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A There was a mixture of people in place at the time when the march got there. We let those people go.

Once they saw the police, a lot of the people left, including some of the demonstrators.

- Q After the two police lines had been set up and some number of protestors were trapped inside, was it you who gave direction to give warnings?
 - A Yes. I told Harold to do that.
