Dear Mr Brown

Your last question is the answer to your letter. The flare-up of such men as Willam and Storey did frighten the alumni. I have foreseen the peril of having too large a member of an alten race; and three years ago I tried to prevent to; but there was a great outcry on the part - among others of almost, and the press was hot with denundiations of me from the and of the country to the other. Not one of the alumni, however, wentured to defend the policy publicly or at the maeting of the Associated Harvard Clubs in Sanders Theatrs, where the attempt to limit the Jews was freely denounced. I am no anti-Semitic, but too large a number of the race intensifies race prejudit and does harm. I am glad to see from your letter, as I have from many other signs, that the alumni are beginning to appreciate that I was not wholly wrong three years ago in trying to limit the proportion of Jews.
