**Plaintiff has personal information that the following events were
publicized and/or conducted on the premises of the defendant, with their

At The Holland Branch library:

- **The treasurer of the Springfield schools held a public discussion of school finances where the public gave input.**

At other Locations:

- 4) The library complainant had a number of visible tattoos which drew the attention of Plaintiff, and Plaintiff said to her with Complimentary intent (something like): 'nice tats' referring only to the visible tattoos that she had.**
