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1 in order to counteract Mr. Bastian's -- or in  
 2 order to expose Mr. Bastian as a Democrat running  
 3 as a Republican; is that right?  
 4 A. Yes.  
 5 Q. And was that money, then, not available  
 6 to spend on your presentation of other campaign  
 7 issues to the voters in the primary?  
 8 A. Yes.  
 9 Q. Would you have had any preference in  
 10 the way that you ran your campaign in either  
 11 presenting the issues or sending out mailers  
 12 discussing who's the Democrat and who's the  
 13 Republican?  
 14 A. Well, yeah. I would prefer just to  
 15 stick with the issues. But, you know, it seemed  
 16 that that was the pertinent -- I felt one of the  
 17 pertinent issues in a Republican Primary.  
 18 Q. So would you call this negative  
 19 campaigning?  
 20 A. I guess. I mean, I would much rather  
 21 prefer to sticking with the important issues.  
 22 Q. How much time of your campaign and the  
 23 total time of the primary did you spend on this  
 24 type of negative campaigning as opposed to  
 25 discussing the issues of importance to the voters



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1 in your district?  
 2 A. Well, I think that was probably more of  
 3 the focus. I mean, it was -- Stan didn't have a  
 4 voting record, so, you know, it wasn't compared.  
 5 I mean, he went after my voting record, I  
 6 responded to his issues on that.  
 7 Q. In your affidavit in Paragraph 5 you  
 8 point out that in your race the total votes was  
 9 105 more than were cast in the presidential  
 10 primary election; is that right?  
 11 A. Yes.  
 12 Q. And it was 343 more than were cast in  
 13 the Crapo race; is that correct?  
 14 A. Yes.  
 15 Q. So there were more votes cast in the  
 16 presidential primary in your district than in the  
 17 Crapo race, correct?  
 18 A. Ask that again.  
 19 Q. In your race against Bastian, the total  
 20 votes exceeded those cast in the presidential  
 21 primary by 105 votes. Do you see that?  
 22 A. Right.  
 23 Q. And the votes cast in your election, in  
 24 your primary election, it exceeded the votes cast  
 25 in the Crapo race by 343 votes?

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1 A. Yes.  
 2 Q. So isn't it a fact that there were 238  
 3 more votes cast in the presidential primary race  
 4 than in the Crapo race?  
 5 A. Yes. If the math is correct. I trust  
 6 your math.  
 7 Q. However, there were 612 ballots in the  
 8 presidential race that were cast for "none of the  
 9 above" instead of being cast for the unopposed  
 10 President Bush, correct?  
 11 A. Correct.  
 12 Q. So tell me, is it the case that the 612  
 13 people who voted "none of the above" they didn't  
 14 bypass the unopposed presidential primary race,  
 15 they, in fact, voted against President Bush on  
 16 the ballot; is that right?  
 17 A. You could make that -- yeah.  
 18 Q. Is it fair to say -- would you agree  
 19 with me that Senator Crapo, in 2004, was the most  
 20 popular Republican elected official in the state

 23 Q. And that he was the most popular  
 24 candidate for the Republican Party?  
 25 A. I would say yes.

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1  Q. Do you know of any reason that in the  
 2 343 more votes cast in your election than Senator  
 3 Crapo received, that if there were true  
 4 Republican voters voting in your election that  
 5 they wouldn't cast a vote for Senator Crapo?  
 6 MR. SMITH: Objection. That's calling  
 7 for rank speculation, Counsel.  
 8 MR. TROUPIS: Okay.  
 9 MR. SMITH: You can answer.  
 10 THE WITNESS: I would have to agree  
 11 that Mr. Crapo was more popular than I was.  
 12 Q. (BY MR. TROUPIS) And Mr. Crapo was  
 13 unopposed?  
 14  Yes.  
 15 Q. So do you think that it's a fair  
 16 explanation as to why these 343 voters didn't  
 17 vote for Senator Crapo, that it was too difficult  
 18 or too time consuming or too much of a bother to  
 19 punch out the chad next to his name?  
 20 MR. SMITH: Objection. It calls for  
 21 speculation.  
 22 MR. TROUPIS: Okay.  
 23 Q. (BY MR. TROUPIS) You can answer.  
 24 A. I mean, it's not much trouble to push a  
 25 button.
