preferred item attributes;"
- 28 (14) "item rental queue;"

1 (15) “wherein the item rental queue contains one or more entries that
2 specify the one or more items that the customer desires to rent;”

3 (16) “selecting the one or more other items from the item rental
4 queue;”

5 (17) “in response to receiving a customer notification;”

6 (18) “in response to expiration of a specified amount of time;”

7 (19) “in response to a specified date being reached;”

8 (20) “in response to a specified fee being received;”

9 (21) “delivery agent;”

10 (22) “computer-readable medium;”

11 (23) “an apparatus for renting items to customers;”

12 (24) “processors;” and

13 (25) “a memory communicatively coupled to the one or more
14 processors.”

15 In addition, claims 36 through 100 of the ’450 Patent are invalid for
16 indefiniteness under § 112 ¶ 2 because they recite both an apparatus and a method
17 of using that apparatus. Such claims are invalid under 35 U.S.C. § 112 ¶ 2. *See*
18 *IPXL Holdings v. Amazon.com, Inc.*, 430 F.3d 1377, 1384-85 (Fed. Cir. 2005); *see*
19 *also Amgen, Inc. v. Chugai Pharm. Co.*, 927 F.2d 1200, 1217 (Fed. Cir. 1991) (A
20 claim is considered indefinite if it does not reasonably apprise those skilled in the
21 art of its scope).

22 “The Board of Patent Appeals and Interferences (‘Board’)
23 of the PTO . . . has made it clear that reciting both an
24 apparatus and a method of using that apparatus renders a
25 claim indefinite under section 112, paragraph 2. *Ex parte*
26 *Lyell*, 17 USPQ 2d 1548 (1990). . . . This rule is well
27 recognized and has been incorporated into the PTO’s
28 *Manual of Patent Examination Procedure*.

1 § 2173.05(p)(II) (1999) ('A single claim which claims
 2 both an apparatus and the method steps of using the
 3 apparatus is indefinite under 35 U.S.C. 112, second
 4 paragraph. '); *see also* Robert C. Faber, *Landis on*
 5 *Mechanics of Patent Claim Drafting* § 60A (2001)
 6 ('Never mix claim types to different classes of invention
 7 in a single claim.'). "

8 IPXL, 430 F.d at 1384.

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 10 **B. 35 U.S.C. § 112, PARAGRAPH 1**

11 The Court's Patent Local Rules do not require any disclosure in Final
 12 Invalidation Contentions concerning best-mode defenses. *Fresenius Med. Care*
 13 *Holdings, Inc. v. Baxter Int'l, Inc.*, No. C 03-1431 SBA, 2006 WL 1329997 (N.D.
 14 Cal. May 15, 2006); *see* Pat. L.R. 3-3(d). Blockbuster provides the following
 15 information as a courtesy, without prejudice to its presentation of any additional or
 16 different defenses at any time.

17 Blockbuster contends that the '450 Patent and all claims thereof are
 18 invalid for failure to disclose best mode as required by 35 U.S.C. § 112 ¶ 1.
 19 Blockbuster's grounds for this contention include, without limitation, the following:

20 Claims of the '450 Patent recite selecting items (or, more specifically,
 21 movies) for delivery to a customer. The '450 Patent does not disclose any mode of
 22 selecting items or movies that prioritizes between requests of different customers.
 23 For example, and without limitation:

24 a. The '450 Patent does not disclose any mode of selecting
 25 items or movies for customers that takes into account how often a customer
 26 returns movies or other items and receives new ones;

27 b. The '450 Patent does not disclose any step, method,
 28 device, or feature for categorizing customers or varying the speed or priority

1 of, or location used for, fulfilling a customer's rental request because of the
2 number or frequency of the customer's rentals.

3 2. Claims of the '450 Patent recite delivery of movies or other
4 items to customers and delivery by mail.

5 a. The '450 Patent does not disclose any mode of delivery of
6 movie or other items to customers by mail that includes any particular type,
7 design, or features for the envelope or package used for such delivery.

8 Indeed, the '450 Patent do not refer to an envelope or packaging at all.

9 b. The '450 Patent does not disclose any particular type,
10 design, or feature for return of monies or other items by a customer.

11 c. The '450 Patent does not disclose any step, method,
12 device or feature involving or including delivery of a single disk and not
13 multiple disks in each envelope or package delivered by mail.

14 d. The '450 Patent does not disclose any step, method,
15 device or feature involving or including use of letter-shaped or rectangular
16 envelopes or packages.

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18 **III. INVALIDITY CONTENTIONS BASED ON 35 U.S.C. § 101**

19 The Court's Patent Local Rules do not require any disclosure in Final
20 Invalidity Contentions concerning § 101 defenses. Blockbuster presents the
21 following information as a courtesy, without prejudice to its presentation of any
22 additional or different defense at any time in the future.

23 Claims 1-100 of the '450 Patent are invalid under 35 U.S.C. § 101.

24 Blockbuster contends that the '450 Patent and each and every
25 individual claim thereof are invalid under 35 U.S.C. § 101 because the subject
26 matter of each such claim is not patentable under that section or under Article I,
27 Section 8 of the United States Constitution.

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1 Blockbuster’s grounds for these contentions include, without
2 limitation:

3 1. Each such claim fails to set forth a patentable invention or
4 “discovery” by an “inventor” within the meaning of Article I, Section 8;

5 2. Each such claim fails to set forth a patentable invention under
6 38 U.S.C. § 101;

7 3. Each such patent and claim improperly attempts to provide
8 patent protection for a business method;

9 4. Each such patent and claim improperly attempts to provide
10 patent protection for an algorithm; and

11 5. Each such patent and claim otherwise fails to meet
12 Constitutional, statutory, or case law requirements for patentability.

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14 Based on the reasons stated above, Blockbuster contends that the ’450
15 Patent and each and every individual claim thereof are invalid.
