

require Plaintiff to show cause why this case should not be dismissed for his failure to pay the initial partial filing fee.

If Plaintiff's failure to pay by the court's deadline was caused by prison officials' failure to adhere to his request to remit payment using funds from his account, his failure to pay within the time ordered by the court will be excused. However, if Plaintiff's failure to pay by the court's deadline was caused by his failure to leave sufficient funds in his account to timely pay the initial partial filing fee, his failure to pay will not be excused. Absent a sufficient response, the case will be subject to dismissal. See [*Taylor v. Cassidy*, 570 Fed. App'x. 632 \(8th Cir. 2014\)](#) (holding district court abused its discretion by dismissing case without first taking steps to determine whether prisoner-plaintiff's failure to pay the initial partial filing fee "was caused by circumstances beyond his control, such as prison officials' failure to adhere to his request to remit payment using funds from his account").

IT IS ORDERED:

1. Plaintiff will have 30 days to show cause why this case should not be dismissed for failure to pay the initial partial filing fee. In the absence of cause shown, this case will be dismissed without prejudice and without further notice.

2. The clerk of the court is directed to set a pro se case management deadline in this case using the following text: **February 9, 2018**: check for response to show cause order.

3. The court's prior Memorandum and Order (Filing No. [7](#)) and Judgment (Filing No. [8](#)) are stricken.
