17	On April 5, 2012, Maria Lombera removed this unlawful detainer case from the Santa	
18	Clara County Superior Court. She also filed an Application for Leave to Proceed In Forma	
19	Pauperis (IFP Application).	
20	This is Lombera's second attempt to remove this same unlawful detainer action here.	
21	She previously filed a notice of removal, asserting federal question jurisdiction under 28 U.S.C.	
22	§ 1331. See C11-06390LHK, Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. v. Lombera, Dkt. No. 1. The court	
23	remanded the matter to the state court, finding that the complaint disclosed no federal statutory	
24	or constitutional question. <u>Id.</u> , Dkt. No. 13.	
25	This time around, Lombera claims that removal is proper based upon diversity	
26	jurisdiction, 28 U.S.C. § 1332. Plaintiff Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. moves for remand and for an	
27	award of its fees and costs. The court has received no opposition from Lombera, and the time	
28	for submitting any such papers has passed. The mat	tter is deemed suitable for determination

without oral argument. Civ. L.R. 7-1(b). Plaintiff's motion for an order shortening time is denied, and the noticed May 29, 2012 hearing is vacated. The instant action is hereby referred to Judge Koh for a determination as to whether it is related to C11-06390LHK, *Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. v. Lombera* within the meaning of Civil Local Rule 3-12. Additionally, for the reasons stated below, the undersigned recommends that defendant's IFP Application be denied, plaintiff's motion for remand be granted, and plaintiff's motion for fees and costs be denied.

Removal to federal court is proper where the federal court would have original subject matter jurisdiction over the complaint. 28 U.S.C. § 1441. The removal statutes are strictly construed against removal and place the burden on the defendant to demonstrate that removal was proper. <u>Moore-Thomas v. Alaska Airlines, Inc.</u>, 553 F.3d 1241, 1244 (9th Cir. 2009) (citing <u>Gaus v. Miles, Inc.</u>, 980 F.2d 564, 566 (9th Cir. 1992)). A case must be remanded to the state court if it appears at any time before final judgment that the court lacks subject matter jurisdiction. 28 U.S.C. § 1447(c).¹

As stated in the court's prior order of remand, there is no federal question jurisdiction
because the complaint contains no claim arising under federal law. <u>See Vaden v. Discovery</u>
<u>Bank</u>, 129 S. Ct. 1262, 1272 (2009) (A claim "arises under" federal law if, based on the "wellpleaded complaint rule," the plaintiff alleges a federal claim for relief).

Nor does the court have diversity jurisdiction. The complaint indicates that the amount
demanded does not exceed \$10,000. In any event, as a California defendant, Lombera cannot
remove the case on the basis of diversity. See 28 U.S.C. § 1441(b)(2) (stating that an action
may not be removed on the basis of diversity "if any of the parties in interest properly joined
and served as defendants is a citizen of the State in which such action is brought."); see also
Spencer v. U.S. Dist. Ct., 393 F.3d 867, 870 (9th Cir. 2004) ("It is thus clear that the presence
of a local defendant at the time removal is sought bars removal.").

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Additionally, the court is obliged to examine any application for leave to proceed in forma pauperis and determine whether the action has merit. A court may dismiss a case filed without the payment of the filing fee whenever it determines that the action "(i) is frivolous or malicious; (ii) fails to state a claim on which relief may be granted; or (iii) seeks monetary relief against a defendant who is immune from such relief." 28 U.S.C. § 1915(e)(2)(B)(i)-(iii).

"An order remanding the case may require payment of just costs and any actual 1 2 expenses, including attorney fees, incurred as a result of the removal." 28 U.S.C. § 1447(c). 3 "Absent unusual circumstances, courts may award attorney's fees under § 1447(c) only where 4 the removing party lacked an objectively reasonable basis for seeking removal. Conversely, 5 when an objectively reasonable basis exists, fees should be denied." Martin v. Franklin Capital 6 Corp., 546 U.S. 132, 141, 126 S. Ct. 704, 163 L.Ed.2d 547 (2005). "In applying this rule, 7 district courts retain discretion to consider whether unusual circumstances warrant a departure 8 from the rule in a given case." Id. As explained by the Ninth Circuit, "removal is not 9 objectively unreasonable solely because the removing party's arguments lack merit, or else 10 attorney's fees would always be awarded whenever remand is granted." Lussier v. Dollar Tree 11 Stores, Inc., 518 F.3d 1062, 1065 (9th Cir. 2008). Instead, the objective reasonableness of 12 removal depends on the clarity of the applicable law and whether such law "clearly foreclosed" 13 the arguments in support of removal. Id. at 1066-67. Nevertheless, "[i]n determining whether 14 to award attorneys' fees in cases involving improper removal by a pro se defendant, courts 15 accord significant weight to the defendant's lack of representation." Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. v. 16 Hunt, No. C10-04965JCS, 2011 WL 445801 at *5 (N.D. Cal., Feb. 3, 2011) (collecting cases); 17 see also OneWest Bank, FSB v. Mohr, No. C10-00639SBA, 2010 WL 2721437 at *3 (N.D. Cal. 18 July 7, 2010) (denying request for fees and costs, even where removal was untimely and 19 objectively unreasonable, because defendants did not have the benefit of legal counsel); HSBC 20 Bank USA v. Manuel, No. C10-01186SI, 2010 WL 3366410 at *2 (N.D. Cal., Aug. 25, 2010) 21 (denying request for fees and costs, noting that a party's pro se status warrants some 22 consideration when reviewing a § 1447(c) request). 23 Here, it is plain that there is no basis for removal because this action involves only a

Here, it is plain that there is no basis for removal because this action involves only a state law claim for relief and there is no diversity of citizenship. Moreover, as noted above, this is Lombera's second attempt to remove the same unlawful detainer action here. Nevertheless, she is proceeding pro se, and given the court's prior order of remand for lack of federal question jurisdiction, it is not clear whether defendant understood that there was also no basis for

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1	diversity jurisdiction. ² Accordingly, this court recommends that plaintiff's request for an award		
2	of fees and costs be denied.		
3	Based on the foregoing, this matter is referred to Judge Koh for a related case		
4	determination. The undersigned further recommends that Lombera's application to proceed in		
5	forma pauperis be denied, that plaintiff's motion for remand be granted, and plaintiff's motion		
6	for an award of its fees and costs be denied. Pursuant to Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 72(b),		
7	any party may serve and file objections to this Report and Recommendation within fourteen		
8	days after being served.
