ORDER OF DISMISSAL

10 Plaintiff, a state prisoner, filed this pro se civil rights action under 42 U.S.C. § 1983 in the
11 United States District Court for the Eastern District of California. In an Order dated June 9, 2009,
12 the Honorable Gregory G. Hallows of the Eastern District ordered it transferred to this Court on
13 venue grounds.

14 On June 12, 2009, the instant case was received by this Court. On that same date, the Clerk
15 of the Court sent Plaintiff a notice that this case had been transferred to this Court. The Clerk's
16 notice was returned as undeliverable with a notation: "Return to Sender -- Inmate Refused."

17 In an Order dated September 4, 2009, the Court directed Plaintiff to inform the Court of his
18 continued intent to prosecute this action. The Court informed Plaintiff that if he failed to do so
19 within thirty days, this action would be dismissed without prejudice for failure to prosecute. The
20 Order was sent to Plaintiff at his last known address, Salinas Valley State Prison, and it was returned
21 as undeliverable with a notation: "Return to Sender -- Inmate Refused."

22 More than thirty days have passed, and Plaintiff has filed no response to the Court's
23 September 4, 2009 Order. He has failed to communicate with the Court since this case has been
24 transferred to this district. A district court may sua sponte dismiss an action for failure to prosecute
25 or to comply with a court order pursuant to Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 41(b). See Link v.
26 Wabash R.R., 370 U.S. 626, 633 (1962); McKeever v. Block, 932 F.2d 795, 797 (9th Cir. 1991).
27 The court should consider five factors before dismissing an action under Rule 41(b): (1) the public
28 interest in the expeditious resolution of the litigation: (2) the court's need to manage its docket;

1 (3) the risk of prejudice to the defendants; (4) the availability of less drastic sanctions; and (5) the
2 public policy favoring the disposition of actions on their merits. See Malone v. United States Postal
3 Serv., 833 F.2d 128, 130 (9th Cir. 1987).¹ The first three factors, above, weigh in favor of dismissal
4 in light of the fact that Plaintiff has not pursued this matter since it has been transferred to this
5 district. In addition, he has refused one notice from the Clerk and failed to respond to the Court's
6 September 4, 2009 Order. The fourth factor also weighs in favor of dismissal because less drastic
7 sanctions would have little impact in light of Plaintiff's apparent lack of interest in this case.
8 Although the fifth factor appears to weigh against dismissal, dismissal is appropriate in light of the
9 other four factors. See Pagtalunan v. Galaza, 291 F.3d 639, 643 (9th Cir. 2002) (finding district
10 court did not abuse its discretion in dismissing petition with prejudice where three of the five factors
11 weighed in favor of dismissal).

12 In light of the foregoing, this action is hereby DISMISSED for failure to prosecute, pursuant
13 to Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 41(b).

14 The Clerk of the Court shall close the file and terminate any pending motions.

15 IT IS SO ORDERED.
