- 1 Durham, correct?
- 2 A. Yes.
- 3 Q. Okay. And "The 46," you understood
- 4 Mr. Smith to be referring to the 46 white members of
- 5 the team, correct?
- 6 A. No.
- 7 Q. Well, you knew that there were -- there
- 8 was one black player, Devon Sherwood?
- 9 A. I know that now. I don't know I know that
- 10 then.
- 11 Q. Okay. But so when he said "The 46," did
- 12 you think he was referring to all the members of the
- 13 team?
- 14 A. I -- I didn't think about what he meant by
- 15 "The 46."
- 16 Q. Okay. Is it fair to infer from the
- 17 terseness of this email, which is just "The 46," that
- 18 there was a phone call before? You didn't just get
- 19 an email like this?
- 20 A. It's possible. But it contains the
- 21 information I need to make my report.
- 22 O. Okay. And did you tell anyone in your
- 23 office that Duke police wants the key card data for
- 24 the lacrosse team members?
- 25 A. I wouldn't think that I would have.

- 1 Q. But you're just not sure?
- 2 A. Well, it would -- what I report to the
- 3 police isn't necessarily, you know, common knowledge,
- 4 so I don't -- I wouldn't normally have -- sorry. My
- 5 reading glasses. No, I -- I would have just done it.
- 6 I wouldn't have told anybody I was doing it.
- 7 Q. Including Mr. Drummond?
- 8 A. I would let Mr. Drummond know that I made
- 9 reports for the police. I tried to keep him apprised
- 10 of everything that I was doing.
- 11 O. Okay. Including this?
- 12 A. Yeah.
- 13 O. Okay. Now, how long did it take you to
- 14 prepare the key card information that was requested
- 15 by Officer Smith?
- 16 A. I don't recall.
- 17 Q. Okay. I mean, is an hour a good guess or,
- 18 I mean, if you were to do it today, how long would it
- 19 take you?
- 20 A. It would depend on how I did it. You can
- 21 do it a number of different ways.
- 22 O. Let's say you did it the fastest.
- 23 A. The fastest way, today? About an hour, I
- 24 suppose.
- 25 Q. Okay. And has the technology improved

- 1 happened? This is all hypothetical. I just want to
- 2 make sure that's clear.
- 3 Q. Correct.
- 4 A. All right. No.
- 5 Q. What about if there was an idea of when,
- 6 you know, tomorrow, yesterday?
- 7 A. You could know who was logged into the

- 15 O. What about if they just accessed?
- 16 A. Card holder view isn't audit logged, no.
- 17 Now, we don't have anything to do with net IDs. We
- 18 don't -- we don't store them. We don't know them, so
- 19 if it involves --
- 20 O. Right. I just meant, did you use a net ID
- 21 to log into the HP, but you made it clear that you
- 22 use a separate user name and password?
- 23 A. Right. We're separate from that system.
- 24 We've been protected for a long time.
- 25 Q. You spoke earlier in response to a

- 1 question from Mr. Thompson that you would, you know,
- 2 let Matt Drummond know if you ran reports for the
- 3 Duke police; is that correct?
- A. As a matter of just keeping him up to
- 5 date. I'm not necessarily the only person they would
- 6 contact, so if I run a report for Duke police and
- 7 somebody else asks him, then he'll know, oh, Roland's
- 8 already handled that. Right.
- 9 Q. So you can speak for yourself, but you
- 10 usually told Matt Drummond as a matter of practice?
- 11 A. Yeah, yeah, as a matter of practice, yeah,
- 12 I would try and keep him apprised of everything that
- 13 I thought he needed to know.
- 14 O. And how would you do that?
- 15 A. Usually, I left him voice mail if I
