This matter is before the Court on Plaintiff's Motion to Remand, filed April 5, 2011.

Defendants have failed to respond to Plaintiff's Motion.¹ For the reasons discussed below, the

Court will grant the Motion.

¹Defendant Lamont has filed a Motion to Dismiss, but the Motion to Dismiss does not respond to the arguments raised in Plaintiff's Motion to Remand. Pursuant to DUCivR 7-1(d) "[f]ailure to respond timely to a motion may result in the court's granting the motion without further notice."

I. BACKGROUND

Plaintiff originally filed this action against Defendants in Utah state court. Defendant Lamont is a citizen of Utah. Defendant Lamont filed a Notice of Removal, removing this matter to this Court on the basis of diversity jurisdiction. Plaintiff timely filed a Motion to Remand.

II. DISCUSSION

The Tenth Circuit has stated that "there is a presumption against removal jurisdiction."²

Further, "[r]emoval statutes are to be strictly construed . . . and all doubts are to be resolved

against removal."³ 28 U.S.C. § 1441(b) provides:

Any civil action of which the district courts have original jurisdiction founded on a claim or right arising under the Constitution, treaties or laws of the United States shall be removable without regard to the citizenship or residence of the parties. *Any other such action shall be removable only if none of the parties in interest properly joined and served as defendants is a citizen of the State in which such action is brought.*⁴

Under this provision, Defendant Lamont may not remove this action as he is a citizen of

Utah, the state in which the action was brought, and the removal is based on diversity

jurisdiction. Therefore, this action was improperly removed based on § 1441(b) and remand is

appropriate.
