

I. BACKGROUND

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2 In the interest of expediency, the court will lay out only a brief recitation of the facts of this
3 case.³ In exchange for a loan, Plaintiffs recorded a deed of trust (“DOT”) on their property to
4 secure a promissory note.⁴ Plaintiffs later sought a modification of their loan agreement from
5 BANA in 2011.⁵ Plaintiffs’ allege BANA and Green Tree advised them to remain in default to
6 obtain more favorable loan terms.⁶ On January 10, 2012, BANA subsequently assigned the DOT
7 to Green Tree.⁷ BANA informed Plaintiffs that following the assignment they would need to
8 restart the loan modification process with Green Tree.⁸
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10 At Green Tree’s request, Plaintiffs resubmitted their documents for the loan modification
11 and on June 19, 2012, and Green Tree assigned the DOT to FNMA.⁹ On July 13, 2012, Green
12 Tree denied Plaintiffs’ application for a loan modification.¹⁰ After Plaintiffs’ default and Green
13 Tree’s denial of the loan modification application, Northwest held a trustee’s sale on July 17,
14 2012.¹¹ FNMA purchased the subject property from Northwest at the trustee’s sale.¹² Northwest,

1 Green Tree, and FNMA recorded the assignment of the property to FNMA on August 3, 2012.¹³

2 On September 5, 2012, FNMA filed an unlawful detainer action against Plaintiffs.¹⁴

3 Plaintiffs responded with this suit.¹⁵

4 II. LEGAL STANDARDS

5 A. Motion to Dismiss

6 A complaint must contain “a short and plain statement of the claim showing that the pleader
7 is entitled to relief.”¹⁶ When a plaintiff fails to proffer “enough facts to state a claim to relief that is
8 plausible on its face,” the complaint may be dismissed for failure to state a claim upon which relief
9 may be granted.¹⁷ A claim is facially plausible “when the pleaded factual content allows the court
10 to draw the reasonable inference that the defendant is liable for the misconduct alleged.”¹⁸ Under
11 Fed. R. Civ. P. 12(b)(6), “dismissal can based on the lack of a cognizable legal theory or the
12 absence of sufficient facts alleged under a cognizable legal theory.”¹⁹ Dismissal with prejudice and
13 without leave to amend is appropriate if it is clear that the complaint could not be saved by
14 amendment.²⁰

15 B. Fed. R. Civ. P. 9(b)

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17 “A party must state with particularity the circumstances constituting fraud or mistake,”
18 which requires “statements regarding the time, place, and nature of the alleged fraudulent

1 activities” under Rule 9(b).²¹ “Mere conclusory allegations of fraud are insufficient.”²² To satisfy
2 the heightened standard under Rule 9(b), allegations must be “specific enough to give defendants
3 notice of the particular misconduct which is alleged to constitute the fraud charged so that they can
4 defend against the charge and not just deny that they have done anything wrong.”²³ This includes
5 “the who, what, when, where, and how of the misconduct charged.”²⁴ Plaintiff must also allege
6 what is false or misleading about a statement, and why it is false.”²⁵ “A court may dismiss a claim
7 grounded in fraud when its allegations fail to satisfy [Rule] 9(b)’s heightened pleading
8 requirements.”²⁶

10 C. Rescission

11 “Under California law, in an action to set aside a trustee’s sale, a plaintiff must
12 demonstrate that he has made a ‘valid and viable tender [offer] of payment of the indebtedness.’”²⁷
13 The tender rule requires a plaintiff to (1) “demonstrate a willingness to pay” and (2) “show the
14 ability to pay.”²⁸ “The rationale behind the rules is that if [the borrower] could not have redeemed
15 the property had the sale procedures been proper, any irregularities in the sale did not result in
16 damages to the [borrower].”²⁹ Tender is a requirement in a quiet title action as well as in any

1 action to set aside a trustee sale.³⁰ Further, the borrower must offer to pay the full amount of the
2 debt for which the property was a security.³¹

3 Tender is not required where (1) “the borrower’s action attacks the validity of the
4 underlying debt” since “it would constitute an affirmation of the debt”; (2) “the person who seeks
5 to set aside the trustee’s sale has a counter-claim or set-off against the beneficiary”; (3) “it would
6 be inequitable to impose such a condition on the party challenging the sale”; or (4) “the trustor is
7 not required to rely on equity to attack the deed because the trustee’s deed is void on its face.”³²
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9 III. DISCUSSION

10 A. Fraud

11 Defendants assert Plaintiffs fail to plead their fraud-based claims with specificity pursuant
12 to Fed. R. Civ. P. 9(b). The court agrees. The SAC alleges Defendants “conspired with each other
13 for the purpose of defrauding plaintiffs and inducing plaintiffs to default, in order to acquire the
14 subject property and sell it, to liquidate the promissory note secured to the subject property.”³³
15 Plaintiffs claim Defendants made promises through their agents, but the SAC does not describe the
16 context of who, what, when, and where these promises were made.³⁴ Plaintiffs do not plead their
17 fraud-based claims with the particularity required by Rule 9(b), despite leave from the court to
18 amend those claims. The court is convinced further amendment would be futile. Plaintiffs’
19 fraud-based claims therefore are dismissed without leave to amend.

1 **B. Rescission**

2 It is undisputed that Plaintiffs' complaint does not allege Plaintiffs tendered the outstanding
3 balance remaining on the loan or that they had the ability to do so. Under ordinary circumstances a
4 debtor is required to make a tender as a condition of challenging a foreclosure sale.³⁵ The court's
5 prior order granting Plaintiffs leave to amend noted that if Plaintiffs "cannot plausibly allege their
6 ability and willingness to pay the deficiencies, they have not been harmed by the trustee's sale."³⁶
7 The SAC does no better in alleging any credible tender, nor does it allege any circumstances
8 demonstrating that an exception to the tender rule applies. At best, the SAC alleges that at some
9 undefined point Plaintiffs "were prepared to cure the default" but Defendants denied them the
10 necessary information to cure that default.³⁷ By itself, however, this statement does not establish
11 that any recognized exception to the tender rule applies, for example that Plaintiffs are challenging
12 the validity of underlying debt,³⁸ that Plaintiffs have an offset against their creditor,³⁹ or that the
13 foreclosure sale was void.⁴⁰ The final exception, inequity, is generally invoked only when the sale

1 at issue has yet to occur.⁴¹ Here, the sale already occurred. As a result, even with a second bite,
2 Plaintiffs' claim for rescission falls short.

3 The court's prior order granted Plaintiffs leave to address the deficiencies of their rescission
4 claim, but Plaintiffs' SA has not adequately plead such a claim. The court is convinced further
5 amendment would be futile.

6 Plaintiffs' claims are DISMISSED without further leave to amend.
