1 **EXHIBIT 1**

2 **I. GENERAL DEFINITIONS**

3 1. The terms “document” and “documents” mean and refer to a writing, recording,
4 and/or all information that falls within the meaning of the phrase “electronically stored
5 information” in Fed. R. Civ. P. 26, 33, and 34, the phrase “documents and tangible things” in
6 Fed. R. Civ. P. 26, 33, and 34, the phrase “business records” in Fed. R. Civ. P. 34, and the terms
7 “writings and recordings,” “photographs,” “original,” and “duplicate” in Fed. R. Evid. 1001,
8 including, without limitation, any printed, written, recorded (in any audio, video, digital or any
9 other electronic or electromagnetic medium), graphic, or other tangible matter from whatever
10 source, however produced or reproduced, whether sent, received, or neither, including, without
11 limitation, the original, all drafts, and any non-identical copies (whether different from the
12 original because of notes made on or attached to the copy or otherwise) thereof.

13 2. The terms “you,” “your,” “Defendant,” and “Go Daddy” mean and refer to Defendant
14 GoDaddy.com, Inc., and include all of its affiliates, subsidiaries, and parents, and any person
15 acting under the control or on behalf of GoDaddy and/or its affiliates, subsidiaries, and/or
16 parents, including their directors, officers, partners, employees, representatives, agents, attorneys
17 and investigators.

18 3. The terms “Plaintiff” and “Petronas” mean and refer to Plaintiff Petroliam Nasional
19 Berhad (Petronas), and include all of its affiliates, subsidiaries, and parents, and any person
20 acting under the control or on behalf of Petronas and/or its affiliates, subsidiaries, and/or parents,
21 including their directors, officers, partners, employees, representatives, agents, attorneys and
22 investigators.

23 4. The term “party” means and refers to Petronas and GoDaddy, conjunctively or
24 disjunctively.

5. The term “subject matters” refers to all allegations of the complaint [or defenses raised
in the answer] and to all factual and legal assertions or claims made in the complaint.

6. The terms “describe,” “description,” or “describing” with respect to documents mean
and refer sufficient detail to enable Plaintiff to locate documents relevant to the parties’ claims

1 and defenses as readily as Defendant could.

2 7. Please include within the definition of the phrases “the domain names” and “disputed
3 domain names” the domain names “petronastower.net” and “petronastowers.net.”

4 II. TECHNICAL DEFINITIONS

5 1. The term “active file” means and refers to any file of electronically stored information
6 that can be utilized by a computer in any manner without modification and/or re-construction.

7 An active file is any file of electronically stored information that has not been erased or
8 otherwise destroyed and/or damaged and which is readily visible to the operating system and/or
9 the software with which it was created.

10 2. The terms “archive” and/or “backup” mean and refer to any processes for copying and
11 storage, whether temporary or permanent, of electronically stored information in a computer or a
12 network, other than active files in on-line storage. The term “backup” means and refers to all
13 processes used with the purpose of maintaining a copy of electronically stored information so
14 that such data can be restored if the primary copies of it are lost or damaged, or with the purpose
15 of keeping a record of electronically stored information on a computer or a network at a given
16 point or several given points in time. The terms “archive” and “archiving” mean and refer to any
17 process for maintaining electronically stored information off-line, whether referred to as an
18 archive, dump, purge or any other terms, and also to any process or procedure for storage of
19 electronic media which is not in current use on a computer or a network.

20 3. The term “computer” includes, but is not limited to, microcomputers (also known as
21 personal computers), laptop computers, portable computers, notebook computers, palmtop
22 computers, personal digital assistants, minicomputers and mainframe computers.

23 4. The term “configuration” means and refers to the elements and relationships which
24 make up a computer or a network.

5. The term “data” is equivalent to the term “electronically stored information.”

6. The term “deleted file” means and refers to any file of electronically stored
information that has been erased or deleted from the electronic media on which it resided. A
deleted file includes any file of electronically stored information whose File Allocation Table

1 (FAT) entry has been modified to indicate such information as being deleted and/or that is not
2 readily visible to the operating system and/or the software with which it was created.

3 7. The term "documentation," when used in reference to computers, operating systems
4 and utilities, application software and/or hardware devices, shall mean and refer to all documents
5 and files of electronically stored information containing written and/or on-line information
6 provided by the manufacturer or seller of the item and/or by in-house sources, including all
7 manuals, guides, instructions, programming notes, protocols, policies, procedures and other
8 sources of information about technical specifications, installation, usage and functioning of the
9 computer, operating systems and utilities, application software and/or hardware devices.

10 8. The term "electronically stored information" means information of all kinds created,
11 maintained and/or utilized by computers and/or networks, including all non-identical copies of
12 such information. electronically information includes, but is not limited to, software (whether
13 private, commercial or work-in-progress), programming notes or instructions, and input and/or
14 output used or produced by any software or utility (including electronic mail messages and all
15 information referencing or relating to such messages anywhere on a computer or a network,
16 word processing documents and all information stored in connection with such documents,
17 electronic spreadsheets, databases including all records and fields and structural information,
18 charts, graphs and outlines, arrays of information and all other information used or produced by
19 any software), operating systems, source code of all types, programming languages, linkers and
20 compilers, peripheral drivers, batch files, any and all ASCII files, and any and all miscellaneous
21 files and/or file fragments, regardless of the media on which they reside and regardless of
22 whether such electronically stored information consists of an active file, deleted file or file
23 fragment. electronically stored information includes any and all information stored on computer
24 memories, hard disks, floppy disks, CD-ROM drives, Bernoulli Box drives and their equivalent,
magnetic tape of all types, microfiche, punched cards, punched tape, computer chips, including,
but not limited to, EPROM, PROM, RAM and ROM, or on or in any other vehicle for digital
data storage and/or transmittal. Electronically stored information also includes the file, folder
tabs and/or containers and labels appended to, or associated with, any physical storage device

1 associated with the information described above.

2 9. The terms “electronic media” and “media” mean and refer to any magnetic, optical or
3 other storage device used to record electronically stored information. Electronic media storage
4 devices may include, but are not limited to, computer memories, hard disk drives, floppy
5 diskettes, CD-ROM disks, Bernoulli Box drives and their equivalent, magnetic tape of all types,
6 microfiche, punched cards, punched tape, computer chips, including, but not limited to, EPROM,
7 PROM, RAM and ROM, or on or in any other vehicle for digital data storage and/or transmittal.

8 10. The terms “file fragment” and “fragmentary file” mean and refer to any file of
9 electronically stored information existing as a subset of an original active file. A file fragment
10 may be an active file or deleted file. The cause of fragmentation resulting in the fragmentary file
11 can include, but is not limited to, manual intervention, electronic surges, and/or physical defects
12 on electronic media.

13 11. “Identify,” when used in reference to any electronically stored information, means to
14 provide information specifying the software and/or operating system under which the
15 electronically stored information was created; the type of electronically stored information (for
16 example, word processing document, spreadsheet, database, application program.); and all other
17 means of describing it with sufficient particularity to meet the requirements for its inclusion in a
18 request for production of documents pursuant to the [rules].

19 12. The term “layout” means and refers to the interconnections and relationships
20 between computers and electronic media in a computer system.

21 13. The term “network” means and refers to any hardware and/or software combination
22 that connects two or more computers together and which allows such computers to share and/or
23 transfer digital signals between them. For the purposes of this definition, the connection between
24 or among the computers need not be either physical or direct. In addition, there need not be a
central file or data server or a central network operating system in place (i.e. peer-to-peer
networks and networks utilizing a mainframe host to facility transfer of electronically stored
information). The ability to share electronically stored information is the key factor.

14. The term “rotation” means and refers to any plan, policy, or scheme involving the

1 reuse of electronic media after it has been used for backup, archive, or other electronically stored
2 information storage purposes, particularly if such use results in the alternation and/or destruction
3 of electronically stored information residing on such device before or in connection with its
4 reuse.

5 15. The term “support” means and refers to any help or assistance provided to a user of a
6 computer by another individual, whether as an official job function or not. Such help or
7 assistance may take the form of, but is not limited to, answering questions, whether in person or
8 by mechanical means, direct intervention, training, software troubleshooting, hardware
9 troubleshooting, programming, systems consulting, maintenance, repair and/or user forums.
10 Providers of support may be employees, contractors, and/or third-party providers.

11 16. The term “encryption” means and refers to any system program or device utilized to
12 obtain, impart or maintain security to electronically stored information transmitted or stored in or
13 by means of your computers.

14 III. MATTERS ON WHICH EXAMINATION IS REQUESTED

15 1. The “trademark policy and how/whether the domain names were treated within it” and
16 the “general policies and procedures, the volume of incoming trademark complaints as well as
17 the specific handling of the two disputed domain names” to which GoDaddy referred in the joint
18 letter to the Court dated September 2, 2011 (Doc. No. 107) and “GoDaddy’s trademark policies
19 relating to the disputed domain names; application of GoDaddy’s trademark complaint/dispute
20 practices relating the disputed domain names” to which GoDaddy refers in its supplemental
21 initial disclosures dated June 29, 2011.

22 2. The services provided by GoDaddy related to the disputed domain names, including
23 technical aspects of routing/forwarding the disputed domain names.

24 3. David Daash and the “registration and use of the disputed domain names; hosting of
destination website; destination website content,” to which GoDaddy refers in its supplemental
initial disclosures dated June 29, 2011, including when GoDaddy became aware that David
Daash was the registrant of one or both of the disputed domain names and any changes to the
Whois record related thereto.

1 4. GoDaddy's services for "External Domains" to which GoDaddy refers in the
2 document produced with production PET GD 2469 (attached hereto as Exhibit A), including the
3 technical aspects of such services and the differences, if any, between those services and the
4 "routing/forwarding the disputed domain names" to which GoDaddy refers in its supplemental
5 initial disclosures dated June 29, 2011.

6 5. The domain name forwarding service to which GoDaddy refers in Paragraph 29 of its
7 Amended Answer June 20, 2011, including when GoDaddy began to provide that service to any
8 customer.

9 6. Bruno Zehnder and the "hosting of destination website and destination website
10 content" to which GoDaddy refers in its supplemental initial disclosures dated June 29, 2011.

11 7. Heiko Schoenekess, including services provided to him and communications with
12 him.

13 8. Registration and use of the disputed domain names.

14 9. Hosting of the destination website to which GoDaddy refers in its supplemental initial
15 disclosures dated June 29, 2011.

16 10. Destination website content to which GoDaddy refers in its supplemental initial
17 disclosures dated June 29, 2011.

18 11. Any trademark of Petronas, including when GoDaddy first became aware of the
19 foregoing and who at GoDaddy became aware of the foregoing.

20 12. GoDaddy's communications with Petronas, including counsel for Petronas.

21 13. GoDaddy's domain name registration process relating to the disputed domain names,
22 including the process of transferring to GoDaddy an existing domain name from another
23 registrar.

24 14. Agreements governing the services GoDaddy provided with respect to the disputed
25 domain names.

 15. Records relating to domain name registrations to which GoDaddy refers in its initial
disclosures dated July 15, 2010.

 16. Operation of GoDaddy's website to which GoDaddy refers in its initial disclosures

1 dated July 15, 2010.

2 17. GoDaddy's trademark dispute practices to which GoDaddy refers in its initial
3 disclosures dated July 15, 2010.

4 18. GoDaddy's business operations and financial information to which GoDaddy refers
5 in its initial disclosures dated July 15, 2010.

6 19. Documents to which GoDaddy refers in its initial disclosures dated July 15, 2010
7 relating to registration of disputed domain name, content and hosting of disputed website,
8 customer accounts and registration of domain names, GoDaddy contracts and agreements,
9 GoDaddy's website and domain name registration process, communications between Plaintiff's
counsel and GoDaddy.

10 20. The insurance agreement to which GoDaddy refers in its initial disclosures dated
11 July 15, 2010.

12 21. Documents to which GoDaddy refers in its supplemental initial disclosures dated
13 June 29, 2011 relating to customer accounts for disputed domain names, GoDaddy contracts and
14 agreements relating to the disputed domain names, GoDaddy's domain name registration process
15 relating to the disputed domain names, communications between plaintiff's counsel and
16 GoDaddy, services provided by GoDaddy to the registrant of the disputed domain names,
including forwarding of the disputed domain names to a pre-existing website.

17 22. What GoDaddy did regarding the domain name "petronastower.net" after it was
18 contacted on November 26, 2009, December 14, 2009, and December 16, 2009 concerning the
19 domain name "petronastower.net," including the identity all persons involved in the foregoing
and all documents related to the foregoing.

20 23. What GoDaddy did after it was contacted on July 7, 2010 concerning the domain
21 name "petronastowers.net," including the identity of all persons with knowledge of the foregoing
22 and all documents related to the foregoing.

23 24. GoDaddy's intent regarding the registration or maintenance of the domain names
24 "petronastower.net" and "petronastowers.net" and any trademark of Petronas, including the
identity of all persons with knowledge of the foregoing and all documents related to the

1 foregoing.

2 25. Any steps GoDaddy had taken as of December 18, 2009 to remove or otherwise
3 disable the connection and affiliation between the “petronastower.net” and “petronastowers.net”
4 domain names and the pornographic website with which they were associated, including identity
5 of all persons with knowledge of the foregoing and all documents related to the foregoing.

6 26. GoDaddy’s efforts to preserve information, including electronically stored
7 information, related to this case, including the identity of all persons with knowledge of the
8 foregoing and all documents related to the foregoing.

9 27. The configuration documentation and layout of the computers and/or networks used
10 by GoDaddy to create, process and/or store electronically stored information referencing or
11 relating to the subject matters.

12 28. Archiving and backup systems and procedures available on computers and/or
13 networks used by GoDaddy to create, process, and/or store electronically stored information
14 referencing or relating to the subject matters.

15 29. Record retention plans, policies and procedures of GoDaddy applicable to
16 electronically stored information referencing or relating to the subject matters.

17 30. All steps taken by you to preserve electronically stored information as evidence in
18 connection with this action, including all steps taken to prevent or stop deletion, overwriting or
19 modification of electronically stored information that may be relevant to this action.

20 31. Deletion, erasure and/or destruction of storage media including backup and/or
21 archive sets of electronically stored information referencing or relating to the subject matters;
22 damage to and/or destruction of media containing such electronically stored information, and
23 logs and records of such activity.

24 32. The system utilities and application software programs available on computers and
networks used by GoDaddy that have the capability of searching, retrieving, copying, writing,
offloading, and/or exporting electronically stored information referencing or relating to the
subject matters.

33. The email and/or messaging systems used by GoDaddy to transmit or receive

1 electronically stored information or other information referencing or relating to the subject
2 matters, including, but not limited to, internal email and external email communications. (For the
3 purpose of this item, "messaging systems" include paging systems, groupware, and other
4 systems for which one of the primary purposes is transmission of documents or messages among
5 users of your computers and/or network or between users of your computer and/or network and
6 other such systems).

6 34. Policies, procedures, guidelines, rules, standards, and protocols relating to the
7 functioning and use of personal computers and local area networks which may have been used to
8 create or process electronically stored information referencing or relating to the subject: matters.

9 35. Systems for storing and retrieving recordings of telephone calls.

10 36. Any other information needed to identify, access, copy and read electronically stored
11 information referred to in the above items.

12 37. Any other information needed to identify, access, copy and read electronically stored
13 information reflecting electronically-facilitated communications (via email or otherwise) among
14 GoDaddy personnel concerning Petronas, Heiko Schoenekess, David Daash, and Bruno Zehnder
15 or any of them, or the events and transactions encompassed within the allegations of the
16 complaints or answers in this action.
