Thursday, February 20, 2014: 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.
Monday, February 24, 2014: 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

This schedule does not include deliberations which will begin after presentation of the case and may continue after 1:00 p.m. but not beyond 5:00 p.m. on any day.

The trial schedule has been designed with half-day sessions to allow you and the court to have time to attend to other business and personal matters each day during the trial. Nevertheless, the law does permit the court to excuse or defer jury service but only if service would constitute an *extreme* hardship for you.
