Good day to you. I am objecting to this settlement because Chase failed to pay off my credit card to date for the amount of when I got sick for over seven months. I was completely disabled from September, 2006 to May, 2007. I contacted Chase and let them know I was ill, and was not working. Furthermore, I explained to the agent that I did major surgery, and had no idea when I would be back at work. I even send updated medical reports from my doctor, and was told that I had a grace period. In addition, if I was ill beyond six months the plan will cover all of my debts.

I kept in contact with Chase, and my other credit card company Sears about my illness. Sears has honored the plan, and Chase refused to do so to date. Chase has sued me for the payment plus interest on this debt in the amount of \$2, 379.38, in Kings County Court, New York on Index no # 032784. As such I opposed this settlement because it would still leave me owing Chase, which I do not think I do. In addition, I strongly feel that Chase collected my payments on this plan, which I did with good faith, and has failed to honor the agreement.

I did spoke to a Chase's and Sears's agent prior to signing up for the plan, asking about the benefits. Thus, I enroll in the plan because I was assured that it would cover me in the event that I could not work, and could not pay my credit card payments.
