1670. Professor Lasner taught PERS2001 during Fall 2009.

1671. One-hundred fourteen students enrolled in Professor Lasner's section of PERS2001.

1672. Professor Lasner used an excerpt from the work Crabgrass Frontier: The Suburbanization of the United States while teaching PERS2001 during Fall 2009.

1673. Crabgrass Frontier is published by Oxford.

1674. Crabgrass Frontier is 405 pages long.

1675. Crabgrass Frontier is a collective work made up of works from several different contributors.

1676. Professor Lasner prepared a fair use checklist prior to requesting that the library put the excerpt of the work on Georgia State University's ERes system.

1677. The excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier that was placed on Georgia State University's ERes system was 26 pages long, and constituted approximately 8.5% of the work.

1678. The excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier that was placed on Georgia State University's ERes system was used for a nonprofit, educational purpose. Namely, the excerpt was used as part of Professor Lasner's course materials for the purpose of teaching his class, and neither Professor Lasner, Georgia State University, nor the named defendants profited from the use of the excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier.

1687. Professor Lasner did not publish or publicly distribute the excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier that he placed on Georgia State University's ERes system.

1688. Professor Lasner's use of the excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier that he placed on Georgia State University's ERes system did not exceed his intended educational purpose.

1689. Crabgrass Frontier is a published work.

1690. Crabgrass Frontier is a factual work of nonfiction.

1691. The excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier that Professor Lasner used in his course was important to his educational objectives.

1692. The excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier that Professor Lasner used in his course amounts to 8.5% of the work, and as such, was a small portion of Crabgrass Frontier.

1693. The excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier that Professor Lasner used in his course was not central to the work.

1694. The excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier that Professor Lasner used in his course was narrowly tailored for Professor Lasner's educational purpose.

1695. Professor Lasner's use of the excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier did not have a significant effect on the market or potential market for the copyrighted work because the ERes excerpt was restricted to his class.

1696. Professor Lasner's use of the excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier stimulated the market for the original work.

1697. The publisher of Crabgrass Frontier does not market any similar product.

1698. A small number of copies of the excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier were distributed—specifically, the ERes records indicate that the work was accessed 3 times.

1699. Access to the excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier was limited to the students in the class by a password protected website.

1700. The excerpt of Crabgrass Frontier was removed from the ERes system after the semester ended.

1701. GSU lawfully owns a copy of Crabgrass Frontier.

(b) The Politics of Public Housing: Black Women's Struggles Against Urban Inequality

1702. Professor Lasner used an excerpt from the work The Politics of Public Housing: Black Women's Struggles Against Urban Inequality while teaching PERS2001 during Fall 2009.

1703. The Politics of Public Housing is published by Oxford.

1704. The Politics of Public Housing is 306 pages long.

1705. The Politics of Public Housing is a collective work made up of works from several different contributors.

1706. The Politics of Public Housing is not owned by Oxford by an assignment.

1707. The excerpt of The Politics of Public Housing Professor Lasner placed on Georgia State University's ERes system is a single work provided by one contributor, and that contributor did not assign or grant an exclusive license to the work to Oxford.

1708. Professor Lasner prepared a fair use checklist prior to requesting that the library put the excerpt of the work on Georgia State University's ERes system.

1709. The excerpt of The Politics of Public Housing that was placed on Georgia State University's ERes system was 33 pages long, and constituted approximately 13.5% of the work.
