

To The Honorable Court:

I write to register my objection to the settlement in this case. I was a Gmail user who was personally affected by the automatic opt-in of Buzz. I found it frustrating, annoying, and embarrassing. I truly felt that it violated my privacy: I found Buzz difficult to disable, although I was able to after talking to friends who felt the same way.

Nevertheless, I find this settlement to be highly objectionable. No compensation is being paid to any plaintiffs except for the named-plaintiffs who are receiving a windfall for their enabling the lawyers to receive millions. More troubling, though, is the possible excessive compensation of the plaintiffs' attorneys and Google's agreement not to object to their compensation.

The plaintiffs attorneys and Google are colluding to make Google's violation of privacy go away in a manner that unfairly enriches class counsel and would use this Honorable Court for that purpose. Accordingly, I object to the settlement and ask this court to reject it. If the court does accept the settlement, I ask that the court grant only a fraction of the requested attorneys fees.

At this time I do plan to attend the fairness hearing.
