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reasons" that outweigh the general history of access and the public policies favoring disclosure.⁴ 2 However, "while protecting the public's interest in access to the courts, we must remain 3 4 mindful of the parties' right to access those same courts upon terms which will not unduly harm 5 their competitive interest."⁵ Records attached to nondispositive motions therefore are not subject 6 to the strong presumption of access.⁶ Because the documents attached to nondispositive motions 7 "are often unrelated, or only tangentially related, to the underlying cause of action," parties moving 8 to seal must meet the lower "good cause" standard of Rule 26(c).⁷ As with dispositive motions, the 9 standard applicable to nondispositive motions requires a "particularized showing"⁸ that "specific 10 prejudice or harm will result" if the information is disclosed.⁹ "Broad allegations of harm, 11 12 unsubstantiated by specific examples of articulated reasoning" will not suffice.¹⁰ A protective 13 order sealing the documents during discovery may reflect the court's previous determination that 14 good cause exists to keep the documents sealed,¹¹ but a blanket protective order that allows the 15 16 17 18 19 ⁴ Id. at 1178-79. 20 ⁵ Apple Inc. v. relating to dispositive motions bear the burden of overcoming the presumption with "compelling"

parties to designate confidential documents does not provide sufficient judicial scrutiny to determine whether each particular document should remain sealed.¹²

In addition to making particularized showings of good cause, parties moving to seal documents must comply with the procedures established by Civ. L.R. 79-5. Pursuant to Civ. L.R. 79-5(b), a sealing order is appropriate only upon a request that establishes the document is "sealable," or "privileged or protectable as a trade secret or otherwise entitled to protection under the law." "The request must be narrowly tailored to seek sealing only of sealable material, and must conform with Civil L.R. 79-5(d)."¹³ "Within 4 days of the filing of the Administrative Motion to File Under Seal, the Designating Party must file a declaration as required by subsection 79-5(d)(1)(A) establishing that all of the designated material is sealable."¹⁴

With these standards in mind, the courts rules on the instant motion as follows:
