## <u>ORDER</u>

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Floyd styles his motion as one for "recusal" of Chief Magistrate Judge Schwab. A judge may disqualify himself or herself *sua sponte* or on motion of the parties under the federal recusal statutes, <u>see</u> 28 U.S.C. §§ 144, 455, but may not "recuse" or "disqualify" another judicial officer. The court accordingly construes Floyd's motion as a request to withdraw the court's referral of this matter to Chief Magistrate Judge Schwab for pretrial management.
