Adrian Palensky, being first sworn upon oath, says:

- 1) I am a Director of Quality Assurance for Defendant Nestlé Purina PetCare Company ("Nestlé Purina"). I am making this Declaration based upon personal knowledge and am competent to testify to the matters stated below.
- 2) In my position as a Director of Quality Assurance for Nestlé Purina, my duties and responsibilities include, among other things, oversight of storage and storage security for recalled wet pet food.
- 3) In March, April and May 2007, Purina recalled certain pet food that may have been tainted with contaminated wheat gluten purchased from Chem Nutra, Inc. As a result, Purina is holding a tremendous amount of recalled pet food.

4) One category of recalled pet food Purina is currently storing is referred to as "Organized Product." The Organized Product is pet food contained in cans or pouches that is in cases and stored on full or partial pallets in Purina's warehouses or in third party warehouses being rented by Purina. This pet food either never left Purina's possession or was distributed to retailers and returned to Purina in unopened cases or pallets. Purina currently is storing approximately 606,056 (ALPO) and 117,778 (Mighty Dog) cases of Organized Product, amounting to approximately 8 million cans ALPO (based on 13.2 cans per case weighted average figured using the known full case quantities) and 3 million pouches Mighty Dog.

5) To date, Purina has not disposed of, and continues to store, the approximately 606,056 (ALPO) and 117,778 (Mighty Dog) cases of Organized Product in its possession, as follows:

6) A "SKU date" represents all product of a particular recipe that is produced in a given production run at a Purina plant on a given day.

7) Purina produces its pet food product in batches of the same recipe, and more than one batch usually is used to manufacture the product within a particular SKU date. Typically, there are sixteen batches per SKU date, but the number of batches can be greater than 50 per SKU date.

8) At the beginning of Purina's production process, the raw materials for each batch are thoroughly mixed. The mixed recipe then is placed into cans (Mighty Dog pouches are produced by Menu). Cans are placed into cases in sequential order and the cases then are placed onto pallets in sequential order. As a result, the last case placed on the top of one pallet will contain units that were produced immediately before the units in the first case placed on the bottom of the next pallet.

9) Typically, there are 8 to 48 units per case of product and 96 to 240 cases per pallet, with the larger number of cases per pallet being associated with cases with a lower number of units.

10) Specifically, Purina has approximately eight variations on the number of cases per pallet depending on the size of the units in the cases, which are as follows:

11) The units produced in one individual batch can fill multiple pallets.

The process for placing product into units, units into cases and cases onto pallets is very fast.


Although the production pace depends on the Purina plant in which the product is produced and the size of the unit being produced, a case typically is filled in seconds and a pallet typically is filled 2 to 3 minutes. For a 13.2 oz. can sized product, Purina fills approximately 600 cans per minute. For a 22 oz. Can size product, Purina fills approx. 300 cans per minute.

12) Purina's production process is designed to provide high quality pet foods to customers. One way the quality is measured is through a low percent of variation in the product. Typically, there is no variation in Purina's product from unit to unit within the same batch, and the variation from batch to batch is minimal.

13) It is most practical at this time for Purina to select and store intact cases of product rather than to open cases and organize and store individual cans from cases. This method will minimize human error that could occur in the selection and storage of the retrieved product.

14) The safest way for Purina's employees to retrieve cases from pallets is for them to retrieve the cases from the top of the pallet, as opposed from within different places in the pallet. The selection of cases would pose a greater risk of injury if pallets (which can be stacked up to 4 to 5 pallets high) were required to be broken down and cases selected from within each pallet. There is a risk that cases above will break and/or fall, possibly causing injury to Purina's employees. This risk does not exist if cases are retrieved only from the top of a pallet, as such cases can easily be identified and selected from the pallet without needing to break down the pallet.


