**ORDER GRANTING IN FORMA  
PAUPERIS STATUS; DISMISSING  
ACTION; AND TERMINATING  
PENDING MOTION AS MOOT**

9 Petitioner, a state prisoner, has filed this petition for a writ of habeas corpus pursuant to 28  
10 U.S.C. § 2254 challenging a restitution fine entered by the Santa Clara County Superior Court in  
11 2009 as part of his six-year sentence. Petitioner also seeks leave to proceed in forma pauperis.

12 For the reasons discussed below, the Court DISMISSES the petition.

13 **DISCUSSION**

14 This Court may entertain a petition for a writ of habeas corpus "in behalf of a person in  
15 custody pursuant to the judgment of a State court only on the ground that he is in custody in  
16 violation of the Constitution or laws or treaties of the United States." 28 U.S.C. § 2254(a).

17 Section 2254(a) uses the term "in custody" twice, with two different requirements. Bailey v.  
18 Hill, 599 F.3d 976, 978 (9th Cir. 2010). The first usage (i.e., that the petition be filed "'in behalf of a  
19 person in custody'") requires that there be a restraint on the petitioner's liberty. Id. at 978-79. The  
20 second usage (i.e., that the application may be entertained "'only on the ground that he is in custody  
21 in violation of the Constitution or laws or treaties of the United States'") requires "a nexus between  
22 the petitioner's claim and the unlawful nature of the custody." Id. at 979-80. For the second  
23 requirement to be satisfied, success on the claim must result in a change in the restraint on the  
24 petitioner's liberty. Id. at 980.

25 As grounds for federal habeas relief in the present case, Petitioner claims that "the judge  
26 charged [him] to [sic] much for [his] restitution for a used cell phone that [he] broke." (Pet. at 7.)

27 The federal habeas statute does not provide jurisdiction over a claim challenging a restitution  
28 order, even when the petitioner is incarcerated. Bailey, 599 F.3d at 980. In Bailey, the petitioner

1 pleaded guilty and was ordered to pay restitution. He filed a section 2254 petition alleging that his  
2 counsel provided ineffective assistance by not objecting to the restitution order. The Ninth Circuit  
3 affirmed the dismissal of the petition on the ground that the petitioner did not meet section 2254's  
4 "in custody" requirement for jurisdiction. Id. The Ninth Circuit concluded that section 2254 does  
5 not confer jurisdiction over a state prisoner's in-custody challenge to the non-custodial portion of his  
6 criminal sentence, such as a restitution order. Id. at 981.

7 Here, Petitioner's claim challenges only the restitution fine imposed. Petitioner does not  
8 allege that he is "in custody in violation of the Constitution or laws or treaties of the United States."  
9 28 U.S.C. § 2254. Petitioner does not claim that his custody or conviction is unlawful. Petitioner's  
10 claim that the trial court exceeded its statutory authority by imposing an excessive restitution fine  
11 fails to satisfy the second custody requirement because success on the claims might cause the  
12 restitution fine to be set aside but would not affect any restraint on his liberty. See Bailey, 599 F.3d  
13 at 980-81 (the "elimination or alteration of a money judgment, does not directly impact -- and is not  
14 directed at the source of the restraint on -- [a petitioner's] liberty" as long as he has to serve the rest  
15 of his prison sentence in the same manner). Therefore, this Court lacks jurisdiction to consider  
16 Petitioner's challenge to the restitution order imposed by the trial court. Accordingly, the instant  
17 action is DISMISSED.

18 **CONCLUSION**

19 For the foregoing reasons, the petition for a writ of habeas corpus is DISMISSED for want of  
20 "in custody" jurisdiction. Petitioner's application to proceed in forma pauperis is GRANTED.

21 The Clerk of the Court shall enter judgment in accordance with this Order, terminate all  
22 pending motions as moot, including Plaintiff' motion for appointment of counsel (docket no. 5), and  
23 close the file.

24 This Order terminates Docket nos. 4 and 5.

25 IT IS SO ORDERED.
