FRIEDMAN, LOMBARDI & OLSON

THE VIDEOGRAPHER: In the case styled Howard Adelman and Judith Sclawy-Adelman at co-personal representatives of the Estate of Michael Sclawy-Adelman versus Boy Scouts of America, et al, case Number 10-CV-22236-ASG, this is the videotaped deposition of Howard Crompton.

This deposition is taking place at 2800 Ponce de Leon Boulevard, Coral Gables, Florida on March 8, 2011. The time is now 10:34 a.m.

Would counsel please state their appearance for the record.

MR. PELTZ: Good morning. My name is Bob Peltz. I represent the plaintiffs.

MR. SUMMERS: Good morning. My name is Bill Summers and I represent Boy Scouts of America and the South Florida Council.

MR. GAEBE: Greg Gaebe on behalf of the Plantation United Methodist Church.

MR. HASTY: Good morning. Rick Hasty on behalf of Howard Crompton and Andy Schmidt.

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HOWARD CROMPTON

was called as a witness and, having been duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MR. PELTZ:

- Q. Could you state your name and home address, please?
- A. Howard Crompton. Howard Ken Crompton.

 My home address is 10349 Northwest Second

 Court, Plantation, Florida, 33324.
 - Q. Are you presently employed?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. What do you do?
 - A. Printing.
 - Q. And what do you do in printing?
 - A. We have a printing company.
- Q. How long have you had your own printing company?
 - A. We purchased an existing company in '87.
 - Q. What's the name of it?
- A. The company name is Crompco, Incorporated d/b/a Park Row Printing.
- Q. Can you tell me about your educational background?

FRIEDMAN, LOMBARDI & OLSON

- A. Graduated high school in 1983, and not too much after that other than classes here and there for various things.
- Q. Did you -- what type of work did you do between 1983 and the time you purchased the printing company?
 - A. We had a liquor store business.
 - Q. Are you the owner of Crompco?
 - A. I'm one of the owners of Crompco.
 - Q. Is that your full-time employment?
 - A. Yes, it is.
- Q. When did you first become involved in Boy Scouts?
- A. Probably as a Cub Scout -- I don't remember my exact age, but I was a Cub Scout. Went up through that. Went into Boy Scouts until I was 18, and then recently with Troop 111. I believe that was 2007 I started there.
 - Q. How far did you go in Boy Scouts yourself?
 - A. I made it to Life Scout.
- Q. And you started you said in Troop 111 -- 2007, did you say?
- A. I believe it was 2007. I think my son joined and possibly about a year after he joined I started getting involved.

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Q. Did you have any involvement in the Boy
Scouts between the time that you had reached age 18
until the time that you your son joined Troop 1113
A. Only as a parent when he was in Cub Scouts
going on a couple of camp outs and things like that,
but not much involvement.

- Q. Have you engaged in any camping outside of Boy Scouts?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And what is your camping experience outside of Boy Scouts?
- A. Just -- just a few camp outs with friends. Stuff like that. Not really -- not really much camping.
- Q. Do you have your own tent and sleeping bags?
 - A. I have my own tent, sleeping bags, yes.
- Q. Did you have your own tent and sleeping bags before you joined Troop 111?
- A. No. I purchased my tent and sleeping bags after I joined the troop.
- Q. Where are some of the places that you've gone camping outside of the Boy Scouts?
- A. Just a few camps down in the Keys.

 Nothing -- I've camped, I think, at Long Key and a

- Q. Have you been involved in any hiking outside of Boy Scouts?
 - A. No. No hiking outside of Boy Scouts.

Well, you know what? I'm sorry. I do hike. We have a home in North Carolina and -- actually the Appalachian Trail runs really close to that, so there's a little five-mile hike we like to do when my family goes up there, so we do do that.

- Q. Whereabouts do you live in North Carolina?
- A. It's a town called Topton.
- Q. Other than that, do you have any other hiking experience outside of Boy Scouts?
 - A. No. I think that's it.
- Q. What training did you undergo for Boy Scouts?

Once you joined the Boy Scouts of America what training -- Boy Scout of America training did you undergo?

A. Well, I believe they -- they like you to do the youth protection training, so I did that on line. I think I did the fast start training -- well, I did the fast start training, and then there's a scoutmaster specific training and, you know, you do a

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particular subject matter to be approved?

- A. Does that -- it says that here? To apply?
- Q. Can you read back -- if you don't understand the question, tell me what you don't understand about it.
 - A. You said page 6.

Are you saying on page 6 it tells -- it says that they're supposed to apply?

Q. It says scoutmasters and assistant scoutmasters are not automatically approved as merit badge counselors.

Do you see that?

- A. Yeah, I see that.
- Q. So my question to you is: Under Troop 111 were scoutmasters and assistant scoutmasters automatically approved as merit badge counselors or did they have to go through a process in which they sought approval and a determination was made that they were qualified to be merit badge instructors in that particular subject?
- A. Well, I thought I said earlier that Pat
 Quinn was the merit badge person. He would take
 their names down in whatever subject they felt
 comfortable in, and he would review it and make them
 or apply for their merit badge counselor -- add them
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to the list to be a counselor for that merit badge.

- Q. And that applied to both the assistant scoutmasters and the scoutmasters as well?
- A. It would apply to anybody that wanted to be a merit badge counselor.
- Q. Okay. I'd like to direct your attention to page 3 in the bottom paragraph.

Do you see where it says that: A potential merit badge counselor must complete the BSA adult application and submit it along with the BSA merit badge counselor information form to the BSA local counsel office and renewal of this registration annually as necessary to continue as a merit badge counselor?

- A. I see that.
- Q. Is that your understanding of the process that was followed in Troop 111?
 - A. I thought -- yeah. I mean, you have to --
- Q. So would you have filled out the merit badge counselor information form and the adult application form to be a merit badge counselor in camping and photographic arts?
- A. Well, I know I filled out the adult application and then I guess it would have been something I signed for: Yes, I'll do graphic arts FRIEDMAN, LOMBARDI & OLSON

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4 25 your adult application form and your merit badge counselor information form? I don't know if they keep those sort of A.

So somewhere there should exist on file

- things.
- But your testimony is that you have filled Q. those forms out and submitted them to the appropriate individuals in the troop?
- Well, I know I filled out the adult application to be registered in the troop.
- And how about the merit badge information form referred to?
- Α. I assume I filled that out. I don't actually recall filling that out, so -- but if it was required I guess I did it.
 - Q. You have no specific recollection of it?
 - Α. No, I do not.
- Let me show you another document which Q. we'll mark as the next exhibit after that one, which is identified as the guide for merit badge counselors.
- MR. HASTY: Just note my objection. document is not authenticated. It may have been published after the fact.

Go ahead.

- Q. Have you ever seen that document before?
- A. This looks like a printout from a website.

MR. HASTY: That's not his question.

The question is: Have you seen the document before. That's what he wants to know.

- Q. Either this document or some other form of this document.
- A. I can't say that I've seen it or haven't seen it.
- Q. Okay. In this document it talks about the merit badge counselor meeting with the scout to start working on the requirements and then it goes on to say there, referring to page 2: As the merit badge counselor you and the scout work out a tentative schedule for completing the requirements. You should consider both long-term and short-term goals, keeping other obligations such as school, scouting, sports and so on in mind, and set dates, times and a location for future meetings. The number of meetings will depend on the difficulty of the requirements and the preparation and ability of the scout.

Is that the format that you followed in your role as a merit badge counselor?

A. I believe I would have followed that FRIEDMAN, LOMBARDI & OLSON

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format.

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- Q. Was that the format that was followed by the other merit badge counselors of Troop 111 to the extent that you're aware?
 - A. To the extent that I'm aware.
- Q. Now -- so for purposes of complying with merit badge requirements scouts wouldn't just merely show up at an event, but they would instead -- the event would be part of a process in which they would have first met with their merit badge counselor to discuss the merit badge requirements and discuss the strategy for completing them?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Now, can you tell me what hikes you've been on in connection with the Boy Scouts --

MR. SUMMERS: Objection to form.

Q. -- of America?

Can you tell me what Boy Scout of America hikes you've been on?

- A. I can tell you some of them.
- We have -- did we have an exhibit with the hiking list on it?
 - Q. Uh-huh.
 - A. Okay. If I could refer --
 - Q. Your attorney is copying it.

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- O. Did he seem to be normal?
- A. He seemed to be normal.
- Q. Who was the charter organization representative at the time of this hike?
 - A. I believe that was Linda Vested.
- Q. And what was her role as the charter organization representative?
- A. Basically she's a liaison between the troop and the church.
 - Q. And what does that involve?
- A. I'm not really sure what the exact job description is for that charter organizational rep.
- Q. Did the -- in her capacity as charter organizational rep did she supervise any of the actual activities that the -- your troop was performing?

MR. SCHEVIS: Object to form.

- A. As far as supervising, you mean like going out on the hikes or what -- coming to meetings or --
 - Q. Any or all of the above.
 I'm trying to find out what she did.
 MR. SCHEVIS: Form.
- A. She would occasionally make the committee meetings. She would attend our spaghetti dinner.

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Yes. FRIEDMAN, LOMBARDI & OLS

I mean, I show she's very involved with the
church, so I guess she would keep them informed about
what we did. She was probably copied on all
correspondence, minutes of the troop. I'm not sure
what also

- Q. Did she have any input into the creation of the hiking schedule?
 - A. I don't believe she did.
- Q. Did she have any input into the creation of the annual calendar?
- A. I don't believe she did, unless she was at the committee meeting that we went over the calendar.
- Q. Did she have any boys who were in the troop at that time?
 - A. No.

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- Q. Had she at any point?
- A. Yes. Her boy was an Eagle Scout but he's -- I mean, he's older now.
 - Q. When did he leave the troop?
 - A. I don't know.
 - Q. Before you got involved?
 - A. Before I was involved, yes.
- Q. Would she be involved in determining who the scoutmasters would be?

Q. Would that be the decision of the church and/or its charter organization representative?

MR. SCHEVIS: Object to the form.

A. Like I say, I think she had a say in it and she's the charter organizational rep. She was the one that, you know, got me to be committee chair so she was familiar with me before I took over as scoutmaster.

You know, then I guess she would let the church know -- when I became scoutmaster she would tell them.

- Q. Was she responsible -- well, strike that.

 Did she approve you becoming scoutmaster?
- A. Did she -- I believe she approved of me being scoutmaster. I don't know if she actually was at the meeting and voted on me being scoutmaster.
- Q. I'm sorry. What I'm talking about: As the charter organizational representative did she approve on behalf of the charter organization, which was the church, you being named scoutmaster?
 - A. I don't know.
- Q. The committee you were referring to is the -- which committee?
 - A. The troop committee.
 - Q. And that consists of a number of the FRIEDMAN, LOMBARDI & OLSON

- parents and other people that are involved with the troop?
 - A. Yes. The volunteers of the troop.
- Q. Now, do most of the boys particularly -strike that.

Does the church get involved -- strike that.

Did you say earlier that the funding for the troop came through the spaghetti dinner?

- A. I don't believe I said that.
- Q. Well, maybe it was Mr. Schmidt.

Let me ask you: Did the funding for the troop largely come from the spaghetti dinner?

- A. The spaghetti dinner has been, I believe, our biggest fundraiser.
- Q. Is the church involved with that in any way other than allowing you to use their facilities?
 - A. With the spaghetti dinner?
 - Q. Yes, sir.
- A. I don't believe they're involved with it other than allowing us to put it on.
 - Q. Does the church fund the troop in any way?
 - A. Not to my knowledge, no.
 - Q. Was Mr. Schmidt the leader of this

and the one who had more experience in hiking?

MR. HASTY: Objection to form.

- A. Well, Mr. Schmidt has more experience hiking. Mr. Schmidt was the hiking merit badge counselor. I was scoutmaster. I would say it was a shared leadership thing, but if you want you can be -- we can call him the leader.
 - Q. I don't want -- I'm asking you.
- A. I believe it was shared leadership for the day.
- Q. Did you generally look to him to make the decisions as being the individual who was more experienced in the activity?

Let me ask you this: Did you look to him to have more input into the decisions as the individual who had more experience?

- A. I definitely trusted his knowledge and experience.
- Q. Are you provided insurance coverage for this incident by the Boy Scouts of America?
- A. I actually don't know how I'm covered by the Boy Scouts of America. I assume they have some sort of insurance.
- Q. You have no specific understanding of whether you're covered and, if so, the extent of the FRIEDMAN, LOMBARDI & OLSON

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- Has the agent or anyone from State Farm
 - FRIEDMAN, LOMBARDI & OLSON

- Α. I haven't seen the policy. I don't know.
- Q. Well, have you received any documentation from the Boy Scouts of America indicating whether or not you have coverage?
 - I don't believe I have any documentation.
- Q. Did you have homeowners coverage at the time?
 - Α. Yes.
 - And what company was that with? Q.
 - A. State Farm.
 - Q. Do you know what your policy limits were?
 - I do not. Α.
 - Have you made a claim -- strike that. Q.

Have you advised State Farm of this claim and asked them to provide coverage?

- I have called -- I have called the insurance company or the agent and mentioned the incident to them.
- Q. So they're aware of the fact that the claim exists?
- Α. They are aware that this is going on and, you know --
- told you whether or not there is coverage under your

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
