I learned later it was because it was sexual harassment issues or just some of Paul's professional conduct in the office when he was papering supervisor. And I don't remember ever really learning, officially learning any other details. No one was really told what happened.

At that point Dave Rosenthal was made the -- actually I take that back. Paul was the section chief when he was -- he wasn't the papering supervisor. There had been at some point in the mid-'90s Paul became the section chief, that's when Mike Cobb got that other title which was like an in-between, I don't know, a deputy or something, and Dave Rosenthal became the papering supervisor. So that had occurred sometime in the mid-'90s, I don't remember exactly when.

In 1997, in the fall, that's when Paul was removed to the civil division by Robert Rogsby.

Q. What was Paul's relationship with the

position, the other position, there were two at one point, and Andy held one of them and I know Mary held the other one.

- Q. Was he a supervisor?
- A. Not while I was there. No. Almost everybody else was. Big on supervisors. They seemed to find a need for one for every other thing that someone did.

Then in 1997 when Paul left, Dave was made to be the acting section chief and I was made to be the papering supervisor at that point. At that point my relationship with Dave was different, professionally, because not only was I the papering supervisor, but I was doing just about, I mean, I was doing a lot of other things. I was doing work that I thought -- when Paul was the section chief, he handled all these other things, like probation hearings. And we had had all new attorneys, none of them knew how to do probation revocation hearings, they didn't know how to -- they really didn't know how to do basic things because they were inexperienced.

Well, we didn't have any manuals for any of these attorneys. When I took over papering supervision from Dave, it was just all disorganization, there was no organization, so I dealt with that, I dealt with probation issues and Dave was the section chief and I could never

1 figure out what he was doing. He wasn't doing 2 what Paul did as the section chief. He was attending a lot of meetings, he was the acting 3 section chief for a while. Attending a lot of 4 5 meetings and, you know, the relationship was not an easy one. б Did you ever have any negative 7 8 interactions with Dave Rosenthal? I'm sure I did. I'm sure I did. 9 Α. Ι mean, you know, I mean, I didn't make it a secret 10 11 that I thought that Dave could do a little more work and a little less meeting. 12 13 Q. And she was deceiving, because if you would look at Mary's office you would see cases everywhere, I mean, just -- you know, we all had these huge offices in that old building and she would have files everywhere. And you would think, oh, my God, how is she ever going to have all or facts together to try a case. And then she would try a case and it would be zip, zip, zip, conviction, conviction. And that's how Mary tried cases. She got it all done. She got the right witnesses and got them convicted. It didn't seem to be that big of a deal. I was surprised, I was

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section, blamed Mary as being responsible for the removal of Paul Alper?

And after about five or six months I said, you know, this isn't 20 21 going to last if I'm not paid. And then finally

another six months later, it just doesn't happen overnight, I went to them on a couple of occasions.

And then finally after a year, it was about a year, I said, you know, I'm not going to do it. Because they said, okay, well, we'll give you a promotion. And I said, well, does this -- approve me to assistant section chief, and I said does this promotion entail more money? And they said, well, I think it does. I said, no think, I said I don't want the title if I'm not going to get the money.

And he said, then he came back to me later on and he said he'd either talked to the corporation counsel, who was John Ferren at the time, and he gave him his word that it would be a raise in step or grade or whatever it was. And I said, okay I'll do it then. But I waited until it was confirmed -- well, I was already doing it, but let's just say I didn't stop doing it.

Q. During the time that you worked in

that's when all that happened.


Sometime after that was when somebody -- and I'm just assuming it was Dave because he was the section chief, created the position of trial supervisor. And I think the first person to hold that position was Tom Gillice.

Then it dwindled down because police stopped arresting juveniles. But I think Tom was the trial supervisor and Dave Rubenstein took over the sex offense cases. So it kind of just,
