<u>ORDER</u>

THIS MATTER is before the Court on a Motion to Withdraw as Attorney, filed by the Federal Public Defender of Western North Carolina.¹ [Civil Case No. 1:16-cv-00207-MR ("CV"), Doc. 7; Criminal Case No. 1:07cr-00088-MR-1 ("CR"), Doc. 57].

Counsel filed a Motion to Vacate under 28 U.S.C. § 2255 on behalf of Petitioner on June 23, 2016, contending that Petitioner was eligible for relief from his career-offender sentence under <u>United States v. Johnson</u>, 135 S. Ct. 2551 (2015). The Court placed Petitioner's motion in abeyance pending

the outcome of <u>Beckles v. United States</u>, Supreme Court No. 15-8455. In <u>Beckles</u>, the petitioner argued that his career-offender sentence was erroneously enhanced by an unconstitutionally vague residual clause of U.S.S.G. § 4B1.2. On March 6, 2017, the Supreme Court held in <u>Beckles</u> that the advisory Guidelines are not subject to vagueness challenges. Beckles v. United States, 137 S. Ct. 886 (2017).

Having apparently determined that Petitioner's <u>Johnson</u> claim has no merit in light of the holding in <u>Beckles</u>, the Federal Public Defender now seeks to withdraw as counsel so that Petitioner may continue to pursue relief *pro se*, if he chooses to do so.

IT IS, THEREFORE, ORDERED that:

IT IS SO ORDERED.

- Counsel's Motion to Withdraw as Attorney [CV Doc. 7; CR Doc. 57] is **GRANTED**, and the Federal Public Defender of the Western District of North Carolina is relieved from any further representation of Petitioner.
- Petitioner shall have twenty (20) days from service of this Order in which to respond *pro se* to the Government's pending motion to dismiss [CV Doc. 6].
