Fed. R. Civ. P. 26(b)(1) provides that "[u]nless otherwise limited by court order, the scope of discovery is as follows: Parties may obtain discovery regarding any nonprivileged matter that is relevant to any party's claim or defense . . . Relevant information need not be admissible at the trial if the discovery appears reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of admissible evidence."2

Campbell mistakenly concludes that this court denied Campbell's motion to compel because he could not show how the investigation files are relevant at this time.<sup>3</sup> But that is not what the court said. The court took issue with Campbell's conclusory assertion that simply because certain complaints exist in Delorenzo's case file, they must be relevant to this case and reasonably calculated to lead to admissible evidence. 4 What Campbell does not establish is why or how. For example, Campbell fails to tie investigation files housed at the San Jose Police Department to the incident at issue in this case, which allegedly occurred while Delorenzo was employed by the Santa Cruz County Sherriff. Absent any suggestion—beyond mere speculation that the former would have any bearing on the latter, the court simply cannot conclude that these records fall within the bounds of what is discoverable under Rule 26.

The motion is DENIED.
