- A. As we sit here today if they're submitting something that needs to be digitized or go up in an electronic format, then they have to submit an online form. And so that form comes to a reserves e-mail. The actual desk workers are not going to be checking for that because they don't have access to that e-mail. But the reserves staff will check for it and make sure we have it before we post the material.
- Q. Who has access to that reserves e-mail address?
- A. Everyone in the reserves unit or my little unit of me and Malia, Doug, Corey. Kelly does not. There may be some other people, but I don't know who they are. It would make -- well, I don't know.
- Q. How do you guys check that e-mail? Is one of you responsible or --
  - A. We all have access to it and we all check it.
  - Q. Do you all check it every day?
- A. I check it every day. We should all be checking it every day, yes.
- Q. And how do you decide who deals with each request that comes in to that e-mail address?
- A. The request, if it says print beside it, it will tell us print and so Corey would handle those.

But how the server itself works, its maintenance and all that I don't know about.

- Q. Who has that password to put the scanning or the scanned materials on to the ERes system?
- A. I'm not sure who all has it. Malia and I have it, Kelly has probably had it. I don't know if Corey or Doug actually has the password or not.
- Q. I think you mentioned a little while ago you spend about 10 hours a week manning the desk. What else do you do? What else does your job description do?
- A. I take care of the media center. There's media equipment out there and videos and CDs, other media formats. We have some laptops and I make sure that they get taken care of, if there's any problems with them. Managing the work flow of the circulation desk and the reserves unit, the media center in general. And work with the liaison librarian somewhat in making sure that if materials need to be purchased that they have the information that they need to consider that purchase.

There might be more. That's what I can think of at the moment.

Q. When you say liaison librarian, what do you mean by that?

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Q. Okay.

And above that we do not have five student assistants. We no longer coordinate with IS&T in scanning documents. It might have been over here as Yes, it was in mine as well. That would be something we used to do but no longer do.

Do you want to know -- do you want to know if this is current or this is the old way of doing things?

- Q. Whatever you can tell me about the document.
- Currently and in the past we searched for electronic documents in our databases. I don't know how they're defining Galileo if that's all of our databases I think they call it that sometimes, but I don't know what all of that entails.

In the past we converted materials that we found in our electronic databases, articles and what not to PDF and uploaded them. Currently we are not doing that, we're linking to those articles. We might search for complete citations, but currently the form that teachers are required to fill out requires those fields, so hopefully we won't have to search for them.

We do not determine copyright compliance. do check the material to see if it meets guidelines for Georgia State and see if it -- if some red flags show up then we would address it. I don't think Malia has done

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typically you will not ask for five chapters. And once we receive the request if the instructor owns the material they can -- they could bring it to us at any time, we just can't post it until we get the request online.

If the library owns it, then we could pull it from the shelves for them, scan it if necessary, sometimes our databases will just link rather than scan. - A. There are guidelines and those guidelines state what -- they're there to help the people who are submitting reserves understand what can be posted.
- Q. But does the library have any guidelines for what should be posted on EReserves or what shouldn't be posted on EReserves?
- A. We can read the same guidelines. As far as the instructor's going to be responsible for meeting the various guidelines and the staff can read the same guidelines that the instructors read. So there are tools there available.
- Q. Does the library have any guidelines or policies or guidance of any sort besides what's available to the faculty?
- A. There are some -- some things are set in stone at the moment, but not everything.
  - Q. What is set in stone right now?
- A. They have to submit via the online form. The pages are archived end of every semester. Possibly the items are deleted from the page at the end of every semester. There are others.
- Q. Is there anything whether it's set in stone or being developed that would give the library staff member any kind of guidance as to when that staff member should

A. Yes. If it's public domain then the -- if it's truly public domain then you shouldn't need to pay licensing to use it. I guess there could be some exceptions to that, but I think that's typically what that means.

I'm not that familiar with creative common license. I've seen a few web sites, but I think -- I don't really know what -- I didn't read them, so I don't know what they are.

- Q. A fourth choice is I obtained permission from the copyright holder. Do you see that?
  - A. Yes.
  - Q. What does that refer to?
- A. If the copyright holder gave someone permission to use it, then they could check that I would think.
- Q. Would the library look at a copy of the permission?
- A. What we've done in the past, which is -- or probably what we would continue to do, I'm not sure what we're going to do, but we have asked them to provide us with a permission letter before. So I don't know if we'll continue to do that or not.

- Q. Do you believe that anyone on the reserves staff is in a position to challenge the way a professor has filled out the fair use checklist?
- A. If we happen to see it we might question it.

  But I don't -- as far as I know we wouldn't -- because

  we don't know how they're using the material I don't

  think that we could evaluate it appropriately. So I

  don't think that we should do that.
- Q. Have you received any training on how to fill out this checklist?
- A. No. I've looked at it, but -- and I've had -I went to a copyright training session. I don't
  remember talking about this in the training session but
  we might have. But I haven't actually been -- and I
  discussed some of these, the wordings of things, but I
  haven't actually been trained to fill out the form.
- Q. Without inquiring into any communications that might be attorney client privilege, which of the factors or criteria on Plaintiffs' Exhibit 90 have you had discussions about?

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Do you recognize this document? Take your time to review it. I'm going to ask you specific questions, so right now I'm just generally asking if this is something that you recognize.

- A. The -- it looks familiar.
- Q. Okay. On page 2 of Plaintiffs' 127 about two thirds of the way down the page, the question in bold is do I have the option of placing paper copies of materials such as articles and class notes on reserve. And the answer is no. Students now expect and prefer to access reserve materials from the computer desktop. Online access allows an unlimited number of students to access the materials 24/7 from anywhere in the world.

To best of your understanding is this current policy?

- A. This -- I don't know about the option of placing paper copies. I don't know if that's something that's going to change or not. But the access, the unlimited numbers of students to access the materials 24/7 from wherever they are seems to be current to me.
- Q. The next line of P-127 says, what materials may be placed on reserve without obtaining copyright permission. And we see physical copies of books, CDs and videos.

Is that still current?

- Q. Do you believe that copyright permission needs to be sought if it's more than 20 percent of a book intended to be placed on reserve?
  - Α. It would depend on the situation and the

- Q. Little ways down on P-127 it says the bookstore did not order enough copies of my textbook for class. Can I put a photocopy of the book on reserve. Answer no. This is not considered fair use because it affects the marketing value of the copyright owner. The instructor may place his or her own original copy of the textbook on reserve. Is that the current policy?
- The current policy is actually pretty short, so a lot of these details that you're referring to as policy is probably not policy. The photocopying an entire textbook, there's a good chance that that will affect the market value, so that's not a practice that we would typically do.
- What if a professor filled out the fair use checklist and determined that the photocopy of the entire book was fair use, would you go ahead and post it?
- That would be a red flag, and so that would have to be questioned and would go to the supervisor or legal affairs or both.
- Q. What is meant by it's not considered fair use because it affects the marketing value of the copyright owner?
  - I think marketing value is a very difficult Α.

factor to determine. It's quite possible that an entire book would affect it because you can just take the photocopy of the entire book instead of purchasing it. You don't want to replace -- students should be or someone should be purchasing this book if we're going to put this book on reserve. And to make a photocopy of it seems like it has the potential to really affect the marketing value.

- Q. What's your understanding of the marketing value?
  - A. Not much.
- Q. In your opinion could something, something less than the full book be photocopied and placed on EReserves and not affect the marketing value?
  - A. I think it depends on the situation.
- Q. Can you think of any situation where photocopying something less than the entire book and putting it on EReserves would not affect the marketing value?
- A. Hopefully there's a lot of those situations. Specifically I don't have one in mind, but yes, I believe there's a lot.
- Q. Who has the ability to either add or delete items on a course reserves page in ERes?
  - A. Anyone with administrator access.

- Q. What does it mean to manage ERes for copyright per course page?
- A. It's does this specific item meet fair use for this specific class.
- Q. As we sit here today, is it still true that you manage ERes for copyright per course page?
- A. Well, the instructor would tell us -- they would tell us if -- the copyright information that we need. So it would be up to them. They're submitting the material for a specific class. But I don't know, I don't know how to answer that question I don't think.
- Q. What other ways could you manage ERes for copyright if it wasn't per course page?
  - A. I don't know.

- Α. The actual wording in the guideline I believe is one chapter or up to 20 percent to be specific.
- Am I understanding then the standard was one chapter or 20 percent, whichever is greater?
- Α. The standard was one chapter or up to 20 percent.
- Q. In P-131 Ms. Jungels goes on to say, do students prefer material to be placed on electronic reserve or in coursepacks.

What is the answer to that question?

- Α. I don't know the answer to that question.
- Q. She says I worry about the cost of the coursepacks since most if not all of it will be copyrighted. But I know I hate to print out dozens of articles every semester. Would it raise a red flag for you to have somebody put on EReserves things that would be copyrighted and cost money if they were part of a coursepack?
- I don't really deal with coursepacks so I'm going to be unfamiliar with some of that. material -- if it was not a coursepack and they submitted the material via our online request form and they did the evaluation, there were no red flags, then it seems to me it would be postable to ERes.

Let's say Ms. Jungels puts together a coursepack of 10 copyrighted excerpts from books and as a coursepack licenses are obtained for each of these 10 excerpts. And when students go to purchase this coursepack they are charged money for the photocopies themselves and for the licensing fees. Okay. You with me so far?

- A. Okay.
- Q. Now, let's say instead of putting them in a paper coursepack and obtaining licenses, Ms. Jungels takes the exact same 10 excerpts and fills out the checklist for each of them. Each of them pass the fair use check list in her estimation and she sends them to you to post them on EReserves. Do you post them on EReserves?
- A. If the material truly met fair use then it would be okay to post material that met fair use.
- Q. And how would you determine whether it truly met fair use?
- A. The instructor would tell us because they would evaluate it. And if there were no red flags, then we could post it.
- Q. Do students pay to access material that's posted on ERes?
  - A. Not that I know of. No.

What I would like to do is survey the department to see what kind of questions they have had on these issues and then forward them to you and have you address them in an upcoming meeting.

- Q. Could you give me an example of a situation in which it might be appropriate to recommend or -- strike that.

Can you give me examples of a situation in which someone might recommend one system over another?

- A. If an instructor wanted access to create their own online course. You can't really do that in ERes, so I would not recommend our software for that. And there is software available in ULearn for that.
  - Q. Can professors post course reading to ULearn?
- A. I don't know much about ULearn. To the best of my knowledge it is technologically possible to post material to ULearn.
- Q. Do you have any general understanding of whether or not GSU professors are able to post course

- Q. Okay. Issue number 2 in P-141 says WebCT link issues may be remedied by editing the persistent URL in WebCT with the one currently listed in ERes after our upgrade last Monday. What does that mean?
  - A. I don't remember what this means at all.
- Q. Okay. Later on in the issue 2 in P-141 you say, the problem with the current persistent URL in ERes is once you access ERez once with your password, you can copy that URL and place it anywhere in the world to give anyone in the world access to ERes without a password. The persistent URL bypasses the password requirement. I tried this on my home computer and it works great with
