 23 1. PURPOSES AND LIMITATIONS

24 Disclosure and discovery activity in this action are likely to involve production of confidential,
 25 proprietary, or private information for which special protection from public disclosure and from use for any
 26 purpose other than prosecuting this litigation may be warranted. Accordingly, the parties hereby stipulate to
 27 and petition the court to enter the following Stipulated Protective Order. The parties acknowledge that this
 28 Order does not confer blanket protections on all disclosures or responses to discovery and that the protection

1 it affords from public disclosure and use extends only to the limited information or items that are entitled to
2 confidential treatment under the applicable legal principles. The parties further acknowledge, as set forth in
3 Section 14.4, below, that this Stipulated Protective Order does not entitle them to file confidential
4 information under seal; Civil Local Rule 79-5 and General Order 62 set forth the procedures that must be
5 followed and the standards that will be applied when a party seeks permission from the court to file material
6 under seal.

7 2. DEFINITIONS

8 2.1 Challenging Party: a Party or Non-Party that challenges the designation of information or
9 items under this Order.

10 2.2 "CONFIDENTIAL" Information or Items: information (regardless of how it is generated,
11 stored or maintained) or tangible things that qualify for protection under Federal Rule of Civil Procedure
12 26(c); confidential or sensitive company proprietary business information; and information about current,
13 past or prospective employees that is of a confidential or private nature, wage information and job
14 performance documentation .

15 2.3 Counsel (without qualifier): Outside Counsel of Record and House Counsel (as well as their
16 support staff).

17 2.4 Designated House Counsel: House Counsel who seek access to "HIGHLY
18 CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY" information in this matter.

19 2.5 Designating Party: a Party or Non-Party that designates information or items that it
20 produces in disclosures or in responses to discovery as "CONFIDENTIAL" or "HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL
21 – ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY".

22 2.6 Disclosure or Discovery Material: all items or information, regardless of the medium or
23 manner in which it is generated, stored, or maintained (including, among other things, testimony, transcripts,
24 and tangible things), that are produced or generated in disclosures or responses to discovery in this matter.

25 2.7 Expert: a person with specialized knowledge or experience in a matter pertinent to the
26 litigation who (1) has been retained by a Party or its counsel to serve as an expert witness or as a consultant
27 in this action, (2) is not a past or current employee of a Party or of a Party's competitor, and (3) at the time
28

1 of retention, is not anticipated to become an employee of a Party or of a Party's competitor.

2 2.8 "HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY" Information or Items:
3 extremely sensitive "Confidential Information or Items," disclosure of which to another Party or Non-Party
4 would create a substantial risk of serious harm that could not be avoided by less restrictive means.

5 2.10 House Counsel: attorneys who are employees of a party to this action. House Counsel does
6 not include Outside Counsel of Record or any other outside counsel.

7 2.11 Non-Party: any natural person, partnership, corporation, association, or other legal entity
8 not named as a Party to this action.

9 2.12 Outside Counsel of Record: attorneys who are not employees of a party to this action but
10 are retained to represent or advise a party to this action and have appeared in this action on behalf of that
11 party or are affiliated with a law firm which has appeared on behalf of that party.

12 2.13 Party: any party to this action, including all of its officers, directors, employees, consultants,
13 retained experts, and Outside Counsel of Record (and their support staffs).

14 2.14 Producing Party: a Party or Non-Party that produces Disclosure or Discovery Material in
15 this action.

16 2.15 Professional Vendors: persons or entities that provide litigation support services (e.g.,
17 photocopying, videotaping, translating, preparing exhibits or demonstrations, and organizing, storing, or
18 retrieving data in any form or medium) and their employees and subcontractors.

19 2.16 Protected Material: any Disclosure or Discovery Material that is designated as
20 "CONFIDENTIAL," or as "HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY."

21 2.17 Receiving Party: a Party that receives Disclosure or Discovery Material from a Producing
22 Party.

23 3. SCOPE

24 The protections conferred by this Stipulation and Order cover not only Protected Material (as
25 defined above), but also (1) any information copied or extracted from Protected Material; (2) all copies,
26 excerpts, summaries, or compilations of Protected Material; and (3) any testimony, conversations, or
27 presentations by Parties or their Counsel that might reveal Protected Material. However, the protections
28 conferred by this Stipulation and Order do not cover the following information: (a) any information that is in

1 the public domain at the time of disclosure to a Receiving Party or becomes part of the public domain after
2 its disclosure to a Receiving Party as a result of publication not involving a violation of this Order, including
3 becoming part of the public record through trial or otherwise; and (b) any information known to the
4 Receiving Party prior to the disclosure or obtained by the Receiving Party after the disclosure from a source
5 who obtained the information lawfully and under no obligation of confidentiality to the Designating Party.
6 Any use of Protected Material at trial shall be governed by a separate agreement or order.

7 4. DURATION

8 Even after final disposition of this litigation, the confidentiality obligations imposed by this Order
9 shall remain in effect until a Designating Party agrees otherwise in writing or a court order otherwise
10 directs. Final disposition shall be deemed to be the later of (1) dismissal of all claims and defenses in this
11 action, with or without prejudice; and (2) final judgment herein after the completion and exhaustion of all
12 appeals, rehearings, remands, trials, or reviews of this action, including the time limits for filing any motions
13 or applications for extension of time pursuant to applicable law.

14 5. DESIGNATING PROTECTED MATERIAL

15 5.1 Exercise of Restraint and Care in Designating Material for Protection. Each Party or Non-
16 Party that designates information or items for protection under this Order must take care to limit any such
17 designation to specific material that qualifies under the appropriate standards. To the extent it is practical to
18 do so, the Designating Party must designate for protection only those parts of material, documents, items, or
19 oral or written communications that qualify – so that other portions of the material, documents, items, or
20 communications for which protection is not warranted are not swept unjustifiably within the ambit of this
21 Order.

22 Mass, indiscriminate, or routinized designations are prohibited. Designations that are shown to be
23 clearly unjustified or that have been made for an improper purpose (e.g., to unnecessarily encumber or
24 retard the case development process or to impose unnecessary expenses and burdens on other parties)
25 expose the Designating Party to sanctions.

26 If it comes to a Designating Party's attention that information or items that it designated for
27 protection do not qualify for protection at all or do not qualify for the level of protection initially asserted,
28 that Designating Party must promptly notify all other parties that it is withdrawing the mistaken designation.

1 5.2 Manner and Timing of Designations. Except as otherwise provided in this Order (see, e.g.,
2 second paragraph of section 5.2(a) below), or as otherwise stipulated or ordered, Disclosure or Discovery
3 Material that qualifies for protection under this Order must be clearly so designated before the material is
4 disclosed or produced.

5 Designation in conformity with this Order requires:

6 (a) for information in documentary form (e.g., paper or electronic documents, but excluding
7 transcripts of depositions or other pretrial or trial proceedings), that the Producing Party affix the legend
8 “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” to each page that
9 contains protected material. If only a portion or portions of the material on a page qualifies for protection,
10 the Producing Party also must clearly identify the protected portion(s) (e.g., by making appropriate markings
11 in the margins) and must specify, for each portion, the level of protection being asserted.

12 A Party or Non-Party that makes original documents or materials available for inspection need not
13 designate them for protection until after the inspecting Party has indicated which material it would like
14 copied and produced. During the inspection and before the designation, all of the material made available
15 for inspection shall be deemed “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY.” After the
16 inspecting Party has identified the documents it wants copied and produced, the Producing Party must
17 determine which documents, or portions thereof, qualify for protection under this Order. Then, before
18 producing the specified documents, the Producing Party must affix the appropriate legend
19 (“CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY”) to each page that
20 contains Protected Material. If only a portion or portions of the material on a page qualifies for protection,
21 the Producing Party also must clearly identify the protected portion(s) (e.g., by making appropriate markings
22 in the margins) and must specify, for each portion, the level of protection being asserted.

23 (b) for testimony given in deposition or in other pretrial or trial proceedings, that the
24 Designating Party identify on the record, before the close of the deposition, hearing, or other proceeding, all
25 protected testimony and specify the level of protection being asserted. When it is impractical to identify
26 separately each portion of testimony that is entitled to protection and it appears that substantial portions of
27 the testimony may qualify for protection, the Designating Party may invoke on the record (before the
28 deposition, hearing, or other proceeding is concluded) a right to have up to 21 days to identify the specific

1 portions of the testimony as to which protection is sought and to specify the level of protection being
2 asserted. Only those portions of the testimony that are appropriately designated for protection within the 21
3 days shall be covered by the provisions of this Stipulated Protective Order. Alternatively, a Designating
4 Party may specify, at the deposition or up to 21 days afterwards if that period is properly invoked, that the
5 entire transcript shall be treated as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’
6 EYES ONLY.”

7 Parties shall give the other parties notice if they reasonably expect a deposition, hearing or other
8 proceeding to include Protected Material so that the other parties can ensure that only authorized individuals
9 who have signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A) are present at those
10 proceedings. The use of a document as an exhibit at a deposition shall not in any way affect its designation
11 as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY.”

12 Transcripts containing Protected Material shall have an obvious legend on the title page that the
13 transcript contains Protected Material, and the title page shall be followed by a list of all pages (including
14 line numbers as appropriate) that have been designated as Protected Material and the level of protection
15 being asserted by the Designating Party. The Designating Party shall inform the court reporter of these
16 requirements. Any transcript that is prepared before the expiration of a 21-day period for designation shall
17 be treated during that period as if it had been designated “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’
18 EYES ONLY” in its entirety unless otherwise agreed. After the expiration of that period, the transcript shall
19 be treated only as actually designated.

20 (c) for information produced in some form other than documentary and for any other
21 tangible items, that the Producing Party affix in a prominent place on the exterior of the container or
22 containers in which the information or item is stored the legend “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY
23 CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” If only a portion or portions of the information or item
24 warrant protection, the Producing Party, to the extent practicable, shall identify the protected portion(s) and
25 specify the level of protection being asserted.

26 5.3 Inadvertent Failures to Designate. If timely corrected, an inadvertent failure to designate
27 qualified information or items does not, standing alone, waive the Designating Party’s right to secure
28 protection under this Order for such material. Upon timely correction of a designation, the Receiving Party

1 must make reasonable efforts to assure that the material is treated in accordance with the provisions of this
2 Order.

3 6. CHALLENGING CONFIDENTIALITY DESIGNATIONS

4 6.1 Timing of Challenges. Any Party or Non-Party may challenge a designation of
5 confidentiality at any time. Unless a prompt challenge to a Designating Party's confidentiality designation is
6 necessary to avoid foreseeable, substantial unfairness, unnecessary economic burdens, or a significant
7 disruption or delay of the litigation, a Party does not waive its right to challenge a confidentiality
8 designation by electing not to mount a challenge promptly after the original designation is disclosed.

9 6.2 Meet and Confer. The Challenging Party shall initiate the dispute resolution process by
10 providing written notice of each designation it is challenging and describing the basis for each challenge. To
11 avoid ambiguity as to whether a challenge has been made, the written notice must recite that the challenge to
12 confidentiality is being made in accordance with this specific paragraph of the Protective Order. The parties
13 shall attempt to resolve each challenge in good faith and must begin the process by conferring directly (in
14 voice to voice dialogue; other forms of communication are not sufficient) within 14 days of the date of
15 service of notice. In conferring, the Challenging Party must explain the basis for its belief that the
16 confidentiality designation was not proper and must give the Designating Party an opportunity to review the
17 designated material, to reconsider the circumstances, and, if no change in designation is offered, to explain
18 the basis for the chosen designation. A Challenging Party may proceed to the next stage of the challenge
19 process only if it has engaged in this meet and confer process first or establishes that the Designating Party
20 is unwilling to participate in the meet and confer process in a timely manner.

21 6.3 Judicial Intervention. If the Parties cannot resolve a challenge without court intervention,
22 the Designating Party shall file and serve a motion to retain confidentiality under Civil Local Rule 7 (and in
23 compliance with Civil Local Rule 79-5 and General Order 62, if applicable) within 21 days of the parties
24 agreeing that the meet and confer process will not resolve their dispute. Each such motion must be
25 accompanied by a competent declaration affirming that the movant has complied with the meet and confer
26 requirements imposed in the preceding paragraph. Failure by the Designating Party to make such a motion
27 including the required declaration within 21 days shall automatically waive the confidentiality designation
28 for each challenged designation. In addition, the Challenging Party may file a motion challenging a

1 confidentiality designation at any time if there is good cause for doing so, including a challenge to the
2 designation of a deposition transcript or any portions thereof. Any motion brought pursuant to this provision
3 must be accompanied by a competent declaration affirming that the movant has complied with the meet and
4 confer requirements imposed by the preceding paragraph.

5 The burden of persuasion in any such challenge proceeding shall be on the Designating Party.
6 Frivolous challenges and those made for an improper purpose (e.g., to harass or impose unnecessary
7 expenses and burdens on other parties) may expose the Challenging Party to sanctions. Unless the
8 Designating Party has waived the confidentiality designation by failing to file a motion to retain
9 confidentiality as described above, all parties shall continue to afford the material in question the level of
10 protection to which it is entitled under the Producing Party's designation until the court rules on the
11 challenge.

12 7. ACCESS TO AND USE OF PROTECTED MATERIAL

13 7.1 Basic Principles. A Receiving Party may use Protected Material that is disclosed or
14 produced by another Party or by a Non-Party in connection with this case only for prosecuting, defending,
15 or attempting to settle this litigation. Such Protected Material may be disclosed only to the categories of
16 persons and under the conditions described in this Order. When the litigation has been terminated, a
17 Receiving Party must comply with the provisions of section 13 below (FINAL DISPOSITION).

18 Protected Material must be stored and maintained by a Receiving Party at a location and in a secure
19 manner that ensures that access is limited to the persons authorized under this Order.

20 7.2 Disclosure of "CONFIDENTIAL" Information or Items. Unless otherwise ordered by the
21 court or permitted in writing by the Designating Party, a Receiving Party may disclose any information or
22 item designated "CONFIDENTIAL" only to:

23 (a) the Receiving Party's Outside Counsel of Record in this action, as well as employees of
24 said Outside Counsel of Record to whom it is reasonably necessary to disclose the information for this
25 litigation and who have signed the "Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound" that is attached hereto
26 as Exhibit A;

27 (b) the officers, directors, and employees (including House Counsel) of the Receiving Party
28 to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the "Acknowledgment

1 and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A);

2 (c) Experts (as defined in this Order) of the Receiving Party to whom disclosure is
3 reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be
4 Bound” (Exhibit A);

5 (d) the court and its personnel;

6 (e) court reporters and their staff, professional jury or trial consultants, and Professional
7 Vendors to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the
8 “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A);

9 (f) during their depositions, witnesses in the action to whom disclosure is reasonably
10 necessary and who have signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A), unless
11 otherwise agreed by the Designating Party or ordered by the court. Pages of transcribed deposition
12 testimony or exhibits to depositions that reveal Protected Material must be separately bound by the court
13 reporter and may not be disclosed to anyone except as permitted under this Stipulated Protective Order.

14 (g) the author or recipient of a document containing the information or a custodian or other
15 person who otherwise possessed or knew the information.

16 7.3 Disclosure of “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” Information
17 or Items. Unless otherwise ordered by the court or permitted in writing by the Designating Party, a
18 Receiving Party may disclose any information or item designated “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL –
19 ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” only to:

20 (a) the Receiving Party’s Outside Counsel of Record in this action, as well as employees of
21 said Outside Counsel of Record to whom it is reasonably necessary to disclose the information for this
22 litigation and who have signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” that is attached hereto
23 as Exhibit A;

24 (b) House Counsel of the Receiving Party (1) who has no involvement in competitive
25 decision-making, (2) to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this litigation, (3) who has signed the
26 “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A), and (4) as to whom the procedures set forth in
27 paragraph 7.4(a)(1), below, have been followed];

28 (c) Experts of the Receiving Party (1) to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this

1 litigation, (2) who have signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A), and (3) as
2 to whom the procedures set forth in paragraph 7.4(a)(2), below, have been followed];

3 (d) the court and its personnel;

4 (e) court reporters and their staff, professional jury or trial consultants, and Professional
5 Vendors to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this litigation and who have signed the
6 “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A); and

7 (f) the author or recipient of a document containing the information or a custodian or other
8 person who otherwise possessed or knew the information.

9 7.4 Procedures for Approving or Objecting to Disclosure of “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL –
10 ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” Information or Items to Designated House Counsel or Experts.

11 (a)(1) Unless otherwise ordered by the court or agreed to in writing by the Designating
12 Party, a Party that seeks to disclose to House Counsel any information or item that has been designated
13 “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” pursuant to paragraph 7.3(b) first must make
14 a written request to the Designating Party that (1) sets forth the full name of the House Counsel’s and the
15 city and state of his or her residence, and (2) describes the House Counsel’s current and reasonably
16 foreseeable future primary job duties and responsibilities in sufficient detail to determine if House Counsel
17 is involved, or may become involved, in any competitive decision-making.

18 (a)(2) Unless otherwise ordered by the court or agreed to in writing by the Designating
19 Party, a Party that seeks to disclose to an Expert (as defined in this Order) any information or item that has
20 been designated “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” pursuant to paragraph
21 7.3(c) first must make a written request to the Designating Party that (1) identifies the general categories of
22 “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” information that the Receiving Party seeks
23 permission to disclose to the Expert, (2) sets forth the full name of the Expert and the city and state of his or
24 her primary residence, (3) attaches a copy of the Expert’s current resume, (4) identifies the Expert’s current
25 employer(s), (5) identifies each person or entity from whom the Expert has received compensation or
26 funding for work in his or her areas of expertise or to whom the expert has provided professional services,

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1 including in connection with a litigation, at any time during the preceding five years,¹ and (6) identifies (by
2 name and number of the case, filing date, and location of court) any litigation in connection with which the
3 Expert has offered expert testimony, including through a declaration, report, or testimony at a deposition or
4 trial, during the preceding five years.

5 (b) A Party that makes a request and provides the information specified in the preceding
6 respective paragraphs may disclose the subject Protected Material to the identified Designated House
7 Counsel or Expert unless, within 14 days of delivering the request, the Party receives a written objection
8 from the Designating Party. Any such objection must set forth in detail the grounds on which it is based.

9 (c) A Party that receives a timely written objection must meet and confer with the
10 Designating Party (through direct voice to voice dialogue) to try to resolve the matter by agreement within
11 seven days of the written objection. If no agreement is reached, the Party seeking to make the disclosure to
12 Designated House Counsel or the Expert may file a motion as provided in Civil Local Rule 7 (and in
13 compliance with Civil Local Rule 79-5 and General Order 62, if applicable) seeking permission from the
14 court to do so. Any such motion must describe the circumstances with specificity, set forth in detail the
15 reasons why the disclosure to Designated House Counsel or the Expert is reasonably necessary, assess the
16 risk of harm that the disclosure would entail, and suggest any additional means that could be used to reduce
17 that risk. In addition, any such motion must be accompanied by a competent declaration describing the
18 parties' efforts to resolve the matter by agreement (i.e., the extent and the content of the meet and confer
19 discussions) and setting forth the reasons advanced by the Designating Party for its refusal to approve the
20 disclosure.

21 In any such proceeding, the Party opposing disclosure to Designated House Counsel or the Expert
22 shall bear the burden of proving that the risk of harm that the disclosure would entail (under the safeguards
23 proposed) outweighs the Receiving Party's need to disclose the Protected Material to its Designated House
24 Counsel or Expert.

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¹ If the Expert believes any of this information is subject to a confidentiality obligation to a third-party, then the Expert should
28 provide whatever information the Expert believes can be disclosed without violating any confidentiality agreements, and the Party
seeking to disclose to the Expert shall be available to meet and confer with the Designating Party regarding any such engagement.

1 8. PROTECTED MATERIAL SUBPOENAED OR ORDERED PRODUCED IN OTHER
2 LITIGATION

3 If a Party is served with a subpoena or a court order issued in other litigation that compels
4 disclosure of any information or items designated in this action as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY
5 CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” that Party must:

6 (a) promptly notify in writing the Designating Party. Such notification shall include a copy
7 of the subpoena or court order;

8 (b) promptly notify in writing the party who caused the subpoena or order to issue in the
9 other litigation that some or all of the material covered by the subpoena or order is subject to this Protective
10 Order. Such notification shall include a copy of this Stipulated Protective Order; and

11 (c) cooperate with respect to all reasonable procedures sought to be pursued by the
12 Designating Party whose Protected Material may be affected.

13 If the Designating Party timely seeks a protective order, the Party served with the subpoena
14 or court order shall not produce any information designated in this action as “CONFIDENTIAL” or
15 “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” before a determination by the court from
16 which the subpoena or order issued, unless the Party has obtained the Designating Party’s permission. The
17 Designating Party shall bear the burden and expense of seeking protection in that court of its confidential
18 material – and nothing in these provisions should be construed as authorizing or encouraging a Receiving
19 Party in this action to disobey a lawful directive from another court.

20 9. A NON-PARTY’S PROTECTED MATERIAL SOUGHT TO BE PRODUCED IN THIS
21 LITIGATION

22 (a) The terms of this Order are applicable to information produced by a Non-Party in
23 this action and designated as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL – ATTORNEYS’ EYES
24 ONLY”. Such information produced by Non-Parties in connection with this litigation is protected by the
25 remedies and relief provided by this Order. Nothing in these provisions should be construed as prohibiting a
26 Non-Party from seeking additional protections.

27 (b) In the event that a Party is required, by a valid discovery request, to produce a Non-
28 Party’s confidential information in its possession, and the Party is subject to an agreement with the Non-
Party not to produce the Non-Party’s confidential information, then the Party shall:

1 1. promptly notify in writing the Requesting Party and the Non-Party that some or all
2 of the information requested is subject to a confidentiality agreement with a Non-Party;

3 2. promptly provide the Non-Party with a copy of the Stipulated Protective Order in
4 this litigation, the relevant discovery request(s), and a reasonably specific description of the information
5 requested; and

6 3. make the information requested available for inspection by the Non-Party.

7 (c) If the Non-Party fails to object or seek a protective order from this court within 14
8 days of receiving the notice and accompanying information, the Receiving Party may produce the Non-
9 Party's confidential information responsive to the discovery request. If the Non-Party timely seeks a
10 protective order, the Receiving Party shall not produce any information in its possession or control that is
11 subject to the confidentiality agreement with the Non-Party before a determination by the court. Absent a
12 court order to the contrary, the Non-Party shall bear the burden and expense of seeking protection in this
13 court of its Protected Material.

14 10. UNAUTHORIZED DISCLOSURE OF PROTECTED MATERIAL

15 If a Receiving Party learns that, by inadvertence or otherwise, it has disclosed Protected
16 Material to any person or in any circumstance not authorized under this Stipulated Protective Order, the
17 Receiving Party must immediately (a) notify in writing the Designating Party of the unauthorized
18 disclosures, (b) use its best efforts to retrieve all unauthorized copies of the Protected Material, (c) inform
19 the person or persons to whom unauthorized disclosures were made of all the terms of this Order, and (d)
20 request such person or persons to execute the "Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound" that is
21 attached hereto as Exhibit A.

22 11. INADVERTENT PRODUCTION OF PRIVILEGED OR OTHERWISE PROTECTED MATERIAL

23 When a Producing Party gives notice to Receiving Parties that certain inadvertently
24 produced material is subject to a claim of privilege or other protection, the obligations of the Receiving
25 Parties are those set forth in Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 26(b)(5)(B). The recipient of an inadvertent
26 production may not "sequester" or in any way use the document(s) pending resolution of a
27 challenge to the claim of privilege or other protection to the extent it would be otherwise allowed
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1 by Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 26(b)(5)(B) as amended in 2006. This includes a restriction
2 against “presenting” the document(s) to the court to challenge the privilege claim as may otherwise
3 be allowed under Rule 26(b)(5)(B) subject to ethical obligations. This provision is not intended to
4 modify whatever procedure may be established in an e-discovery order that provides for production without
5 prior privilege review. Pursuant to Federal Rule of Evidence 502(d) and (e), insofar as the parties reach an
6 agreement on the effect of disclosure of a communication or information covered by the attorney-client
7 privilege or work product protection, the parties may incorporate their agreement in the stipulated protective
8 order submitted to the court.

9 12. MISCELLANEOUS

10 12.1 Right to Further Relief. Nothing in this Order abridges the right of any person to seek its
11 modification by the court in the future.

12 12.2 Right to Assert Other Objections. By stipulating to the entry of this Protective Order no
13 Party waives any right it otherwise would have to object to disclosing or producing any information or item
14 on any ground not addressed in this Stipulated Protective Order. Similarly, no Party waives any right to
15 object on any ground to use in evidence of any of the material covered by this Protective Order.

16 12.3 Export Control. Disclosure of Protected Material shall be subject to all applicable laws and
17 regulations relating to the export of technical data contained in such Protected Material, including the
18 release of such technical data to foreign persons or nationals in the United States or elsewhere. The
19 Producing Party shall be responsible for identifying any such controlled technical data, and the Receiving
20 Party shall take measures necessary to ensure compliance.

21 12.4 Filing Protected Material. Without written permission from the Designating Party or a court
22 order secured after appropriate notice to all interested persons, a Party may not file in the public record in
23 this action any Protected Material. A Party that seeks to file under seal any Protected Material must comply
24 with Civil Local Rule 79-5 and General Order 62. Protected Material may only be filed under seal pursuant
25 to a court order authorizing the sealing of the specific Protected Material at issue. Pursuant to Civil Local
26 Rule 79-5 and General Order 62, a sealing order will issue only upon a request establishing that the
27 Protected Material at issue is privileged, protectable as a trade secret, or otherwise entitled to protection
28 under the law. If a Receiving Party's request to file Protected Material under seal pursuant to Civil Local

1 Rule 79-5(d) and General Order 62 is denied by the court, then the Receiving Party may file the Protected
2 Material in the public record pursuant to Civil Local Rule 79-5(e) unless otherwise instructed by the court.

3 13. FINAL DISPOSITION

4 Within 60 days after the final disposition of this action, as defined in paragraph 4, each
5 Receiving Party must return all Protected Material to the Producing Party or destroy such material. As used
6 in this subdivision, "all Protected Material" includes all copies, abstracts, compilations, summaries, and any
7 other format reproducing or capturing any of the Protected Material. Whether the Protected Material is
8 returned or destroyed, the Receiving Party must submit a written certification to the Producing Party (and, if
9 not the same person or entity, to the Designating Party) by the 60-day deadline that (1) identifies (by
10 category, where appropriate) all the Protected Material that was returned or destroyed and (2) affirms that
11 the Receiving Party has not retained any copies, abstracts, compilations, summaries or any other format
12 reproducing or capturing any of the Protected Material. Notwithstanding this provision, Counsel are entitled
13 to retain an archival copy of all pleadings, motion papers, trial, deposition, and hearing transcripts, legal
14 memoranda, correspondence, deposition and trial exhibits, expert reports, attorney work product, and
15 consultant and expert work product, even if such materials contain Protected Material. Any such archival
16 copies that contain or constitute Protected Material remain subject to this Protective Order as set forth in
17 Section 4 (DURATION).
