ORDER OF DISMISSAL

(Doc. #4)

Plaintiff, a prisoner presently housed at the Correctional Training Facility in Soledad, California, has filed a pro se civil rights action pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983 alleging that officers at his prior place of imprisonment, San Quentin State Prison, violated his constitutional rights when they lost his property during a prison transfer. Doc. #1. Plaintiff also seeks leave to proceed in forma pauperis. Doc. #4. The action is now before the Court for initial screening pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1915A.

1 (where state cannot foresee, and therefore provide meaningful hearing prior to,
2 deprivation, statutory provision for post-deprivation hearing or common law tort
3 remedy for erroneous deprivation satisfies due process); King v. Massarweh, 782
4 F.2d 825, 826–27 (9th Cir. 1986) (same). California law provides such an adequate
5 post-deprivation remedy. See Barnett v. Centoni, 31 F.3d 813, 816–17 (9th Cir.
6 1994) (citing Cal. Gov’t Code §§ 810-895).

7 C. Plaintiff’s Claim


8 According to the complaint and attachments thereto, Plaintiff’s property was
9 confiscated on October 14, 2009 after he was placed in administrative segregation
10 for possession of a controlled substance. Doc. #1 at 19. When his property was
11 returned to him, it was missing several items. Id. Plaintiff engaged in the prison
12 administrative grievance process with some success; according to the May 31, 2011
13 Director’s Level Appeal Decision, San Quentin State Prison “accepted liability for
14 the missing items and offered [Plaintiff] \$140.00 . . . in stamps as compensation for
15 the missing property . . .” Id. at 12–13. Plaintiff alleges that the costs of his lost
16 property was \$863.99 (id. at 5) and therefore the offer of \$140 in compensation
17 violated prison regulations governing compensation for lost items (id. at 4).

18 Although Plaintiff’s allegations regarding the apparent loss of his property by
19 California prison officials are regrettable, they remain insufficient to state a
20 cognizable claim for relief under 42 U.S.C. § 1983. See Parratt, 451 U.S. at 535–44
21 The action, therefore, is DISMISSED.

22 The Clerk is directed to terminate any pending motions as moot and close the
23 file. No fee is due.


